

# **Crush the Cargill**

LYING IN the grass on the top of Mt Cargill at 3am staring at the stars was a highlight of last year's inaugural Crush the Cargill challenge for keen runner Steve Tripp in .

This year the challenge is on to beat his record of 12 ascents of the 680m-high peak in 24 hours. The Crush the Cargill event will run from 10am–10am, 15–16 December, starting at Bethunes Gully.

"It's a great opportunity to push the boundaries and see what you can do," says Steve. But, you don't have to go for the whole 24 hours to join the event. Everybody is welcome to come along, whether they want to run or walk, join in for just one ascent, a couple of summits, have a tag team or push themselves to go solo for 24 hours.

Entry is by koha and all donations go to the Valley Project, a community-led development project based in North East Valley. Bring cash on the day or donate at the Give-a-Little page bit.ly/givetocrush.

Crush the Cargill is not a registered event and people enter at their own risk, says Steve.

"Just turn up on the day and enjoy the walk/run up Mt Cargill with others and the sense of camaraderie on the day."

The first event last year was inspired by "a group of running mates thinking 'what kind of crazy challenge could we have'," while fuelled by "too much beer".

The success of last year's event inspired organisers to run it again this year.—*Edith Leigh* 




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### Project NEWS Bags reduce landfill waste

THE VALLEY Project is partnering with Bags for Good to bring their upcycled fabric bags to the Valley community rooms just in time for Christmas.

Along with Black's Road Green Grocer, the Valley Project will now be stocking bags made by a collective of dedicated volunteers from across Dunedin who are passionate about reducing plastic use and rescuing fabric bound for landfill. "We know that the Valley community is full of people who are passionate about sustainable living and we're excited to bring these awesome upcycled and multipurpose bags to the community rooms," says Valley Project staff member Erin Silver.

The bags are \$15 each and all proceeds go back to Bags for Good and help them continue their upcycling project. Buying a bag will also support the Valley Project to establish a Bags For Good community bag library next year.

# Project to discover what waste ends up in creek

WHAT GOES into the stormwater system can end up in our local awa Pakihaukea (Lindsay Creek), the harbour and ultimately the sea.

We know it's very important to take steps to prevent contaminants entering the

stormwater. However, perhaps surprisingly, we don't really know the extent of the pollutants entering the system at a city-wide level.

Small but significant steps are being taken in North East Valley to change this.

A small group of Kāi Tahu valley residents is doing a pilot project to install LittaTraps at four different points in the valley stormwater system, with support from the Dunedin City Council's Te Ao Tūroa funding.

Developed by Stormwater360, The LittaTraps are specialised drain fittings that collect large items of plastic and other rubbish before they wash into the system and out to sea.

The traps will be checked in a 3–6 month cycle. Project participants are waiting to see exactly what and how much junk is washing into our awa (waterway) and will develop projects to encourage locals to join in preventing that stuff from making it into the gutters.

The project has the backing of Kāti Huirapa ki Puketeraki. —*Vicki Lenihan* 



## South Island's first salt therapy room right here in the valley

Wendy Dore has set up a salt therapy room at her home in North East Valley, after salt therapy made a huge difference to her daughter's asthma and eczema when they lived in Australia.

**I'M SITTING** in a very comfortable, soft white chair in a white room, and although I can't see it, the air all around me is filled with pure powdered salt.

Halotherapy, as it is known, is said to help with respiratory issues and skin conditions, and Hash a host of other benefits such as breathing easier and sleeping better.

I'm feeling very relaxed. I could happily lie back and read a book, or perhaps just idly sift and play with the salt in the salt pit at my feet, but I'm chatting to Salt Therapy New Zealand owner Wendy Dore about how she came to set up the South Island's first salt therapy room here in North East Valley.

Wendy first came across salt therapy when she took her daughter for treatment in Australia. She noticed that when her daughter was having salt therapy she didn't need to use her puffer for her asthma and any outbreaks of eczema quickly cleared up. was no salt therapy available and eventually decided to set up her own halotherapy room.

She imported a 'generator' from the United States, which disperses the powdered, 99.9% pure, pharmaceutical-grade salt into the air. The salt-laden air is breathed deep into the lungs where it absorbs moisture, which helps to break up mucous so that the client can cough it up.

"You know how you feel good when you've been at the ocean?" asks Wendy. "A part of that is due to the salt breathed into your upper respiratory system. Dry salt gets deep into your lungs." Wendy, who teaches at Otago Polytechnic on the tertiarty education graduate diploma, is excited to have the salt room ready to go for an official opening this month.

