



## Weeds removed by the tonne













The carpark is a hive of activity during the Valley Spring Clean (top), weeders clear out gorse and fill wool sacks (middle left and right) and the team on the Dunedin City Council weed tour (bottom left).

ALMOST 1.5 TONNES, or 18 cubic metres, of weeds were removed from North East Valley during this year's Valley Spring Clean event. Also on its way to responsible disposal was a van full of e-waste, 200 litres of paint destined for reuse, a skip and a trailer load of general household waste and uncounted amounts of waste taken away to be re-used by somebody else. A steady stream of an estimated 300 people

came and went from the Valley Project community rooms and carpark, dropping off waste, weeds and joining in with children's activities.

Weed-busting coordinator Simon Noble was thrilled with the day, with almost 40 people joining in on the weeding. Most were removing weeds from private property

with about six people joining the 'weed tour' run



by the Dunedin City Council. continued on page 3

## Pine Hill social group to help connect

A NEW social group starting in Pine Hill will begin as a small, informal group for local people who are new to the area and those who are supportive of them, as well as providing a way for people to connect with their community.

An initiative from the Valley Project in collaboration with Pine Hill School and the community, the group will meet in the school's library on Thursdays from 1.30–3pm.

Group facilitator Keri Eastwood says it will be an opportunity to learn new skills, share your own skills and have fun getting to know your neighbours in a relaxed environment. The time we spend together will be positive, re-affirming and supportive, she says.

"Members will be invited and supported to share their culture, experiences, percep-

tions and aspirations for themselves and their family members.

"We can begin this process by sharing chai and kai, cultural games and stories."

"I hope that members will gain skills to further participate in their local community and increase their personal confidence in this sort of non-threatening way."

## Good and bad wheelchair access around the valley

**NORTH EAST** Valley receives a mixed report for its accessibility for wheelchair users and disabled people.

Some parts were very good, such as the number of tactile crossings on the eastern side of the valley, as well as good access to the supermarket and pharmacy, says Rorie White.

Rorie, who uses a mobility scooter to get around and can walk only very short distances, undertook the accessibility report during his time with the Valley Project.

There is lots of room for improvement, he says, including access to the community rooms. Getting a wheel chair into the rooms is difficult, especially with the gravelled carpark. The pas-

sageway is also not wide enough to allow wheelchair access to the disabled toilet.

Other areas of concern were the western side of North Rd which is "very rough and bumpy.

"This side of the valley is terrible, it's awful to drive up there—you are going up and down steps. It wouldn't take much for someone in a wheelchair to get stuck."

Access to shops was mixed, with some being easy to access, such as the Gardens New World, but some very difficult.

Rorie will be presenting his report to the Valley Project executive board and has plans to also pass it on to the Dunedin City Council.

Wide variety of gardens for tour

**KEEN NORTH** East Valley gardener Mary Waymouth has "really enjoyed" visiting gardens around the north Dunedin area and is excited to share them with the community in the upcoming 'Loved, but not Lavish, Garden Tour'.

Co-organiser of the tour, Mary says there is a great range of gardens to visit, ranging from wellestablished to newly developed gardens. There are woodland gardens, flower gardens and gardens with an emphasis on growing food and sustainability.

"There will be something for everyone," says Mary. "We have two gardens that show what you can do with a small area, that are both beautifully and interestingly designed."

There is a fairly large woodland garden planted out in a gully in Pine Hill that is "long established, amazing and immaculately kept".

An old garden above the valley has been "totally restored and re-shaped", while another garden is only a few years in following a new house build.

Artist Rod Eales will be opening up her studio garden, as will keen gardener Karen Chalk who's garden has a strong emphasis on sustainability and growing seedlings.

Rory Harding's George Street Orchard is included in the tour which has a focus on growing fruit, vegetables, herbs, medicinal plants, chickens and mushrooms. His blog describes his garden as aiming "to grow many of the foods we like to eat in a way which captures atmospheric carbon, builds soil, increases biodiversity and blurs the distinction between ornamental and utilitarian."

THEY SPENT their time removing weeds above the cemetery at the Opoho sports ground. Gorse, broom, banana passionfruit and blackberry bushes were among the weeds removed during the day.

## Pipe renewal updates

WITH THE arrival of spring, pipe St, Opoho Rd and Farquharson work is being finished on the lower down the hillside.

The Dunedin City Council is with what is inevitably disruptive work.

New watermains mean better flows for fire-fighting, fewer burst pipes and improved water pressure.

The new wastewater pipes will reduce overflows in heavy rain that cause manholes to pop up and run into Lindsay Creek. The work includes better footpaths and pedestrian crossings, some new crossing points and cycle-friendly mudtank covers.

Water and wastewater pipes have been replaced in Warden

St, and work on the road and Signal Hill ridgeline and starting footpath should be finished by mid-October.

Meanwhile, the replacement of grateful for everyone's patience water and wastewater pipes in the area from Blacks Rd to Calder Ave started in mid-August. Work in Gillespie, Marquis and Balfour Streets should be done by November and Grey, James and Royston Streets should be finished by the end of the year. Predators leave footprint clues

CHILDREN FROM the local schools have been identifying different predators in their backyards as part of the Open VUE (Open Valley Urban Ecosanctuary) education programme.

We have found many different footprints left by predators in the tracking tunnels. Some even left a huge mess of prints after they were lured into the tunnel by peanut butter, which is a tasty treat for a hungry possum or hedgehog.

We're finding some very interesting chew marks with some of these predators nibbling their way through the card. We have also taken pictures of predators in their gardens, some of which were very determined to open the smelly can of sardines we left out.

