ROLLING THROUGH HISTORY: A GREEN FOR EVERY GENERATION

The North East Valley Bowling Club is back in play! After a vote earlier this year to sell its North Road property, members reversed the decision, inspired in part by the Valley Project's support and a renewed vision for the club's future. Now seen as a valued local asset, the club is exploring ways to welcome new members, host more activities, and keep this 121-year-old hub of sport and social connection thriving for years to come.

The North East Valley Bowling and Lawn Tennis Club was formed on 26 February 1904 at a meeting held at North East Valley School. At the time, there was no land for a green or courts, but Gordon Brothers Nurseries offered the club a lease on part of their section, which included an orchard and a cottage. After discussions with Nathaniel Gordon's solicitors, the club agreed to a 10-year lease at £45 per year, with nine shillings per week contributed by the cottage occupant.



Within two months of its formation, tenders were called for the construction of the bowls green and tennis courts. The inaugural AGM was held in September 1904, with an annual subscription set at £1.05. The green was officially opened by (Cont. page #8...)

HOW TO SUPPORT BIODIVERSITY IN YOUR BACKYARD

Spring has arrived in North East Valley, and it's the perfect time to get into the garden. Why not make your space a haven for native wildlife?

A garden filled with native plants can attract birds, insects, and lizards, supporting local biodiversity and creating a thriving mini-ecosystem right outside your door. Even small gardens or balconies can make a big difference.

Start with native plants. Kowhai, harakeke (flax), and koromiko are excellent choices. Kowhai's bright yellow flowers provide nectar for tūī and bellbirds (korimako), while flax is a favourite for native bees and moths. Ground cover like native grasses and coprosma species offer shelter for skinks and insects.

Avoid pesticides, which harm native bugs and birds. Instead, let your garden find a natural balance. Leaf litter and logs provide habitat for native beetles and worms, which in turn

support birds and reptiles.

Water sources, such as shallow dishes or small ponds, help birds and insects stay hydrated, especially during dry spells.

Plant in layers—tall trees, shrubs, and ground cover—to mimic natural bush structure. This attracts a wider variety of species and offers safe nesting spots.

Even better, choose locally sourced native plants to support the unique biodiversity of Otago. The Open Valley Urban Ecosanctuary Propagation Nursery has a small supply of

locally sourced seedlings available right now! Message openvue@northeastvalley.org for more information. Supplies are limited.

By planting for nature this spring, you'll enjoy a garden buzzing with life, and play your part in helping North East Valley's native species thrive. -- Jennie Wagner-Gorton



FREE SOIL TESTING FROM SOILSAFE AOTEAROA

Do you ever wonder what metals might be in the soil around your home or garden? Soilsafe Aotearoa offers a free testing service for people across New Zealand to screen for contaminants like lead, copper, zinc, and arsenic. Simply collect up to five soil samples from different spots on your property, follow SoilSafe's guidelines, and post them for analysis. Within about eight weeks you'll receive a personalised report comparing your levels to national data, plus guidance for interpreting the results. WEATHERING IT TOGETHER: PLANNING FOR WHEN THINGS GET WILD

A diverse and enthusiastic group met Hopefully that won't be us, so we need We'll start meeting bi-monthly to coat the North East Valley Bowling Club on the 25th of September for the Valley **Hazards and Emergency Preparedness** Hui, held as part of Valley Fest, to learn about the hazards we face in the Valley and what we can do to get through together if disaster strikes.

lean-Luc Pavan. Natural Hazards Manager at Otago Regional Council told us about Lindsay Creek and what might happen during heavy rainfall. Chris Brooker from the Otago Civil Defence Emergency Management Group presented on emergencies we might face earthquakes, flooding, space weather! and how it is super useful if we are able to look after ourselves as a community as much as we can when these things happen. Steve King from the New Zealand Red Cross showed us how easy it is to make a household plan and had dinky little water-resistant grab bags to take, for copies of our important documents in case we need to evacuate.