"I love it here in the valley and I'm looking forward to helping people to breathe."

## TRAPBOX: Back by popular demand

**LOOKING FOR** a great gift idea for that special someone for Christmas? How about crafting a trapbox for them that will also help out the native flora and fauna in the valley.

Back by popular demand, OpenVUE (Open Valley Urban Ecosanctuary) will be hosting another trapbox-making workshop, just in time for Christmas.

These trapboxes are safe to use in your backyard and are the best way to ensure rats and mice are humanely caught. The small entry allows only rats and mice to access the spring-loaded trap. Place the box near your compost bin or a fruit tree, somewhere the rats and mice will feel safe to chow down on a tasty peanut butter or nutella treat (best baits to use).

The kits are all prepped and ready, waiting to be assembled. If you can, bring a hammer, but don't worry if you can't. Each trapbox kitset includes one rat and once mouse trap. The cost is \$10, or \$8 if you have a Valley Card or a Community Services Card.

We will also be making brightly coloured cat collars to reduce predation on birds and lizards. We would love some donations of brightly coloured fabric if you have any spare floating around. Bring along a sewing machine if you have one.

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## school Exciting initiative among schools

CHILDREN WILL be the winners of a new initiative to increase collaboration among schools in North Dunedin. Providing early intervention and support for children who struggle with learning or need an extension in their learning will be the focus of the new North Dunedin Community of Learning. Those in the community of learning include primary schools, kindergartens and early childhood centres from Port Chalmers through to George Street Normal School, as well as Dunedin North Intermediate, Logan Park High School and Otago Polytechnic.

The aim of the initiative is to enhance collaboration among education providers, with a focus on improving communication among them.

North East Valley Normal School principal John McKenzie, who will be the lead principal of the community of learning, says there will be teachers in schools or education sites who might have particular skills with behaviourally challenged children or children on the autistic spectrum, who could then provide support and help in other schools and education sites.

"We are making sure that all children, regardless of their school or temperament or behaviour, are involved in the learning journey." North East Valley Normal School Board of Trustees chair Sarah Young says the North Dunedin Community of Learning is an exciting initiative, and she is thrilled that their principal will leading the

## LKS Delightful exploration on short walk


VIEWS, GARDENS AND CLIMBS IN 3.8KM LOOP: DUDDINGSTONE STEPS TO DALMORE

THIS 3.8 KM loop is a great summer's evening walk. Starting at the bottom of Duddingstone Steps you'll climb steeply to Dalmore, gaining glimpses of the valley and city as you wind up Buccleugh and Barclay streets.

At the top, turn left onto Hislop Street and take a break by the bus stop to enjoy the panorama!

Another left into Allenby Ave will bring you to the entrance of Dalmore Reserve. Overgrown public land back in 2015, the reserve has been brought back to life by a group of local gardeners.

Behind their productive community garden you'll discover a little loop track to the left. The track dips through the bush before opening up to harbour views, and is well worth exploring for the sure of foot.





Leave by the way you came in and continue on Allenby Ave to Pine Hill Road and Gladstone Road. You could meander back to the valley from here, but a delightful alternative is to turn off at Falkirk, down Orbell Street and join the peaceful shrub-shrouded alleyway and steps to Bank Street.

### Subdivision consent sought

**PUBLIC SUBMISSIONS** close on Friday 7 December for a resource consent application to subdivide the upper terrace of the former Palmers Quarry into nine residential lots.

Resource consent is required as the proposed sub-division is zoned rural. The application states the site currently has no practical rural use and the effects of the subdivision will be no more than minor.

Residential activity will be accessed by an internal right-of-way from Watts Road, and future dwellings will be difficult to see, except when viewed from the opposite side of North East Valley, the application says.

### Camera-less photography exhibition

A CONTEMPORARY photographic exhibition, s.EX, a s.olo EX.hibition by photographer Andrew Ginther is on display in North East Valley this month. The collection comprises two bodies of work, the first being a range of black and white and colour images taken on film. It features fragmented impressions of New Zealand from randomly scratched graffiti to roadside views, to be read as signposts of ourselves and the way we may see ourselves and each other.

The very large works are a series based on entoptic imagery (of the eye). The investigation of entoptic phenomena as underpinning the development of the symbolic codification of objects became an inspiration for my exploration of camera-less photography.

These pieces, all created in 2017, test the relationship between the modes of expression of representational and abstraction in art.

The exhibition runs until 17 December and is open Tuesday to Sunday from 10am –4pm at 201 North Road, the building that formerly housed Wallace Design.
