

## Landmark hall set for demolition

Saint Martin's Church hall in Northumberland Street has been closed as it is deemed an earthquake risk. This facility will be greatly missed by a good number of groups that have used it regularly and many readers will think nostalgically of great times had in the hall.

The hall first built in around 1910 was only about half the size it is now and for a while served as a chapel for the Primitive Methodist Church. Two extensions, the first being the lounge area and the second being the kitchen, added to the utility of the venue. The hall has been used for social events including dances. It has been home to a Girl Guide unit for many years. Some of our readers will be familiar with the monthly markets held in the hall.

The Northern Artery group has held very successful *Art Bizarres* in the hall. "We can have upward of twenty stalls in the main space, while the choir is singing on stage and Devonshire teas are being served in the lounge. The hall just works so well and has a great feel about it," reports one of the organisers.

Saint Martin's hall has also been the venue for two very successful cabarets. The 2012 "Cabaret Botanica" won an award from the Dunedin Fringe Festival for best set design and the 2013 "Radio Botanica" won an award for best community participation.

The hall, which is the property of All Saints Parish, meets




less than the required 33% of the new building code for earthquake resistance. There is a danger that in a strong earthquake some of the walls might collapse. Earthquake strengthening is beyond the means of the parish, and with many other church buildings around the city also likely to need upgrading, finding funding for such a venture would be a challenge.

The vestry, which is the governing body of the parish, has no plans for demolition at this stage. Demolition is also a costly venture. The vestry welcomes ideas from the public as to what could be done with the building or the site.

The Valley lost the use of St David's Church hall a few years back and the hall at Glenaven Methodist Church is used exclusively by Montessori at the Gardens.

Sacred Heart School has the Nga Maara Hall, NEV Normal School has a fine refurbished school hall. Valley Baptist and the Salvation Army have halls that are available for public use. Details of these and other community spaces in our area are available from the community rooms.

## What's on the agenda for *The Project*?

The North East Valley Project is committed to its core value of "Enhancing the life of the community, particularly as it promotes the wellbeing of local children and their families and whanau."

We endeavour to engage with the community to get your ideas on how to make that happen and then apply the resources we have to putting your ideas into action.

Naturally our biggest resource is the residents of the Valley so a lot of our effort goes into linking people to-

## Textile classes

People in the Valley have had their own weaving studio since last year. Professional weaver and educator Christine Keller will now spread the word (and the skill) and take a series of four classes in 2014.

The first class will be **on weaving** and will be held on four Monday evenings starting March 17 and additionally on Saturday March 24 and April 5th. If interested participants want to go away for Otago Anniversary Day, we will do Saturday 29th March instead. All levels of

knowledge are welcome.

There will be projects for the total beginner as well as specialist projects for the weaving wiz. Maybe you can make yourself a scarf, a towel, a bag or learn about a specific technique you were always interested in. These classes are supported by the DCC through their Creative Communities Programme. This first class will be followed by a class in up-cycling in term two (starting May 5th) and dyeing and weaving classes in August and October.

Fees will include initial materials and will be \$175 waged and \$140 unwaged (for 24 teaching hours). Table looms can be rented for \$20 for the duration of the class (upon availability). All classes will be held in the North East Valley Community Rooms.

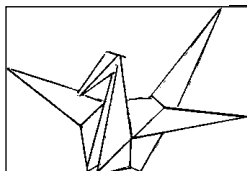

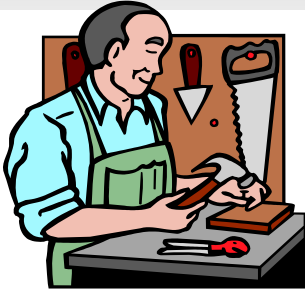

A Steering Group has been formed to help investigate the options for the use of this historic property at 282 North Rd. There are approximately 300 tourists who stop at Baldwin St per day averaged over the whole year. This could be a huge and untapped source of income for the community. We are collecting a raft of ideas that might appeal to visitors and locals alike e.g. pre-climb drinks, post-climb drinks, during-climb smoothies, nibbles from local suppliers, drinks with names of Val-

ley characters, standard coffees and teas, outside tables and chairs, mobile coffee vendor, toilets that are spectacular enough to warrant a photo being taken and a penny to be spent first, certificates/mugs/caps, local artworks for sale, leased cabinets, self-guided tours.
