# **Old fashioned milk back**

SOUTH OTAGO milkman and farmer, Andrew Moir, is run off his feet with vats of full-cream milk, and his only Dunedin customer is the city's newest grocer, Christopher Wilson, who he delivers to in North East Valley every week.

Christopher, the new owner of Blacks Road Green Grocer, heard about the milk from a friend.

Andrew says he has 22 winter milking cows at Benhar near Balclutha and says he is putting through about "250 litres of milk a week to Christopher's shop". The milk arrives at the greengro-<br/>cer on Tuesdays and Fridays. Christopher, who is originally from Dunedin and is a qualified interior designer and gardener, says the milk helped him to get started when he decided to use his savings and take the plunge to buy the greengrocer's business in North East Valley in March.

His ethos for the shop is to buy locally, such as lettuces from the Taieri, and he says an important part of the business is to buy small amounts every day. Future plans include a cafe-deli at the shop.

Christopher is keen to get involved with the local community and is also the newest member of the Valley Project executive board after the resignation of previous members Nerissa Kaa and Jim Ross.—Julie Howard

# Kai Share meets a need in the valley

**NEW FAMILIES** with young children are increasingly accessing the Valley Project's small food box service, which has made up nearly 3000 food boxes since it started in 2014.

The Kai Share weekly food box service is run by volunteers twice a week with the support of Dunedin Food-Share.

FoodShare rescues perishable food and delivers some to the community rooms every Friday.

Kai Share volunteer coordinator Tamsin Greer said there are a lot of new families accessing the service twenty this year - and many have young children.

A total of 300 food boxes have gone to 40 different families this year.

Kai Share helps people in a wide range of circumstances. Everybody has individual reasons for why they need help such as single parents, bills, people who had recently moved into the area and low incomes, says Tamsin.

A small team of volunteers helps out on Thursdays and Fridays each week. Mrs Greer says on Thursday mornings she makes up the list for that week and helps anyone who wants to access the service. On Friday afternoons the supplies from FoodShare arrive and the boxes are made up ready for recipients to collect.

"Anyone can come in and get help."

"When they sign up we allow up to six weeks' assistance at a time just so we have space for others to apply."

Some recipients also volunteer to help out. Kai Share was nominated for the 2017 Trustpower Dunedin Community Awards Kai Share has given out 2985 food boxes since 2014. In 2016 the number of food boxes reached it highest to date – 1225 that year. Kai Share operated Thursdays 9–11am and Fridays 11.45 –2.30pm (excluding three weeks over the Christmas period)..*—Julie Howard*

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# School pupils to use science at home

A CENTRAL aim of the Valley Open Urban Ecosanctuary project is to combine science and education at local schools in North East Valley.

Classroom sessions will introduce children to the potential predators and birds that might be visiting their gardens, and lead them through data collection at home and data analysis in class.

We will finish with an inter-school and community hui to allow children to share their results with each other and the wider community.

Families of participating children also have the opportunity to be involved in the data collection process and will learn about the different predator and bird species visiting their gardens. We will map participating children's gardens to find out the different plant species growing there and whether these plants may attract different bird species.

We will have monthly updates on the classroom

programme in the *Valley Voice,* so keep an eye out to see how the children are progressing.

We would also love to offer you the opportunity to be involved in the project. We have created a Nature Watch page for the Valley Urban Ecosanctuary where you can record your own observations of birds (or plants) in your garden.

Even if you are unable to identify the species, we would love to hear about your feathery or floral encounters.—*Clare Cross*

# Community garden not affected by lead contamination

NORTH EAST Valley Community Garden founder Richard Tozer is confident produce from the gardens is safe to eat after a geoscience survey revealed high lead levels in the soil at North East Valley Normal School.

The level of lead in the sample from the school is above the Ministry for the Environment standard for residential land where there is some consumption of home-grown fruit and vegetables, but it is lower than the standard for recreational areas.

The community garden is in the top

paddock behind the school.

Richard says that before the community gardens were established, soil testing was done in several different places around the site. All testing came up clear of any contaminants.

Roofing iron used for plot edges was later tested and shown to be also free of lead paint or contaminants.

About 70% of soil material in the plots is from community garden-generated compost.

"I feel confident that the produce from the garden is safe to eat."

School principal John McKenzie says Public Health South has advised that the risk to children is very low. Children would have to ingest a lot of soil before they could become ill.

Bare soil at the school has been covered and teachers have talked to pupils about playing with soil and washing their hands after playtime.

The results were from one sample of soil taken from the school last year and the school has asked for further assessment to be carried out urgently.

## Let the night sky out-twinkle street lights

THE LONG nights of the Matariki season are great for

evening star gazing.

We've been snooping on Jupiter and some of his moons in the east before bed time, and the Southern Cross is a constant companion behind our house.

But, as anyone who has spent a clear night in the boondocks will know, cities are not the best places to appreciate the marvel that is the night sky. Some, such as Otago Museum director and astronomer lan Griffin, argue that the night sky has gradually been stolen from us by pollution. And not just the smoggy type – light pollution from streetlights are one of the biggest culprits. Dunedin's street lights need renewing and starfriendliness is one thing that the Dunedin City Council is considering in its choice of new lights. The council is currently trialling LED lights, which use much less energy than the current

which use much less energy than the current low-pressure sodium lights, on Lynn St in Maori Hill. These LED lights are designed to direct the light downwards, so it shines only where it is needed on the roads and footpaths, not to the sky or into your house.

But there is more to the story than just energy efficiency and light shielding. The colour of street lighting can have an effect on the wellbeing of many creatures, including us. The bluer or 'cooler' a LED streetlight is, the less it costs to run, but all that blue light at night is not good for our body clocks or immune systems.

Our brains interpret blue light (including that beaming out of our tablets and smartphones)

as 'wake up, it's morning time' which is not conducive to sleep or important chemistry going on in our bodies at night.

The more orange or 'warmer' a streetlight is, the more it costs to run, but the better it is for us and other urban wildlife.

The city council have yet to make a decision on which colour light to go with, but the difference in running costs between the different colours is rapidly decreasing, so hopefully a warmer colour will be a no-brainer.

Auckland Council even has a dimmer switch on their new street lights so that they can be turned way down low in the very early hours. The DCC is also considering this option, but it is more expensive and needs to be weighed up against safety factors.

A decision should be made within the next year, and it will then take 3-4 years to install the 15,000 new streetlights across the city. The DCC haven't yet decided which areas will get the new lights first, but perhaps the Valley's bid to become an urban ecosantuary will put us nearer the top of the list for dark sky and wildlife-friendly lights.

Ian Griffin says that the night sky is as precious as our native flora and fauna, and I tend to agree with him. Once installed, the new lights of Dunedin's city scape may not be as pretty and twinkly as they once were, but if we look up, our night sky will hopefully far out-twinkle the people-made lights and be what it should be, dark.—North East Valley scientist Helen Jack
