Caring for the harakeke









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

ON SATURDAY 31st of October, whānau from the Te Roopu Maanaki class at North East Valley Normal School held their first Hui whakatakatū harakeke (meeting for preparing or readying flax) with the Māori and Pasifika Trust as part of their Te Whakapiki Reo project.

Te Whakapiki Reo Project is about revitalising and preserving native harakeke (flax) areas within the North East Valley School grounds, using Mātauranga Māori (Māori World Views) and Te Reo (Māori language) methods of learning. Students, their whānau, and the community participate in cultural activities that are set within an environmental preservation context. This session involved clearing the harakeke space, with a large skip bin filled within a couple of hours of hard work from the whanau attending. The session was followed by shared kai in the school hall.

Wily weeds, what are they?

THE TERM "weed" is a little bit of a misnomer - the term weed could apply to any plant, if it's not quite where we want it to be. Some species however, are known as invasive weeds - these are plants (or other species) that are introduced into a new area and spread very quickly, altering the new environment. Often, these plant species take over areas, creating a monoculture and have little benefits for native wildlife. Plants considered weeds may also attract undesirable species (i.e. sycamores attract wasps and likely rats too), do not produce foods native species eat and/or are not places native wildlife use to create their homes. These are the "weeds" we target when we have weeding working bees in community spaces as well as the weeds we are interested in helping you manage in your backyard (see below for how to be involved in the upcoming Weed Bash on 14th November). An important aspect of weeding is replanting - replacing the weeds we remove with native plant species that can provide good quality habitat and delicious flowers and fruits for wildlife such as birds, invertebrates and lizards. Some of the weeds we are specifically targeting for the upcoming Weed Bash include banana passionfruit vine, old man's beard, gorse, broom, sycamore, buddleia, Japanese honeysuckle and blackberry. 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
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
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Clean up at community workshop



SPRING IS here and Valley Community Workspace has been having a major clean and re-organisation. A relatively unused space in the building was cleaned out, and large storage racks have been built into the space. The bikes and parts which used to spread across the main area have all been sorted and either taken for recycling or packed into the new storage area. Challenging pole replacement success

LAST MONTH Unison Contracting Services were replacing power poles near the North East Valley substation, for Aurora Energy. The job is part of Aurora Energy's ongoing work to replace ageing assets and improve the safety and reliability of the network. Unison Contracting Services Operations Manager and Valley local, Craig Booth, explains. "Our teams removed the existing new pole and replaced it with one that could be dressed in the new cross arms and replacement switch, whilst it was on the ground before standing."

The job was done over several days. First everything was prepared on site. Then the high voltage circuit was wired up. The following day, Saturday the 17th of October, saw the same happen to the low voltage circuit as well as join the new section of cable to the existing section. This meant the impact on the community was less, as we didn't have to have the power off for an extended period of time.

"Doing it this way made this job safer, simpler and within outage timeframes."

"I'm proud of our crews' work and know how they enjoyed working in the Valley. We appreciated the support from the community and look forward to the next challenging job down the road."

Craig is referring to the three power poles that Unison Contracting Services' are replacing on the corners of North Rd, Blacks Rd and Northumberland St. This work is presently scheduled for December. Affected businesses and residents will be notified closer to the outage.—Sam McMullan



How long have you known about the Community Garden?

I went to one of the first meetings to determine whether there should be a community garden, that would have been eleven or twelve years ago. I wanted to be part of the North East Valley commitment to the idea. Our garden plots are all above ground, because the field underneath used to be very wet (we have since put in drainage). The first plots had no edges, so it was a major job to keep the weeds from creeping up onto the gardens and taking over. Now all garden plots have wooden or iron edges, and that's a great step forward.



What suits you about the Community Garden?

I'm quite a busy person, so I come to a working bee now and then when I can fit it in. Sometimes I stay for just part of the three hours; I can arrive late or leave early and everyone is OK with that. I love learning new things about gardening as we plant or weed together, and also new ways of cooking things. For example, I've learned to cook kale with soy sauce. Over our tea/coffee breaks we've had dried kale (with a little garlic), and recently there have been some really innovative pestos and yummy hummus varieties too

What is special about the Garden for you?

I'm keen for food to be grown organically, and the Garden works in this way (though it is not certified). I love meeting people. Although I'm reluctant to weed my own garden, it's a delight to be weeding the Community Garden with others. There is lots of