The evening was a good reminder that Civil Defence Emergency Management is not some group of other people coming to help you, but rather a way of doing things before, during and after an emergency. If there's a big emergency, council staff and emergency services will be focusing their efforts on the worst affected areas.

to be civil defenders for each other while create a resilience and readiness plan they attend to people worse off.



To do this we're starting a new group to bring together people who are passionate about our community and emergency resilience. If you're keen to share your skills and ideas to build on our readiness and resilience here in the Valley, we'd love to have you on board! We'll put our heads together to come up with options for supporting our own Valley communities in an emergency, so that people can:

- get together in an emergency to find out information
- share skills and resources
- ask for and offer help
- register themselves as safe and leave messages for others
- · support each other over a cuppa

for the Valley. Some of the suggestions from the September hui included learning about:

- setting up a community-led hub
- · different hazards specific to our location and practical things we can do about them
- effective sandbagging practice
- how to use a fire extinguisher before you actually need to
- that old favourite—playing with VHF radios.

TENDING THE NEXT 10: DALMORE'S GARDEN AT A CROSSROADS

In April 2026, the Dalmore Reserve Community Garden will celebrate its 10th birthday!

The garden was started up by a group of local residents led by Kelley Allen whose vision was to provide somewhere peaceful and tranquil for kids to play, and where the local community could come together to learn about growing food. Hours of volunteer time were spent breaking in the 196m² of bare ground, clearing out bags of rubbish, glass, car parts and other unpleasant waste material. Over the years, many hands have worked to create a garden in an area that had needed some care and attention.

It has grown and changed a lot since then, and now that our fabulous lead gardener, Keith Moffit, has left the area, we need to think about how it might work for another ten years. I've been involved for nearly a decade myself, coming every fortnight (weather permitting), and now it's time for me to hang up my gloves. With Keith gone, just three of us are trying to manage this large area in-between hip replacements and full-time work.

So, the garden needs a new group to take it over. It is a time commitment, and this garden is not an easy one. The site gets *all* the wind and *all* the sun. You'll need to fundraise for plants—or self-fund—but there's a shed with tools and water on site. The Valley Project continues to support us as our umbrella organisation.

If we can't find anyone to take over, we need to look at what else could exist in the space. It needs to be more sustainable. We'd love to keep the front bee-and-flower garden going as it looks so nice from the street. Maybe the rest of the space could be turned into a foraging garden or an orchard.

If no solution can be found, the garden will need to be cleared and returned to the Council as it was—less the rubbish!

We know the garden adds a lot to the neighbourhood and would like to see it continue in some way. We'll be holding a community meeting in November to decide on next steps. If you're keen to be part of the solution and help shape the next ten years of the garden, please do get in touch.

coffee where the world is re-engineered in much discussion. These were usually held at the Botanic Garden café, but with its closure, meetings now take place at Mitre10 in Andersons Bay.Returning to the Gardens once renovations are complete is on the cards in future.

GUEST SPEAKERS OVER THE WINTER

Ann Donkin, a volunteer for Mercy Ships, spoke on her experiences on the Madagascar Hospital mission from which she recently returned. An outstanding presenter who kept the members captivated with her stories, some very sad, some of great happiness.

Antionette McLean, Alzheimers Otago, on the subject of Dementia, its early symptoms, how it affects the brain, what can be done once recognised. Accompanied with a screen presentation including an overseas study showing the affected brains from people who had passed on. Many of our members will know someone or even may have a family member affected by dementia.

Ginny Green, CEO Otago Hospice, who has considerable experience in nursing, oncology, and haematology, was joined by Fundraising Manager, Tina. She spoke on the 40-year history of hospice in Dunedin and Otago, starting in George Street some 40 years ago, and its shift to community-based home care. She noted that running Hospice now costs over \$11 million annually!

Nick Berriman, a successful agent with Bayley's Real Estate, spoke about his motivation to give back to his community, believing that the place we live in directly affects quality of life. He described founding the '100+' Club, inspired by an idea he got while in the USA. The Club supports local charities, with each giving a presentation at one of the four annual meetings. Members contribute \$100 per meeting, and a vote determines which charity receives the funds. The Club currently has 61 members.

