Last year over \$4000 was raised to help fund CreekFest, and this is our focus again this year. It's easy to see the connection between Crush the Cargill and the Valley Project - both are about getting people together and reconnecting with our wider environment.

This year is also the 50th anniversary of the ground -breaking Woodstock music festival that symbolized a communal desire for love, peace and trail running. When Jimi Hendrix sang 'Purple Haze in My Brain' he was singing about the delightful fogginess that runners get to experience after running up and down Mt Cargill all night.


Woodstock came during a psychedelic period in music when it has been postulated that many

Riparian zone weeding



On the morning of CreekFest a team of seven spent four hours weeding and planting the riparian zone on Lindsay Creek behind the North East Valley Bowling Club.

They removed 4m³ of weeds which was 70% common hedge barberry, 25% blackberry, 5% sycamore and rowan and two plants of old man's beard. Seventy-two plants of a mix of kōwhai, carex, wineberry, fuscia and flax were planted. Weeding at the site had started during the Valley Spring Clean but hadn't been finished at that time.

Hoiho Bird of the Year

THE HOIHO or yellow-eyed penguin was crowned Bird of the Year in the recent competition by Forest and Bird.

The 'Bird of the Year' is an excellent tool for increasing the advocacy of New Zealand birds, in part due to all of the outstanding bird meme campaigns circulating on Facebook.

Hoiho are classified within New Zealand as 'nationally endangered' and numbers reached a low of 225 pairs in the 2018/19 season. They are only found in New Zealand, largely on the east coast of the South Island. North Otago, Otago Peninsula, the Catlins and Banks Peninsula are their known major breeding locations but young (juvenile) hoiho have been spotted as far north as Taranaki and the Bay of Plenty. Hoiho are unmistakable and so named after the yellow stripe of feathers circling their eyes and the back of their head. They're often shy, quiet birds but their Māori name hoiho, meaning 'noisy', alludes to the high-pitched, shrill nature of their call.

Hoiho are very sensitive birds and are threatened by mammalian predators and human land-use in terrestrial habitats, and by predators, fishing practices and ocean changes in their marine habitats, which have contributed to population declines.

Despite the incredible and tireless work of the Yellow-eyed Penguin Trust and conservation groups, numbers are continuing to decline. Prospecting for gold in North East Valley

A FEW years ago, someone told me that they had heard from someone that someone had told them that someone had prospected for gold in North East Valley back in the day.

Gold?! Before I raced down to Chingford Park to try my luck with Mr Jack's gold pan, I thought I'd best do some research. I was pretty sure from my geology degree mumble-mumble years ago that gold doesn't usually turn up in volcanic rocks, but perhaps I was wrong (or had slept through that lecture). When I dug around though, I found that gold had been discovered on the flanks of Harbour Cone on Otago Peninsula in 1874. Blow me down, you *can* get gold in volcanic rocks! Dr Adam Martin from GNS Science explained to me how this can happen. Millions of years ago when Dunners was a real live volcano, a big blob of magma forced its way up into the volcano intruding into some slightly older volcanic rock called trachyte.

The magma that didn't quite make it to the surface sat underground, slowly cooling off. And as it cooled gases and fluids came out of the hot magma and moved into the cold surrounding trachyte, where they pretty much froze, forming silver, fool's gold (pyrite) and actual gold.

Millions of years later miners managed to squeeze 5 ounces

(about 140g) of gold, worth about \$10,000 today, out of 22 tonnes of that rock. That's not too shabby in terms of gold per tonne of rock, but it was a tiny gold deposit and not commercially viable. Although I do wonder if we should take a family stroll up there these holidays ...

Anyways, early prospectors wouldn't have understood the local geology and processes like we do now, so they probably weren't looking for pyritic mineralisation associated with intrusive volcanics in North East Valley! Most likely the only thing that made someone look for gold here in the late 1800s was that there was a doozy gold rush on and anywhere was worth a crack. But there's no record of gold ever being discovered here; heading over the Old Dunstan Road to Central Otago was a much better prospect.

So, sadly, we have no gold in the valley. Nor, my arborist neighbour assures me, any frankincense or myrrh. But I do know some shepherds in the valley (of goats ... I assume that counts), we can probably scrape together three wise people, and there are little miracles to be found in every corner.

Mere Kirihimete everyone, and tune in next year for some exciting stories about an unexciting-seeming thing: soil! —*North East Valley scientist Helen Jack*
