Our big backyard ecosanctuary




Hosted (Predator Free Dunedin), Eleanor Linscott, and our Open VUE coordinator, Clare Cross centre.

Holiday Trap Workshops

KEEN TO help out the native flora and fauna in the valley by getting that pesky rat or possum out of your

backyard? Come along to the Valley Project on Saturday 18th July and join in a Trapbox building workshop if you've got a pesky rat, or a Trapinator training workshop for the possums!

Please register for these workshops by 10th July to collect your preworkshop chew card pack from the Valley Project. Register by calling by the Valley Project or completing our online form bit.ly/trapworkshop. Set up the chew cards in your backyard for 5-7 days prior to coming along to the workshop(s). Bring your chewed cards to the workshop(s) to find out what you have got in your backyard!

Trapbox building and T-Rex rat trap workshop

DROP IN between 10 am and 12 pm to assemble your box and learn how to use a T-Rex rat trap. Great if you can bring a hammer but we will have some spare. Please also bring your own container for the trap bait if you would like to take some away with you.

Note: This Trapbox Building workshop is only for urban properties in Opoho, Pine Hill, Liberton, Dalmore, North East Valley and Normanby. Trapbox kitset, plus one T-Rex rat trap and peanut butter bait: \$10 to keep or \$8 with a Community Service Card.

Trapinator Possum trap training workshop

COME ALONG at 12:30 pm to meet the City Sanctuary team who will show you how to install, bait, set and reset a trapinator trap to control possums. We will begin at 12:30pm with a demonstration followed by time for questions and trap registration.

Trapinator trap, plus a non-toxic paste bait (Ferrafeed 213): suggested koha of \$20 for the workshop, hiring of the traps is free.

House fire research

HAVE YOU had an accidental house fire in the past 5 years? Researchers from the Injury Prevention Research Unit at the University of Otago are currently conducting a study to investigate the behaviours and experiences of people who have been involved in an accidental house fire. People aged 18 years and over are invited to take part in a face-to-face, telephone, or zoom/skype interview. Interviews are likely to be 30-60 minutes long and will ask people to reflect on their experiences and responses to the fire event. The researchers are particularly interested in talking to anyone who sustained an injury because of the fire. All people who take part in the study will receive a \$30 supermarket voucher in recognition of their participation. It is hoped that information on how people behave in response to house fires, and their reasons for engaging in these behaviours, can be used by Fire and Emergency New Zealand to help prevent fire-related harm. 

Safety first on streets please

WITH DAILY events returning to relative normal in the wake of Covid19, it's probably

timely to remember that not all of our community have come out of this unscathed.

There will be those amongst us still suffering the financial effects even with the Government wage subsidy, and this can have a flow on effect with regard to family harm and the general wellbeing for all concerned.

I have no doubt that there will be people in situations now, that prior to Covid19 never thought would happen to them. It's so important to remember along with Government agencies, there is support available from the likes of the Red Cross, Salvation Army, Neighbourhood Support and the Valley Project to name a few, that can assist affected families or individuals.

From a personal perspective, the greater North East Valley area abided by the lockdown rules with only a few complaints having to be acted on by means other than education. Verbal abuse to supermarket workers led to several trespass notices being issued, and one individual spent a week at Her Majesties pleasure for theft from a motor vehicle while breaching lock down.

On the subject of crime, Police are still wanting information regarding a burglary from a Barclay Street address where a large amount of property was stolen. Distinctively leading from the address and up into the Pine Hill area was a trail of white paint. The Southern District Police Facebook page has further details regarding this crime so if you have any information please call 105 or anonymously through Crimestoppers 0800 555 111. File 200229/2900.

Lastly, some speeds recorded down North Road of late are wearing a bit thin. If you are travelling in excess of the speed

limit, in particular past a school, you can expect to receive an infringement notice. Likewise, let's do as the sign says with regard to Stop signs. There is a clear difference between them and Give Way signs. Blacks Road and Calder Avenue in particular have come to notice so expect a Police presence in the area to safeguard not only other motorists, but the little ones and their mums and dads crossing these streets.












Valley surrounds inspire artist

Soil improvers sought at community garden

In preparation for spring planting, the garden committee would like to put a call out for raw materials to help our soil - we have a lot of heavy clay soils present! Here is what we are looking for:

1. Gib Board Offcuts. We can use the gypsum to break down clay. It needs to be New offcuts, i.e. not painted / wallpapered / glued or anything that could contaminate the garden. Only GIB standard grade please, eg not GIB aqualine or other special GIB products. Also we can use old GIB that has sat around unused for a long time, perhaps you have some in a shed or garage that you don't plan to use and wouldn't mind donating?

2. Topsoil. Topsoil is needed to raise the garden beds higher, to improve the existing topsoil and add extra drainage over the heavy clay soils underneath.
