Help grow the Valley's voice

DO YOU love sales? Are you passionate about the Valley? You might be the person we need to be the *Valley Voice* sales coordinator.

Our monthly community newsletter is a local institution and has been produced in various ways for more than 25 years. It is one of the longest-surviving community newsletters in Dunedin and is delivered to over 3600 homes in North East Valley, Opoho and Pine Hill communities reaching about 8000 people. It is vital to this community's sense

of social connection and cohesion and provides a vibrant platform for sharing local news, happenings and events.

The *Valley Voice* is an integral tool for our method of community-led development as it gives local people a platform to easily and efficiently share their events and activities with each other. The *Voice* also supports

dozens of local businesses by providing costeffective advertising that links them with customers in the area.

However, producing the *Voice* takes a lot of work, especially from our talented editor Edith. Volunteers put around 500 hours a year into writing, proof-reading, printing and delivering the newsletter.

It is a major investment for our community, costing about \$40,000 a year to produce. Ad-

vertising brings in about a quarter to a third of the cost, but we need to lift its

income and find some creative new ways to put the newsletter on a sustainable long-term footing.

Rotary is a worldwide organisation of people dedicated to community service.

In the last financial year, the North Dunedin club spent nearly \$15,000 on community projects.

Mr Campbell says he has lived in the valley for 40 years and would love to see a project in North Dunedin.

He is offering to apply for grants from Rotary Clubs worldwide, and

is seeking ideas around welfare, children, community or sanitation to meet the grant criteria, he says.

Earlier this year members were part of a team that built a child-friendly backyard and play area at a Dunedin Women's Refuge safe house. It took 18 months to raise the money for the play area, he says.

She already runs weekend tai chi classes at the Dunedin Chinese Gardens, but is gauging interest in running a mid-week class during the day. Future of Opoho Bowling Club looking positive with recruitment and hub

THE FUTURE of sports clubs in the city is being given a boost by the Opoho Bowling



Club, which has recruited the most first-year bowlers in Dunedin for the 2016/17 season and is now joining forces with Taieri Hockey.

Bowls New Zealand figures showed the Opoho Bowling Club registered eight first-year bowlers, well above the national average of 2.44 first-year bowlers per club. The club has 37 players including casuals.

Club president Tania Cassidy says it is vitally important for the sustainability of the club to continue to grow the number of registered bowlers. Opoho aims to be the number one club again next season and has also entered into a memorandum of understanding with the Taieri Hockey Club, she says.

"The Opoho Bowling Club and the Taieri Hockey Club will trial sharing of the Opoho Bowling Club clubrooms."

The memorandum meant the clubrooms would be used by approximately 160 sports club members throughout the year and realise the potential of the picturesque community resource, she says.

Knitting inspires

This month's Northern Artery Pop-up Gallery artist is Maree Tomlinson with her work *Testing, Testing ...1, 2, 3* of Indian ink on canvas.

I SET this series as a challenge to myself. It contains repetitive patterns with an over-emphasis on hand drawing. I wanted to use an unfamiliar art form and technique to extend my creative process.

I find stillness in the rhythm of repetition. This relates to my main art form, knitting. Stitch by stitch, repeating the same mini-movements, until I have created an item or object. I usually challenge myself to create three dimensional knitted works. Many of my items were included in the Northern Artery *Tea Cosies* and also *Hats and Hotties* charity auctions.

These current works relate to my knitting process because I used repetitive patterns and movements to get into the same frame of mind as when I knit. My true, effortless creative zone. The inspiration for these images comes from the vernacular references to Modern Art Deco. I wanted to use shapes particular to Art Deco and mix them up with bright colours. I love orange, green and blue.

I actively avoid drawing and painting. The challenge to take several large canvases and cover them in hand-drawn patterns scared me. To sit before a blank white canvas is much scarier than looking at a ball of wool. I decided to use Indian ink as I have never worked with that medium either. My lines are purposely hand-drawn in order to contrast with the strong graphic patterns.—*Maree Tomlinson*

A ROTTEN floor in the upstairs flat above Crusty Corner is in need of repair before the North East Valley café can re-open.

It has been six months since the café's owners were forced to shut the doors because of the rotten floor. It is hoped Crusty Corner will be back in business by the end of this year.

Crusty Corner owner Robert Barker says a fire-proof ceiling has to be put in.

He does not know when they will re-open and he must wait until the landlord finishes the renovations to the building, he says.

"It's life."

Work may need to be done out the back of the café to remove some of the top storey in order to get the floor in, but he is not sure what the landlord has planned, he says.

Robert has no major changes in mind for Crusty Corner which has operated in the valley since 1985.

The owners of the building located at 1 North Rd, and 2 and 6 Bank Street were Sui Ching Yip and Sons Trustee Limited of Roslyn were unable to be contacted for comment prior to publication.—*Julie Howard*

Neighbourhood Support strengthens communities

I HAVE no doubt there are many of you wondering if you still have a community

constable in the area of North Dunedin as it's several months since I put pen to paper.

Due to a some major leg surgery (minor surgery is

what other people have) at the end of last year, I spent several months changing the contour of the couch with my butt, firmly planted as I watched Netflix and Sky Sport.

During my rehabilitation process I spent hours at the physiotherapy pool, initially feeling a bit sorry for myself – until I saw people being lifted or winched into the pool with no real hope of long term physical change, unlike me.

For those of you who aren't aware of this charitable organisation, Neighbourhood Support encourages and supports communities to plan ahead to reduce local crime, respond quickly to emergencies and solve community problems.

Within the group there is a contact person who is the link for sharing information within the group and passing on important matters.

It's a given fact that communities with a Neighbourhood Support group fared far better in the aftermath of the Christchurch earthquake and that's due to their knowledge of those within the group and prior planning.

I am not encouraging us all to become 'curtain twitchers' who hit the panic button when a strange car pulls up outside. What I am suggesting and in fact encouraging you to think about is becoming a member and getting
