A community investment

A "HUGE investment" by new owners at Pine Hill's early childhood centre has seen the centre double its roll and start a wait list for new children.

Family Ties Educare managing director Melissa Henderson says since taking over the centre last year the support from the community has been amazing and she is excited about the centre's future.

First up for the centre was the start of a "massive renovation project" which so far has included a new roof, upgrading electrical wiring, replacing rotten wood, doors, windows and aluminium joinery, plumbing work and repainting the exterior. Next on the list is a redevelopment of the playground.

"There's so much space, it's fantastic," she says. "It's massive with two to three outside areas that have grass, trees and natural shade. On one side is a perfect shady outdoor play area for summer, while the other side is too hot to use in summer, but will be warm and sunny during winter. The centre currently has 25 children enrolled with four full-time teachers. "There is ample space for more children but Melissa says their philosophy is about quality childhood care, not quantity.

"For us this is an investment in this community to provide quality care to the children in this area." The centre has higher teacher to children ratios then what regulations require.

"We really believe for children to thrive they need time, space and pace - a nice slow time to potter and do their thing which allows children to learn at their own natural pace."

"We're still establishing our programme and getting it set up before we grow the numbers further."

The plan is to allow a year to establish their programme and use of spaces before starting on more renovation work on the interior, she says.

The CreekFest discovery walks feature signage with pictures and information about points of interest, which are put up once a year during CreekFest. Now all that information will be available year-round through the app.

The app will feature a map with all the points of interest with pictures and the relevant information for each stop.

CreekFest co-organiser Wendy Tripp is excited about the new project, as a lot of work by volunteers has gone into collating information and making all the signage for the discovery walks.

30 looms to move into valley workspace

NORTH EAST Valley is set to increase its arts presence with a new weaving studio with com-

munity access that will open this year.

Master weaver Christine Keller is busy renovating rooms at the Valley Community Workspace to shift the Loom Room from its current home at King Edward Court.

The Loom Room will occupy 20% of the workspace and house up to 30 looms. It will encompass three areas: a teaching space, Christine's studio, and looms available for people to rent for a specific project.

Students can learn how to weave at her weekly classes where they will complete a small project, and might then like to work on a bigger project, such as a blanket, over a few months, Christine says.

There are very few places teaching weaving in New Zealand, with only a little being taught at Massey University, she says.

Christine is excited about the opportunities for joint projects with other groups and businesses using the workspace at 11 Allen Street.

Already she has teamed up with MakerSpace who 3D-printed parts she needed to repair and upgrade 14 old looms that had been 'sitting in a pile' at the Southern Institute of Technology.

Current students and members of the workspace have already helped her with the renovations, but she would love some more help from the community. Even if people could give half a day, or

DRAWING ON a tablet has helped artist Janet Smith do more on-site sketching, especially in public.

"No one takes any notice of someone busy on their device," says Janet, who is a member of the Friday Art Group that meets at the Valley Project community rooms.

It's so easy to use, she says, and is an alternative to carrying around a sketchpad and pen or paints, especially when she is on holiday.

She draws directly on the screen of the tablet with a stylus and has access to multiple pen, pencil and brush tools, along with hundreds of instantly available colours.

Drawings can be finished onsite or at home, and pictures can be printed onto quality photographic paper for a good frameable print.

Janet's exhibition of tablet art runs until the end of March at the Dunedin Botanic Garden Information Centre.

Learning Chinese made fun

CHINESE FOR Kiwis started with a small group of parents with a desire for their kids to learn Chinese in an engaging way. So together, over the course of a year, we put together a language club. Every week a

ages 3 to 12 years, come together at Pine Hill School to learn basic Chinese through songs, stories, games and craft. The club has many kids with Chinese heritage, as well as Kiwis wanting to learn a language.

The Chinese for Kiwis principle is to use Western methods for Western learners. We focus on speaking, skills and confidence, and getting active while we learn. There are badges to collect and aspire to, and a club uniform to foster pride in being a Chinese speaker.

We had a great year in 2017, tweaking our club activities through parent feedback each term, and now we have a format which we think is great for our kids. Our hope is for Kiwi-Chinese families to have an avenue for their kids to be proud of their heritage and



guage, while also providing for beginner learners from our Kiwi community.

Our club has enjoyed many Chinese-speaking volunteers from the community who start the session by reading to the children.

Our Chinese ABC playgroup is taught by Renee Koh, a Kiwi-Chinese of Singaporean descent. The big kids' session, the Bear Cat Club, is taught by myself - Bonnie Shotbolt - a Kiwi who is a qualified English language teacher.

I decided to use my English language teaching training to help others begin their journey to learn Chinese. Having received such warm hospitality from Chinese people as I learnt Chinese Mandarin abroad, I am passionate about equipping New Zealanders to welcome migrants in the same spirit.

I believe that Chinese is a very important language for Kiwis to be learning.

On Thursdays mornings we will host a free, kid-friendly social morning of walking and talking in the Botanic Gardens. I would like to encourage Chinese migrants in the community to come along and use the opportunity to meet people. -Bonnie Shotbolt

Borrow-bike scheme powers up

ELECTRIC BIKE expert Nathan Parker hopes a new scheme to allow North East Valley residents to borrow an electric bike for errands around town will see more people out of cars and on bikes. The 'borrow-bike' is available to members of the Valley Community Workspace and Valley Card holders.

"If we want to get cities greener then electric bikes is the way," says Nathan.

The electric bike makes it easy to do errands even if they are on the other side of Dunedin, and if people have never ridden an electric bike before it takes only a few minutes to learn how.

Dunedin Electric Bikes is open from Tuesday to Saturday from 9am to 2pm and until 5pm on Fridays.

If you don't have your Valley Card yet, they can be purchased at the Valley Project office, Black's Road Green Grocer and Bloomin Gorgeous. The card

DSY Free home insulation available

KIA ORA koutou Valley Voice readers

Happy new year! Let's start things off with great news.

The Cosy Homes Charitable Trust and Otago Community Trust have joined forces to boost the Government's subsidised insulation scheme to make it FREE for many Otago residents and we want North East Valley, along with all Dunedin residents, to hear about it.

The government's Warm Up NZ programme offers a 50% subsidy to homeowners with Community Services Cards, but this was simply not being taken up in our region because affordability is such an issue.

As third-party funders for this programme in Otago, our two trusts came together and decided to boost the subsidy to 100% to ensure all our allocated subsidies are taken up before the end of June.

There is no catch. This is truly free for those meeting the eligibility criteria, which are broad:

- If you own your home and it was built before 2000, and you have a Community Services Card or a Gold Card with a Community Services Card endorsement, you are eligible for FREE ceiling and underfloor insulation where accessible.
- If you are a landlord, and your main tenant has a CSC, and the house was built before 2000, Cosy Homes and Otago Community Trust will boost your subsidy to 75% for ceiling and underfloor insulation where accessible. As the landlord you pay 25%.

If you have a respiratory condition, and you're within \$20,000 of the CSC income limit for your household size (see Cosy Homes' website for income limits), and your house was built before 2000, medical referrals are available (when signed off by a medical professional).



Subsidies are available for a limited time, on a first-in, first-served basis and are available Otago-wide.

Let's spread this good news far and wide. Please ask if you have any questions at all. Head to our Cosy Homes website, cosyhomes.org.nz, for more information.
