THE ANNUAL great Valley Spring Clean is coming up again this month. If you're in the mood for a clear out but want to ensure you're being responsible with what you no longer need, then the Spring Clean is for you.

This year, with support from Dunedin City Council, we are going bigger and better, especially in avoiding sending items to landfill. We'll have a team of dedicated volunteers assessing and diverting as much as possible away from the skip. Come and browse the swap shop for unwanted items, bring along paint, scrap metal, plant punnets and pots for re-use and recycling.

The North East Valley Normal School hall will have a clothes swap run by Te Rōopū Mānaaki and the Stitch Kitchen team will be on site to help you

repair or re-purpose clothes.

The Valley Community Workspace is hosting a Repair Cafe at 11 Allen St to help tackle those broken or faulty household items.

Join the weed warriors to tackle weeds on your own property, or team up with some neighbours or friends to clear out a weedy part of your neighbourhood. Just like last year, it's super-easy. Simply book a fadge (a tough 500L sack), fill it with weeds and have it taken away. Our fadges even come with a free kōwhai seedling.

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Foject Share your skills with others

THE VALLEY Project is teaming up with the Community Classroom to run a two-week Dunedin Summer School offering community education for everyone at the start of next year.

A similar event has been running in Oamaru for the past nine years and now the idea is coming to Dunedin.

Summer School facilitator Melissa Pronk expects there will up to 60 different classes on offer. Previously these have ranged from skills such as sewing, knitting and making bread; hobbies and interests such as keeping bees and chickens; health and nutrition such as how to grow food and make fermented food; sustainable education such as eco-building techniques; and processes such as how to build a composting toilet or get a resource consent approval for a straw-bale house – along with many others!

Melissa is looking for people in the community who are interested in running a class and sharing their skills.

The Summer School will run from 17 January to 2 February.

Exact details of classes, such as times, location and cost, are up to tutors, but the aim is to keep it affordable for the community. Each tutor keeps the class fees and pays a registration fee of between \$30 and \$50. Some people may choose to run their classes for

free or a koha. The Valley Project community rooms will be available as a possible venue to book. In Oamaru about 300 people took part in the event and Melissa is excited to see how it will go in Dunedin. "It is not only a chance to learn a new skill but also a chance to network and meet new people in your community."

There would be some purely social events during the Summer School, including an opening evening with nibbles and a film screening.

This is the chance to hear from the candidates to help decide whom to rank highly or, perhaps more importantly, whom to place low on the list.


The meetings will again be chaired by Philip Somerville, silly

What has changed in 100 years

Blacks Road Grocer owner Christopher Wilson has created an old-time atmosphere in the store selling many traditional grocer's items and homebaked treats.

I WAS on the hunt through one of our cupboards at the Valley Project recently when I came across a box full of old photographs of scenes of North East Valley.

Before I knew it, two hours had gone by as I looked through the pictures trying to visualise what a particular scene would look like in comparison today.

As a keen photographer I thought it would be a fun project to try to recreate old pictures in their modern context.

This picture, taken on the corner of Blacks Rd and North Rd, seemed like a good place to start, especially given the old-time feel recreated by today's Blacks Road Grocer.

The undated photograph (top left) was published in the Valley Voice's May 2011 History Notes column written by Gary Blackman.

Gary estimated the picture was taken some time in the 1920s. Melhuish, the dominant sign in the windows, was a Christchurch-based company known for its Worcester and tomato sauces, pickles and relishes.

The shop dates from the early 1900s, writes Gary, when John Thomson set up as a grocer. He was followed by his son Albert Victor Thomson until the early 1940s. The shop has gone through many changes of hands since then.

Today it is named Blacks Road Grocer and is owned by Christopher Wilson, who has taken it back to its vintage feel. Christopher is still in the process of updating the store's signage from the previous owner.

Just like an old-fashioned community shop, wares include handmade preserves, relishes and sauces, free-range eggs, cheeses, honey and 'real milk' in glass bottles, along with "good honest food, just like our mum or nana used to make".

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Five new Neighbourhood Support groups started

RECENTLY POLICE received information regarding two addresses in the Opoho community where criminal activity was distressing local

residents.

One house in particular had an occupant dealing drugs day and night, so nearby residents had to deal with people and cars turning up at all times of the day and night. Complaints were made to police, but to the community, on the face of it, very little if anything appeared to be being done.

Police, however, were collating information. Once they had built up the required amount of evidence, the address was duly searched and the occupant charged with a variety of offences.

Unfortunately this type of offending can lead to other offences taking place in the area. In this case there were related assaults and an aggravated burglary, all of which were dealt with by police and charges laid on all matters.

I think it's important to mention that if you see something, do something. I appreciate the power of social media and the sharing of information, but in the first instance, with this type of offending, TELL THE POLICE.

The 'non-emergency' number is 105 and this can be used to report historical offences or, as the name suggests, non-urgent matters. If police are required immediately, dial 111.



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Focus on broken things



Otago Polytechnic master's student Hayley Walmsley has an exhibition of her work on this week which features broken, discarded and free objects on the side of the road, many of them snapped on her walk to and from her home in North East Valley.

BROKEN THINGS, discarded and free objects on the side of the road and buildings in various states of disrepair have all been the focus of local resident Hayley Walmsley's lens.

She has snapped over 4000 images, mostly on walks to and from school or while out doing errands.

The project, titled *Suzie No Friends*, was undertaken for her master's of visual arts at Otago Polytechnic, and her work will be on public display until Friday 6 September.

North East Valley and north Dunedin feature heavily among the images, but Hayley also visited places as far away as Waimate, Oamaru and Christchurch.

What started out as documentation of furniture left out by students and others leaving the area, quickly led to thoughts about our consumerist lifestyle and a rapidly moving population, in which we leave home for school or a job but always seem to be looking for the next best thing.

Suzie No Friends seeks out the space between photography and how it can be used to represent the abandoned, forgotten and neglected in a world that is rapidly moving forward.

Suzie No Friends opens at the Dunedin School of Art Gallery, 19 Riego St, at 5.30–7pm on Monday 2 September, and all are welcome and warmly encouraged to attend. The exhibition finishes on 6 September.
