# 'Can you help us?'

THREE MUSLIM refugee families, one of whom lives in a house described as "not fit for human habitation", have turned to our community desperate for help to find new homes after pleas for assistance hit a brick wall with government and partnered support agencies.

One family has been given notice and the other two families live in appalling houses which have holes in the roof, wet carpets and insufficient heating. The families are distressed, panicked and gravely worried about their health.

homes for the long term in the valley.

All three families are desperate to stay in North East Valley after they were settled here by Immigration New Zealand into private rental properties.

They have made friends in the area, their children are settled at school and they don't want to uproot again to move across the city.

Since the terrorist attack on two mosques in Christchurch in which 50 people were shot dead, the families are scared. One family now sleeps all together on the floor after they experienced strangers turning up at night outside their home.

## Home 'unfit for human habitation'

SYRIANS AHMAD Al Ghanem and Hamda Al Salem and their six young children arrived eight months ago and live in dire conditions. "[There are] many holes in roof," Ahmad says. "My family [is] tired and sick."

The family has been struck with respiratory illnesses since they moved into their private rental property, and their four-month-old son has needed hospital care for respiratory illnesses.

Community member Mark Dyer who visited the family to see if he could do anything to help was shocked at the state of the house. When he lifted the carpet it was wet underneath, he says.

"The house is unfit for human habitation," Mark says.

Edinburgh Realty Property Management has released them from their tenancy but the family has nowhere to go. "Can you help my family find a new house?" Ahmad asks.

Palestinians Yacoub Altay and Nisreen Abuzahra and their three adult sons arrived only four months ago. They face a similar situation: for \$425 per week they rent a house with holes in the roof and floor, water leaking through the ceiling, and no working oven or washing machine.

"I talk with Housing New Zealand, Work and Income, Red Cross," Mr Altay says. "No one listens to me."

Mustafa and Zahra Allo and their eight children, who are from the Kurdish part of Syria, have been given notice to move out of their house due to renovation plans. Negotiations to remain in the home have been unsuccessful.

"I have been in this house for two years," says Mustafa. "I don't want to leave my community." His children are settled at school where they have made friends and are learning English fast.

Mustafa says people in the valley are kind and good and he feels safe. He wants stability for his family and not to have to move every six months.

"I have a big family. It's hard. It's hard for emotion. It's hard to make another friend. Everything is hard." The family has struggled to find a house that is not too expensive, and some landlords turn them down because they are a big family, he says.

## A 'heartbreaking situation'

**VALLEY PROJECT** manager Tess Trotter says it is a "heartbreaking situation". "The valley has truly become home for these families; now we need to find them houses."

North East Valley Normal School principal John McKenzie says if the children have to move to another community it will be unsettling and yet another transition for them to deal with. "Some of them have had lives filled with unsettling events."

"That's the hardest thing – to come into a new land and you have no money, no job and you are expected to house your family. If that falls over in the first year what have you got to fall back on? You haven't got a network of people who are in the know, and the language barrier makes it difficult. I think it's an issue for the city and government agencies. We can't ignore this."

Housing is something the Red Cross and government agencies should be "keeping an eye on" for 4–5 years rather than a few months, Mr McKenzie says.

Rental housing is a problem for many families in the valley, he says. Every few months the school has a family whose lease has expired, looking for a new home in the area.

Ms Trotter says the Valley Project is eager to connect with all relevant people and organisations to help address the big-picture issues and will hold a housing forum in the coming months.

"But for now we just want to find homes for these particular families who have come to us for help after trying all other channels. If you know of anything, please let us know – we can guarantee great long-term tenants who are fantastic, community-minded people."

## Immigration NZ 'committed' to help

A RED Cross spokeswoman said the Red Cross could not comment on housing "as this is all arranged by the government".

In an emailed response to questions, Immigration New Zealand national manager refugee Andrew Lockhart says Immigration NZ is committed to ensuring refugees are well connected and supported to settle into their new communities.

Immigration NZ works with partner agencies and providers to support refugees. "Needs are assessed by the Ministry of Social Development and housing is secured for all quota refugees before they leave the Mangere Refugee Resettlement Centre."

Housing New Zealand Corporation is responsible for matching public properties in the settlement locations for refugees, Mr Lockhart says. If Housing New Zealand Corporation does not have a current vacant property, or where the quota refugees do not qualify for public housing, a private rental is sought by Immigration NZ. In the established settlement locations, which includes Dunedin, the New Zealand Red Cross is contracted by Immigration NZ to support settlement in the community during the first 12 months, says Mr Lockhart. This includes a community orientation programme and connecting refugees to services they require such as doctor's appointments, English language, education and employment.

"Additional resources are being provided to ensure that quota refugees are able to live in safe, secure, healthy and affordable homes which best suit their assessed needs." Mr Lockhart did not address

> questions asking specifically why refugees would be placed into low quality housing.

