

# Ride of a lifetime to help save lives



MY DAILY RIDE is about to get a bit longer......As a parent of a premature baby whose initial journey into this world was pretty rough, we were blown away with the support that our whanau received while our child was being cared for. 5 years on, it seems timely to give back. Exactly five years after my son Oscar came home after spending the first month of his life in the Neonatal Intensive Care Unit, I'll be attempting to ride my mountain bike the length of New Zealand in a month. I'm raising funds for The Neonatal Trust as part of the Tour Aotearoa. Starting February 22, 2020 I'll be travelling under my own power, unsupported and self-sufficient, whereas during Oscar's stay in hospital we had amazing support, from the NICU nurses and The Neonatal Trust. I'll be starting my ride from Cape Reinga at midday on Saturday Feb 22, and hope to be in Bluff before noon on Otago Anniversary day, March 23. The Neonatal Trust doesn't receive any government funding, relying entirely on the generosity of the donations they receive. The main objectives of the Trust are to support the families, provide equipment, professional development for staff, and to aid neonatal medical research. I'd love to be able to raise \$1 for every kilometer I ride.

Huge thanks to everyone who has donated to my fundraising effort so far, it's great to see so much generosity, and I really appreciate the words of encouragement too. AS THE YEAR BEGINS to flow along as swiftly as the Lindsay in flood, I thought it would be a welcome opportunity in this, my first issue editing the Valley Voice, to reflect on the purpose of the Valley Project.

The Valley Community has been a strong community for a long time. Occasionally in quieter moments, I look back at some of the historic photographs from the past couple of centuries and marvel as much at what has changed, as what has barely changed at all. I wonder about the people of this place, and what their community was like, long before the likes of North East Valley Normal School (the second oldest school in Dunedin) was built. Did the unique landscape of the valley nurture tangata whenua in a similar or different way as it does for us now? The Valley Voice, as I understand it, has been in circulation for over 25 years. The Valley Project has its own history as well, from grass roots community initiatives, to the more formal incorporated society as it operates today. For us as an organisation, the 'what' is far less important than the 'why'...

Our aim is to build community connections and resilience. Sometimes that can be a hard goal to measure. The key factor is knowing what makes our community tick, and what aspirations the project team can support. I'm extremely grateful to our voluntary executive, all of who give their time to help steer us from their various perspectives.

The Valley Project is yours, it is much more than the staff in the office, the volunteers or the project executive. It is a web of support, inspiration and togetherness that belongs to us all. This year, my hope is that we can focus on the bigger picture, but also come back to our roots a little with smaller, more intimate gatherings, such as the community dinner coming up at the beginning of April.

As March approaches, I am also reminded of the tragedy of March 15<sup>th</sup>, and the impact this event had here upon our own small community. We saw genuine fear, and genuine love; and a year later, I'm interested in the longer-term impacts. In the next issue, I'd like us to reflect on this. I welcome you to send me a short reflection of your own, and I hope to publish these from a small cross-section of our community. Noho ora mai, — Tess Trotter, Project Leader

# ADJO serving up community connections

**EXCITING THINGS** are brewing at ADJØ. Scheduled alongside the University of Otago's O-week, ADJØ organised their first ever 'Activities Week', a week filled with creative workshops, community dinners, live music, and a pop up thrift store, as a taster for what's to come. Events at ADJØ are designed to encourage community bonding and creativity in a relaxed atmosphere, appealing to those who may normally feel uncomfortable in a conventional gallery space. They recently applied for an on-license with the DCC, which if granted, will allow them to sell alcohol on the premises. They hope to help change the mind set around drinking in Dunedin, with a focus on homemade schnapps (snaps in Danish) designed to pair with their Smørrebrød, and a small, but frequently changing wine and beer menu to compliment dinners, workshops, artist talks, and live music.

Proving to be popular is ADJØ's shared dining event 'The Food Between Us', where they pull the tables together to create a

community dining experience. There are always two options, one meat and one vegan, and the meal costs \$10 per dish. To accompany the meal, they host local musicians performing a wide variety of genres for a unique dining experience. These events use food and music to break down the social barriers some of us face when sitting next to a stranger, and to create a space where people feel comfortable to eat and relax whether you come on your own or in a group. The next community dinner is on Wednesday 18th of March, from 5.30pm until 9pm.

Upcoming events in March include the opening of artist Liam Hoffman's exhibition 'Sacred Permit', fringe festival events, and live music. —Caitlin and Jonas, ADJØ - Café and Gallery, 10 Bank Street.

# Runners crush Cargill-again!

FOR THE THIRD YEAR in a row Grant Guise solely organised the longest 24hr trail running challenge in the world; Crush the Cargill 24hr Challenge, to raise funds for the Valley Project. He coerced many people into making the event possible, including the entire Tripp family. I'm not sure what he bribed them with, maybe shoes. Or did he blackmail them? Last year's champ Chris Bisley even helped out; he wasn't racing this year possibly because he was injured (Tonya Harding styles). Despite all this skulduggery, the event was a roaring success and nearly \$3000 was raised for the Valley Project as a result. It was a brilliant morning the day of the event and over 100 runners from far and wide had gathered in Bethune's Gully, to partake in the pilgrimage up and down Mt Cargill. This year, Adam Keen ran it over and over more than anyone else, equalling Chris Bisley's world record of 17 round trips to the trig and back. That's a total of 9700m of elevation; more than Ed Hillary ever managed. No wonder the event is described by the world's trail running media as the number one most savage race there is. In the women's race Sharon Lequeux ran like a possessed tiger (possibly due to the tequila) and smashed out a new record of 15 ascents and descents. She didn't even look tired. My money would be on her to take out the overall title next year. For reasons unknown, several people attempting running up and down Mt Cargill with a lawnmower strapped to their back. Some guy Pascal did that faster than anyone else in a world record time of 1 hour 50 minutes. Also of note, Isaac Tripp set the world record for the shortest length of time to hold a world record for carrying a lawnmower up and down Mt Cargill, 5 hours. Matt Bixley didn't even finish one summit!—Andrew Glennie



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IT'S ALL HANDS ON DECK, or rather, on seeds. The propagation nursery is getting into full swing following the collection and preparation of small leaved kōwhai (*Sophora microphylla*) seeds. Kōwhai seeds are a yellowgold colour, growing on the tree in pea-like pods. Germination of kōwhai can be a little tricky compared to other plants - the seeds need to be scarified (scratching the hard outer coat) to let water in to germinate. We use sandpaper, then soak the seeds overnight in warm water. By the morning, they are ready to sow in seed-raising trays.

A few weeks later, the wee seedlings will start appearing indicating germination has been successful! The nectar produced by the bright yellow flowers are feasted on by tūi and bellbirds to only name two! These wee seedlings will be ready for planting in another year or so, destined for backyards and adopted community spots within the Lindsay Creek Catchment as part of the Backyard Ecosanctuaries program.

Check out our blog for other seeds we are looking for that may be growing in your backyard - many plants will be producing seeds and fruits in the upcoming months.

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
















# Satisfying messes at Playcentre

Tech Time 4 Kids Seniors can also volunteer to be selected to work with teachers and community members who come for help.
