# Pupils sew good in fight against plastic

PUPILS AT Dunedin North Intermediate have been giving up their lunch breaks in a sewing marathon to help others to choose not to use plastic bags.

When they were given boxes of recycled fabric the pupils came up with their own idea to turn it into reusable bags to create a bag library at the local supermarket.

Shoppers are welcome to take a bag from the library and use it for their shopping with the only stipulation that they bring it back with them next time or within seven days.

Pupil Birkita Ritchie says each bag takes four hours to make but it has been a lot of fun making the bags.

That represents the equivalent of almost one person sewing non-stop in a full-time job to get the bag library underway at Gardens New World.

"There are only 100 of them so please bring them back within seven days."

All the bags have been decorated with environmental messages.

Teacher Julie Butler says by the end of the year every pupil will have sewn at least one bag for the project.

Sewing the bags teaches pupils great sewing skills including zig-zag stitch, sewing two pieces of fabric together, making a strap and a gusset.

Anybody who loves the idea of this project is welcome to add more bags to the library to help keep it going and contribute towards a community effort to reduce plastic use.

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
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# Heroes show up at spring clean

# Top 10 tips to keep the drain just for rain

### CAR WASHING

- 1 Wash on grass, gravel or porous paving to filter the wash water
- 2 If washing the car on a hard surface, use a sand sock to direct wash water onto grass
- 3 Use a commercial carwash
- 4 Use two buckets one to soap the car, one to wipe off. Discard wash water down laundry sink

### HOUSEHOLD DIY

- 5 Wash water-based paint brushes in the laundry tub
- Re-use solvents or take to Green Island 'hazardous goods'
- 7 Clean spills quickly and don't hose onto areas that drain into stormwaters

### **BACKYARD DIY**

- 8 Disconnect downpipes while water-blasting or using moss killer on your
- Place a filter cloth over the stormwater drain to collect paint flakes and dirt
- 10 Sweep up debris and sediment from cutting bricks and pavers


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























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# World champs for aerobics tutor


We have been training up to three times a week and I'm so proud of all they have achieved in only six months of aerobics.

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
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SAS ART has been developing his marker pen graffiti style for 30 years. Through his art he takes the viewer

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# Over 30 bird species in Valley

I HAVE so far resisted writing

about birds. Some people argue that birds, being fluffy, cute and tuneful creatures, get more than their fair share of attention compared to other

But with the Open Valley Urban Ecosantuary (Open VUE) buzz going on at the moment, and Valley schoolkids doing backyard research into bird and predator numbers, I asked Mary Thompson, Birds New Zealand's Otago rep, to tell me a bit about the birds in the Vallev.

I was surprised to learn that there are over 30 species of birds that can be seen (or heard) in the Valley, about half of which are native. The other half was introduced to Aotearoa for different reasons. Some, such as mallard ducks, were brought for sport and some, like sparrows and starlings, were brought here to eat bugs – it turns out that our native birds weren't much chop at keeping insects off food crops because they weren't used to hunting for food in open areas. Other birds, such as chaffinches and goldfinches were introduced because they were pretty and reminded people of Britain. Many of these introduced birds, like chaffinches, blackbirds and starlings have thrived here, whilst declining in their

Spring is a great time for bird watching as they are busy building nests and foraging for food for their new chicks.

Many garden birds look small and grey/brown from a distance so it can be tricky to tell them apart. Often a bird's behaviour (is it flitty or foraging on the ground?), and who it hangs out with (is it alone, in a pair or in a group?), give more clues than its appearance.

Fortunately there are some great resources to

help you distinguish your chaffinch from your goldfinch- have a look at ww.nzbirdsonline.co.nz which has lots of good info, or pick up a copy of City Birds from the Otago Museum, written specifically about birds in and around Dunedin.

Once you have half an idea what you are looking at, you can even do daily or weekly five-minute backyard bird counts and enter what you see onto the Nature Watch website at naturewatch.org.nz. This website brings together people's observations of all sorts of critters around the country.

North East Valley is a natural gateway to Dunedin city from Orokonui Ecosantuary and the people behind the Open VUE project hope that more and more native birds will spill over into the Valley from Orokonui if we can make it more birdfriendly. But if we reduce the number of predators in the Valley will we get inundated with birds? Will kaka come and gnaw on our stuff (including fruit trees!) and will kereru grace our cars with more mini-cow pats?

Mary thinks we will see more birds, and hopefully more of the now rarer native species, but assures me we won't be overrun with some sort of Hitch-

esque bird population explosion. Bird populations are selflimiting, which means how many there are is constrained by things such as the amount of food available. Some species, such as blackbirds, are territorial so there will only ever be so many pairs in an area. —Helen Jack, Valley

# Garden camera footage to be analysed

IT'S ALL been posters, posters, posters at the Open Valley Urban Ecoscanctuary (Open VUE) project. We have learnt about different plants that might be growing in our gardens and at school, as well as the different birds that feed on them and live among them to create posters.

Many of the birds we have studied are ones that are attracted to the different types of bird feeders containing apple, fat, seed, sugar water or nothing – our control.

We are now re-visiting predators and what their presence might mean for the birds and plants we hope to enhance in the Valley. Yolanda van Heezik and Phil Seddon from the Zoology department at the University of Otago came to visit each of the classes involved in the project to help pupils' learning. We are studying the camera footage collected from gardens throughout the Valley to see if our predictions matched up with reality.

We will be performing some statistical analyses to





# Design nets student \$5000 prize

A BIRD feeder designed for use in home gardens around the Valley for an Open Valley Urban Ecosanctuary project has netted design student Harvey Penfold a \$5000 prize.

The Otago Polytechnic pupil won the prize in the Audacious Business Challenge 2017.

Harvey used his design skills and Otago Polytechnic's 3D printer to develop a platform for birds to use. A seed feeder hangs from the platform, and a nectar feeder hangs above it. A motion sensor triggers a camera nearby on another waratah to record bird visits to the feeder.

Challenges in designing the bird feeder included it had be installed in different properties on a sturdy steel waratah, it had to cope with the weight of a heavy bird such as kaka as well as small bellbirds and it needed to offer food for both nectar-loving birds and seed-eating birds. The feeders are a key component of the Valley Project's long-term project to make North East Valley an unfenced urban ecosanctuary, encouraging more native birds to visit and live there.

Local school children have been using the feeders in their research to gather baseline information about birds already in the Valley and what foods are most attractive to them. The Open VUE group is running the project with the help of University of Otago scientists, Mitre 10 sponsorship and support from the Orokonui Ecosanctuary.

Product Design Lecturer, Andrew Wallace, says it's great to see Harvey achieve success. "He's already putting his design skills to work on a real-world project which will have a positive environmental impact," he says. "We're delighted his work has been recognised with the top Audacious Award."