# Heat Seekers drop-in clinics to start up

A SERIES of weekly drop-in clinics to help residents assess the health of their home are planned to start this month at the Valley Project.

The Heat Seekers: Healthy Homes in the Valley drop-in clinics will offer one-to-one support for people needing help to create a warmer, drier, healthier home.

Valley Project manager Tess Trotter says housing is a big issue for North East Valley and its surrounds, both in terms of a shortage of available housing for families and the quality of homes.

The Valley Project is frequently approached by people who are trying to find a home to rent or buy in the area, and by families struggling with cold, damp and related health conditions in their rented homes.

Valley Project community worker Charlotte Wilson says healthy homes workshops run by the project in the past have been popular, but this year they are trying a different approach with weekly drop-in clinics instead.

There will be lots of information available around low-cost and do-it-yourself changes people can make to increase the warmth

of their home, such as:

- the use of effective curtains and pelmets
- the upcoming insulation requirements for landlords
- Dunedin City Council Eco-Design free home assessements
- 'winterisation' of homes including draft stopping, lagging, ventilation, heating, mould prevention and treatment
- advocacy and tenant rights

The one-to-one approach will help people get more detailed information about the root causes of issues. For example, people who are concerned about mould might not realise it is related to ventilation and how they are heating their home, says Charlotte.

"We will be having guest specialists come in for some sessions, so keep an eye out in the Valley Voice and on our Valley Project Facebook page for when these are coming up."

The first clinic starts on Tuesday 16 April from 10am–noon at the Valley Project community rooms.—*Edith Leigh*

Nika says that she goes to lots of different playgroups with her son, but often finds herself talking to mothers aged 30 and up. "They are talking about going back to work and their husband's work, whereas I'm studying and my husband is studying, so it's a lot different."

"I would like to meet more mums my age to find people I can make friends with."

Valley Project manager Tess Trotter says there has been a small community-led group for young parents running at the Valley Project for some time but the facilitator recently stepped down. Now Nika has taken on the role to keep the group going.

"With a new facilitator and renewed energy, the

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
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# Local cop joins nationwide operation in Nelson

IN EARLY February I and 20 other staff from Otago and Southland were seconded to the Tasman District to assist with 'Operation Nelson Fires'.

On arrival in Nelson the scale of the immense operation was obvious. Civil Defence took the lead role, and Fire Emergency NZ, Urban Search & Rescue (USAR), police, St John, Red Cross, NZ Army and other local organisations and volunteers all took part.

Staff from these agencies came from all over the country with a staggering amount of equipment. We hit the ground running. Initial-

ly our role was to provide reassurance to those residents inside the cordon area who were packed and ready to evacuate should the need arise. Alongside this, we manned the cordons 24/7 to ensure only residents were going in and out, and guarded evacuated properties from the threat of looting.

The remainder of my time on the ground was spent on nightshift moving around the cordon areas, the Emergency Operations Centre and the Forward Operating Base (FOB) in Brightwater.

The FOB was used by all listed agencies prior to deployment into the field. Seeing fire staff coming back from a shift to this staging area, sweaty and covered in soot, was a sobering reminder of what we were there for.

There was an ever present threat being assessed hourly and the seriousness of the situation was evident during briefing when a particular wind was forecasted. A sophisticated drone operated by USAR provided real time information, reporting on underground fires burning at 600 deg C.

Catering staff were in various locations including hammocks near the kitchen, tents, and even a few on cots in the shower/toilet area of a local rugby club. These people rolled out of bed at 4am and got cracking without hesitation and with smiles on their faces, cooking up a storm. A terrific bunch and a credit to the army.

I guess in closing, it should be of comfort for us to know that in the event of a natural disaster or similar, every conceivable effort is made to safeguard life and property.

Men and women are out there fully prepared to do their utmost to achieve this. I'm proud to have played a very minor role in this successful operation.

Stay safe out there. Be careful on our roads and look after each other.—*Brendan Thomson*

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

# Local resident shares her passion for electric cars

A PASSION for advocating about climate change and some of its less talked-about effects, such as increasing ocean acidification, is what inspires North East Valley resident Pam McKinley to continue educating people about electric cars.

"What comes out of the back of your car goes up into the atmosphere, but comes down into our oceans," says Pam. "Electric vehicles are great for the environment and your wallet."

The McKinley family of four have had their electric car for four years and it does everything they need it to do, from running errands around town to taking a family trip to Wanaka.

Pam estimates it costs them \$10–\$12 per week to recharge their car.

Pam is organising electric vehicle events around Dunedin as part of the Better NZ Trust Leading the Charge Electric Vehicle Road Trip 2019, in which electric vehicle owners and enthusiasts travel from Cape Reinga to Bluff. They will be stopping over in Dunedin


