BY THE time you read this the new alcohol law for over twenty year olds will have come into force on 1 December. In case you are not aware, or unsure, I will summarise the main points as it may affect you as a driver. Firstly, if you are under twenty

nothing has changed – the alcohol limit is still zero.

For those folks over twenty, the breath alcohol limit has decreased from a breath alcohol limit of 400mcg/l to 250mcg/l. Hand in hand with this is the lowering of the blood alcohol limit from 80mg of alcohol per 100ml of blood, to 50mg. Those whose breath alcohol level is between 250mcg/l and 400mcg/l will receive a \$200 infringement notice, fifty demerit points and be forbidden to drive for twelve hours. If your level is over 400mcg/l nothing has changed and you will face a criminal charge.

Clearly this reduction in the alcohol limit is an attempt to lower our road toll. Alcohol contributes to 30 percent of all fatal crashes. A 2013 Ministry of Transport survey showed 93 percent of New Zealanders would like the enforcement of road safety laws either increased or maintained.

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


