# Have your say for our community

A PROPOSAL in the Dunedin City Council's 10-year plan, if adopted, could become a major

factor in securing the future of the Valley Project and other similar local community groups across the city.

Valley Project chairman Steve Tripp urges everybody in our community to have their say and make a submission on the council's 10-year plan.

To help make the process as easy as possible the project is running an after-work drop-in workshop on Wednesday 11 April to help people make their submissions.

The 10-year plan outlines the services and activities the council aims to provide, what they want to do, how much it is expected to cost and what it means for rates and council debt.

The council is seeking feedback about what is in the 10-year plan, which includes projects such as an estimated \$20 million piece-of-art bridge on the harbour waterfront. It also includes a new \$200,000 or \$300,000 place-based community grants scheme for the next three years.

The Valley Project, along with other groups, has been campaigning for some time to encourage the council to invest in local communities and to see how groups such as the Valley Project can bring huge social benefits to their area.

City councillor Marie Laufiso who pushed for the scheme to be \$300,000, rather than \$200,000, believes the city needs to invest in its people.

"From my own experience, having worked in Brockville as a community coordinator, I realised every suburb, whether well-off or not, really needs the resource of a full-time paid worker simply to initiate things, but also to support all the good things that go on in a community."

# 24-hour access to AED thanks to shed

A COMMUNITY AED (Automated External Defibrillator) is now able to be accessed 24 hours a day instead of just during Valley Project office hours, thanks to the North Dunedin Shed.

Shed members made a box to house the AED that has breakable glass in the front so people can grab it if somebody is having a cardiac arrest.

The device has voice and visual prompts to tell you what to do, and can be used by anybody.

The majority of people suffering a sudden cardiac arrest can't be resuscitated using CPR alone and their survival rate drops with every minute they wait for an ambulance to turn up with an AED.

Being able to access one from the community rooms at the top of the North East Valley Normal School carpark, 262 North Rd, could save a life one day!

# New scheme could make a difference in suburbs



During the exhibition you will be able to view a wide variety of artworks, and have the opportunity to buy original work and meet and talk with some of the artists about their work.


At certain times an artist will be demonstrating at the venue. We look forward to welcoming you to view our exhibition.

# Penalties for flouting licence rules

is back to normal after the Christmas and New Year break with schools in full

swing and the endless stream of foot and vehicle traffic down North Road. My work has varied since returning in January, and I have worked at the oneday cricket, the Forsyth Barr stadium for the Roger Waters concert, and the Octagon shift on a few occasions providing high-visibility policing between 9pm and 5am on Friday and Saturday nights. Regarding the Octagon,

apart from the thousands on punters coming and going from the numerous licenced premises, there are those who choose to do laps in their cars. Generally people behave but there are the usual candidates who command our attention. By that I mean the passenger(s) are drinking alcohol within the Liquor Ban area (\$250 fine), the vehicle is either unlicensed (\$100) or unwarranted (\$200), sometimes both, and the kicker for me: the driver is

WELL THE Valley has certainly picked up and on a learner's or restricted licence (\$100). The last two offences relating to the driver's licence also carry a penalty of 35 demerit points, and once you get to 100, your prize is a suspended licence for 3 months.

> The other restricted driver that is easy to spot is the one in school uniform, normally with a car-load of friends also in school uniform, either travelling down town at lunchtime or to a sports field of some description. These too are prime candidates for a fine and demerit points. For those parents out there reading this, please remember the graduated licence system is there for a really good reason. These young drivers are inexperienced and can be easily distracted or influenced by others in the vehicle, which on occasion can lead to disaster.