Probus Interclub Bowling Tournament: Dunedin South Probus hosted a bowling tournament at the Otago Bowls Stadium on 10 July, with four clubs competing for the 'Dunedin Probus Club's Lawn Bowls Shield'. Last held in 2008, the competition featured some close games. Green Island Probus Club won, and the Shield is now set to become an annual event. Dunedin North Probus performed creditably, and the day ended with tea and the shield presentation.

Mid Winter Annual Luncheon: Our mid-winter lunch was again held after our July meeting at the very popular Concord Tavern. Members look forward to this as a nice outing for the club in the depths of winter. A warm friendly environment, great service, excellent food and time for some good chat and fellowship. It was well attended, and no doubt will stay in the social calendar for 2026.

DJ AUTO THINK TANK

Have you (or your wallet) noticed the cost of fuel these days? If your fuel economy is disappearing faster than tomato sauce at a family BBQ, your car might be trying to tell you something. Often, it's not your driving; it's the sneaky mechanical issues under the hood guzzling your gas. We thought we would discuss a few common reasons why your car might be using a bit more than it used to.

Low tire pressure is a silent fuel thief. Driving with saggy tires is like running in flip-flops—inefficient and whimsical sounding. Keep them pumped to the manufacturer's specs and your wallet will thank you. Have a look in the drivers door jamb for these, usually between 32-36psi. Keep in mind that more air equals less grip.

Faulty oxygen sensors are another culprit. They help your engine measure fuel use, but when they fail, the engine switches to a closed-loop mode with fixed settings—its least fuel-efficient state. This often triggers the engine light. Replacement sensors aren't cheap, but they often pay for themselves in fuel savings.

Dirty air filters are a common cause of poor fuel economy, too. Think of your engine trying to run a marathon while breathing through a scarf. The restriction from a clogged filter forces it to work harder and reduces performance. Anything holding your engine back can increase fuel consumption and cause premature wear. If you live down a dusty road, you're more at risk. Swapping a clogged filter takes just minutes and can save you plenty at the pump.

Worn spark plugs are easy to miss. Excessive spark plug gaps can stress your ignition system, leading to a weak spark. That weak spark means the fuel in the combustion chamber doesn't burn efficiently, and sometimes doesn't ignite at all, causing a misfire.

Grimy fuel injectors are much less common these days, but they can still cause trouble. Injectors can stick, block, or fail altogether. They're responsible for atomising the fuel to promote a clean burn, but if one sticks half open, or opens too slowly or for too long, it can cause excess fuel to enter the cylinder. In some cases, the fuel quantity overwhelms the ignition system and causes a misfire. This costs you fuel and costs the environment in excess hydrocarbons out the tailpipe. In-tank fuel injector additives can help, but sometimes the injectors need to be removed and flushed manually.

Not everyone has the budget for an electric car, and even hybrids can suffer from these issues. Keeping on top of the basics can help you stretch your fuel further and save money in the long run.

(...cont. from front page) Mrs Campbell, the Mayoress of North East Valley, and is now known as the Gemmell Green in honour of Ron Gemmell, a devoted member for over 50 years.

The 1920s were a successful decade for the club. In 1922, James Rigby won its first national singles title, and the new pavilion was opened that same year. In 1920, the Women's Section was formed after several earlier attempts had been opposed. Initially limited to wives and sisters of male players, this restriction was quickly lifted as the women's impressive performance in mixed tournaments proved they were more than "ornamental dispensers of tea."

By 1939, the club was planning a second green, which became the Rhodes Green, opening in 1940 at a cost of \$244.41. The club continued to grow, celebrating its Golden Jubilee in February 1954 with 121 members. Pavilion improvements in 1965 and the introduction of the indoor bowling club in 1966 helped foster a lively social atmosphere.

Thanks to a long-standing partnership with Speight's, the North East 10,000 International Men's Singles Tournament launched in 1990. This prestigious event ran for over 30 years every Labour Weekend, attracting top bowlers from New Zealand and Australia. In 2023, the tournament evolved into the Invitational Premier Mixed Pairs, offering a more inclusive competition.

