Bank loss would be devastating

A COUPLE of hundred signatures were collected in just four days for a petition calling on Westpac not to close its Gardens branch, but the co -owners of the Garden Seat Café fear it will be too little too late. Janice Bennett said the shock announcement from Westpac on 12 August about 19 bank closures across the country took people unawares and they had little time to organise a submission against the closure of the branch at the Gardens corner.

She believed local businesses and elderly people living in the valley would be most affected. Many customers at the café had



Lively night a chance to eye up candidates

VALLEY VOICE readers have the chance to eye up in person candidates for the Dunedin City Council at two election forums at Opoho Church.

The forums are timed for around when ballot papers arrive in letterboxes. Prospective councillors with surnames from Jo- to W have the chance to strut their stuff on Sunday 18 September from 7pm, and candidates from A to Je- on the following evening, Monday 19 September.

The forums for council candidates have a long tradition, having been held at the church or hall for each local body election for at least 25 years. Because of the large numbers across the whole city the candidates are now spread across the two evenings.

In 2013 most candidates were able to attend and the church was nearly full on both nights.

The forums are chaired by Opoho resident and church parish clerk Philip Somerville. They have a history of being lively, are strictly controlled with a 10-minute half time, and they finish by 9.10pm sharp. The church is on the corner of Signal Hill Rd and Farquharson St.

STV means you rank your preferred candidates, rather than ticking them—as many or as few as you choose.


The Otago Regional Council elections will use the First Past the Post system—whoever gets the most votes wins.



THIS IS also the closest bank for many people in outlying areas, such as Waikouaiti and Palmerston. Often busloads of older people come to the Gardens shopping area as it has everything they need in one small area - a supermarket, pharmacy, bank, post office and the café. The public were given less

than two weeks to make

submissions to Westpac on

the proposed closures. Submissions closed on 24 August. Decisions from Westpac are expected by the end of September. First Union communications advisor Morgan Godery says: "In most branches across the country people are feeling pretty gutted that this has come out of the blue."

Impressive line-up for Environment Festival

AN IMPRESSIVE line-up of speakers is leading Monday evening sessions at the Opoho Environment Festival this spring.

The festival and its sessions are at the church in Opoho, with the public warmly welcomed. It runs from September 5 to October 10.

Organiser Abby Smith says the festival coincides with the "creation" season in the Presbyterian Church, "where we focus on the wonder of the

world around us, and our relationship with it". Otago Museum director Ian Griffin, an astronomer, discoverer of minor planets and public spokesman on scientific matters, is among the speakers.

"We welcome everyone and anyone to join us in our journey of deepening understanding of our place in nature and the world," Prof Smith says. Visitors are also encouraged to view the environment-themed artworks that will hang around the church during the festival.

Opoho Presbyterian Church is on the corner of Signal Hill Rd and Farqharson St, on bus routes 11 (day) and 7 (evening) from the Octagon. The festival sessions all start at 7pm and are followed by tea and coffee.



Parkrun a worldwide weekly event

PARKRUN IS a free, fun, weekly timed 5km run/walk held every Saturday in 14 different countries, including 15 locations in New Zealand.

Dunedin parkrun has been in action for over two years and welcomes runners and walkers of all abilities (for safety reasons children under 11 must be accompanied by a parent or guardian).

Volunteers from the parkrun community put on the event each week and the meeting place is by the café in the Dunedin Botanic Gardens (9am in winter and 8am in summer). It's easy to take part: you just register at www.parkrun.co.nz, then print a personal barcode from the email you will receive and bring it along each time you run or walk. This will mean your time will be emailed to you shortly after you run or walk.

After you have registered once you can take part in any parkrun in New Zealand and anywhere in the world where parkrun is held, and as long as you remember to bring your personal barcode along you will receive an emailed time. After parkrun each Saturday lots of people like to gather in the Croque-o-dile café for a coffee and a chat so it's a great way to get to know other parkrunners.

From time to time we have special events such as Halloween and Christmas themes where you can dress up if you like, and on 22 October this year we will have our first tutu run. In January each year we also celebrate our anniversary with cake, and this year there was a special New Year's Day event.