The children are now honing their research skills by creating bird masks and finding out more about garden birds. They are very excited to find out which birds are in their gardens and to discover which foods the birds love to eat best.

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## Lots of singing and reading at playgroup

A NEW music session at the North East Valley Playgroup for 0–5 year olds aims to help parents interact more with their children right from when they are babies with singing, dancing, reading and interacting with others.

I was inspired to start the music session after attending a Talking Matters NZ workshop along with other Dunedin Early Childhood Education and Primary School teachers.

During the workshop we were told that New Zealand teachers have been finding that children are not starting school with enough verbal or reading skills. They believe this is due to not enough parents talking and communicating with their babies, infants and toddlers.

The organisation is undertaking more research and encouraging parents to start interacting with their children right from when they are babies. They suggested singing, dancing, reading and interacting with others is one of the best ways to do this.

So we have started a new music session on Wednesday mornings at the North East Valley Playgroup, with the awesome help of Yvette from Creations home-based care, who also ran a playgroup and music session at the South Dunedin Hub.

Our playgroup supervisor Billie Drummond and past supervisor Donna -Marie Darling are also adding in story time throughout our playgroup sessions and encouraging parents to use our library of books to read to children.



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the year.

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

## COP Graffiti at school

**FOLLOWING OUR** call for interest in joining the North Dunedin Community Patrol I'm pleased to say that this volunteer group received several enquiries from members of the public interested in joining.

Just to refresh, the community patrol assists police with its Prevention First policy, together with monitoring areas of concern through reported crime, public events and assisting with emergency management. They are another set of 'eyes and ears' for police and they are seen as a valuable asset.

Police are currently dealing with numerous complaints from a local primary school that has been struck with graffiti on various signs around the grounds and on the school roof.

Not only is this intentional damage, but the offending person or persons are unlawfully in an enclosed yard and when located can expect to be prosecuted for both offences.

The graffiti was carried out by way of a particular protest however this clearly crosses the line of what is acceptable and above all, legal.

For those of you driving on North Rd between the hours of 8–9am this is a timely reminder to monitor your speed, especially in the areas of the child care centres and schools. Recently a number of people have been issued infringement notices for excessive speed and driving through stop signs.

Children on foot, scooters or talking are not paying too much attention at times when crossing the roads and if there is a stop sign at the intersection with North Rd, STOP. These signs are there for a reason and they are not to be confused with a give way. There is a difference.

Continuing with North Rd, the Road Policing Group which is based at North Station recently carried out spot checks of vehicles with child seats. This was not so much for enforcement, but about educating drivers in the correct fitting of these seats with the end result being to keep our mokopuna safe.

The death or serious injury of any child is a tragedy, and even more so when it can be prevented with the use of simple and widely available equipment like child restraints. For information regarding correct fitting of childrens' car seats contact Plunket, Baby On The Move or Sitting Safe (Mosgiel).

Finally, if an offence has taken place where your property has been damaged or stolen by way of a theft or burglary, please report it to the police. I hear through various sources that offences have taken place in various locations around North Dunedin and there is no record of it.

If police are not aware of these offences taking place we cannot do anything about it. A new system of reporting crime was due to go live last month where all external calls to police stations will go directly to a Crime Reporting Line.

For any of you new to the valley area, although fully occupied, the North Dunedin Station does not have the facility to take complaints via the foyer and is not open to the public.

For any emergency, a phone is available on the wall beside the main door which will direct you to police communications or you can contact the Crime Reporting Line as previously mentioned.

Get to know your neighbours and stay safe on our roads.

## Thrilled book of photographs published

**VALLEY RESIDENTS** David Murray and Meg Davidson have published a book featuring work from a former Dunedin photographer Hardwicke Knight.

The book features photos taken during the 50s in Britain by Knight before he emigrated to Dunedin in 1957 to take up a job as a medical photographer.

Hardwicke was best known in Dunedin for publishing compilations of early photographs of the city. Many early photos of North East Valley are included in the Hardwicke Knight Collection which Hardwicke sold to Te Papa in 1991, including a Muir and Moodie 1912 photo of the Presbyterian Church now for sale.

A large part of the work for David was finding out where the photographs were taken and the names of buildings and people in them. It couldn't have happened without the internet, in particular Facebook groups with historic interest in particular areas, he says.

Hardwicke Knight: Through the Lens is a collaboration between David and Meg in North East Valley and the publisher Sean Naghibi in London.



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## \$140k upgrade for BMX track

EXTENSIVE RENOVATIONS at the BMX track at Forrester Park mean the track is not only now faster, but the maintenance work required has been halved. The Dunedin BMX Club have spent \$140,000 improving the track, including asphalting three corners, adding in a steeper starting ramp and adding a jumping pro straight.

Previously the corners were limed, but rain would wash the lime from the top to the bottom and would require maintenance up to four time a year. The newly asphalted corners are also faster to ride. The starting ramp height has now been doubled to meet international standards. It is very steep, so the club have also included a smaller, less steep, community ramp.

The track has been created with a dual role in mind to provide a competitive BMX racing environment but also to provide a free riding experience for cyclists of all ages.

Club president Brent Rutherford says it has been an exciting time and the club will be hosting the BMX South Island Titles next year with more than 300 riders expected.

"The track has been designed by the club and constructed by a loyal group of volunteers who have donated thousands of hours of their time, and machinery, to achieve a fantastic result.

"Without the generous support of local businesses and community funding group the dream of providing this facility could not have happened."

The BMX season starts after the school holidays with club night on Thursdays starting at 6pm. The club has race bikes and helmets available to hire for new riders wishing to try the sport. More details at dunedinbmx.nz or their Facebook page.