In April 2004, the club celebrated its centenary and officially amalgamated its men's and women's sections. Today, the North East Valley Bowling Club remains a vibrant community hub, celebrating its rich history while embracing new beginnings and ensuring the green continues to be a welcoming place for sport, camaraderie, and inclusivity.

Lawn bowls offers a fantastic mix of light exercise, fresh air, and friendly competition. It's a low-impact sport that helps build strength, improve balance, and boost heart health—all while having a laugh with mates. Whether you're 8 or 80, it's a game anyone can enjoy! And it's

really quite simple: players take turns rolling biased bowls (which curve as they travel) toward a small white target ball called the 'jack'. The aim is to get your bowls closer to the jack than your opponent's. Players use strategy, aiming to block opponents or knock their bowls away. Games can be played one-on-one, in pairs, triples, or fours.

Why not roll up and give lawn bowls a try at the social nights starting 6 November? Bowls are supplied, entry is just \$5 (including a sausage sizzle), and kids go free! While you're there, take a peek at the club's welcoming social spaces and top-notch amenities available for hire. If you can't make it then, come along to the Pre-Christmas Market Day on Sunday 16 November, 12–3pm. As community spaces in the Valley region become fewer, the North East Valley Bowling Club is proudly reinventing itself as a versatile, vibrant hub where sport, connection, and community spirit all come together!

Digital or 'Jacquard' weaving is a method that involves turning intricate patterns directly into fabric using a computer-aided system to achieve complexity and ultimate precision such as that of fine tapestries!

Christine Keller, founder of Dunedin's LoomRoom, was an award-winning digital weaver before her New Zealand residence began twenty years ago. She had lost access to this technique until a lucky second-hand find in 2023.

Now she is asking the community to help her afford some extra components for a dreamy setup of this high-tech tool. The upgrade will increase production width from 35 to 70cm! EMPOWERING THE VALLEY THROUGH LEGAL KNOWLEDGE

Law Otago for the series of talks they recently delivered at The Valley Project. The sessions covered a series of three important topics; tenancy rights, family law, and employment rights. The clear, practical advice was greatly appreciated by all who came along.

Some of the key points from these sessions include:

TENANCY RIGHTS: When renting, always have a written tenancy agreement, pay rent on time, report repairs, and know that landlords must meet Healthy Homes standards. If problems arise in any area, seek advice early and keep clear records. If issues cannot be resolved, you can apply to the tenancy tribunal.

FAMILY LAW: The Family Court helps whanau resolve issues safely, using parenting agreements, mediation, and court orders; 'on-notice' for non-urgent matters and 'without-notice' for urgent situations. If you or someone else is in danger due to family violence, call 111 immediately. Police can issue shortterm Police Safety Orders, and the Court can grant longer-term Protection Orders to keep people safe.

EMPLOYMENT RIGHTS: Make sure your employment agreement is in writing and know your minimum rights. These minimum

INTEREST-FREE LOANS OFFER A LIFELINE FROM CRUSHING DEBT

For single mum, Emma, debt became future for me and my kids." a silent but constant source of stress. "I couldn't stretch my income any further," she said. "What started as a small loan for car repairs snowballed into something I couldn't control. The repayments were endless."

Like many today, Emma found herself in a spiral of high-interest debt that only deepened over time. Everyday expenses like food, school trips, and birthdays became major sources of anxiety.

VALLEY PROPERTY INSIGHTS



Your Questions Answered!

In contrast to my normal structured article, this month I'd instead like to cover a few common questions from readers. And forgive me if this is based more on my experience and anecdotes as opposed to hard data.

But first, here's a quick recap on the market. This chart is for the suburbs in 'The Valley' catchment. The main takeaway is that online property searches up to the 30th of September are approximately double relative to the same time last year. This reflects strong interest in local properties which should—all other things being equal—translate into strong purchaser demand.

Inquiries and Open Homes

In the last couple of weeks, there has been a noticeable increase in buyer activity, particularly from out-of-town people wanting to buy now—before they relocate to Dunedin in the new year. Also, there's some gathering momentum following the most recent drop in the OCR and mortgage interest rates. I have buyers with a wide range of budgets all the way up to two million. So, even if you're not quite ready yet to sell on the open market, it could still be worth having a chat now so that I can present your home discreetly as a 'pocket listing' to some of these time-sensitive buyers. You'd be surprised how many homes sell in this way without ever hitting the market!


Why aren't many prices advertised?

If you've been checking out homes, then you'll likely be frustrated by the lack of prices on many properties at the moment. And I totally understand. However, real estate 'agents' are generally working for the vendor; that's who ultimately pays the commission. Our job is to get the best possible price for the home. The local market has been "all over the place" for some time, making it difficult to accurately price a lot of properties. The risk in advertising a price for your property is that, if the price is set too high, it may deter a lot of people who would otherwise have been buyers. And if the price is set too low, while this may lead to a quick sale, you may be short-changed.

A couple of recent sales by our team have resulted in prices around \$50,000 more than the vendor was originally expecting. This money would have been left on the table with a fixed price. You should always ask the agent for some guidance on where the price is likely to sit. And, if you're a serious buyer, then make an offer at a level you're comfortable with. That's the best way to find out!

Verbal Offers?

I'm sometimes asked to submit a 'verbal offer' to a vendor, normally because the purchaser is trying to save time and test the water. A verbal offer is unlikely to be treated



seriously. Under New Zealand law, a contract for the sale or disposition of land (which includes residential property) must be in writing and signed by the parties to be enforceable. Also, salespersons (licensed real estate agents) must present all written offers to the vendor, regardless of the offer's terms, price, or conditions. So, the golden rule is, always put your offer in writing!

What about Auctions?

I recently spoke with some out-of-town purchasers who tried, unsuccessfully, to purchase a Dunedin property remotely by auction. Full disclosure: this was through another agency, so I'm only privy to the purchaser's version of events. These people were 'strong purchasers'; they were mature professional people, provisionally pre-approved for finance to a high level. However, they had to withdraw from bidding because they were unable to submit an 'unconditional' bid. They told me that the property eventually sold for \$50,000 less than they would have been prepared to pay. If that's the case, then it's a stark reminder of why an auction may not be the preferred marketing method for your property.

In the current New Zealand property market, even buyers who are 'pre-approved' for finance often cannot submit an unconditional offer, or bid at auction, until their bank has reviewed and approved the Sale and Purchase Agreement (S&P) for the specific property. This is because most pre-approvals are conditional, not absolute, and banks must ensure the property meets their lending requirements before giving final, unconditional loan approval.

'LEITH' IT BETTER: STUDENTS URGED TO GIVE A HOOT

North Dunedin's student streets and the Leith River are drowning in litter, frustrating locals, tourists, and volunteers. Glass, crisp packets, supermarket trolleys, furniture, even the occasional bike—all find their way into waterways and public spaces, tarnishing a city that likes to think of itself as clean and green.

Groups such as All Saints' Church and Sustainability Otago have been leading local clean-ups, and posters from Sea Otago are helping raise awareness. Students keen to pitch in can drop off chip packets at The Chip Packet Project bin opposite the University Chapel—they're upcycled into duvets and insulation for those in need. For larger waste, there are

North Dunedin's student streets and three official drop-off points listed on the EnviroWaste website.


There's also the ORC pollution hotline (0800 474 082) for reporting dumped items like trolleys or appliances, and the University's Sustainability Office welcomes volunteers keen to help along the Leith.

Waste "hotspots" identified across the city include Castle and Cumberland Streets, Toitū Otago Settlers Museum area, George Street, and North Road. More bins, better street sweeping, and education campaigns could all help reduce the 25,000 kilograms of plastic littered across New Zealand each day.

Keeping Dunedin tidy isn't just about appearance— it's about pride, safety, and community. So before you drop it, stop and "Leith it better" than you found it.
