

Yoga for mums with babies

Tuneful Tuesdays build on children's natural sense of rhythm

CHILDREN NATURALLY sing all the time and a valley music group aims to build on their innate sense of rhythm.

Coordinator and professional children's storyteller Kaitrin McMullan says she loves to see children and parents play with music and sounds. At the Terrifically Tuneful Tuesdays music group they explore music concepts such as rhythm (beat), tempo (fast and slow), dynamics (loud and soft), as well as moving to music, fingerplays and puppet fun.

The sessions are designed to be creative and based on voice. They don't rely heavily on taped music and parents learn songs they can sing with their children at home or in the car.

The group is multicultural and they also learn songs in children's native languages. "There is lots of spontaneous creativity," says Kaitrin. It is open to all pre-schoolers from birth through to age five.—*Edith Leigh*



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

Our voices: New columnist shares history

GREETINGS ALL.

I want to begin with the purpose of this history column: to provide a platform to share 'our stories', for our own collective prosperity.

This area is rich in both geographical and social history. The

landscape has been woven together from the lives and stories of the past, that weave the present fabric of this community and neighbourhood today. It is of value to draw on and preserve for future generations.

As a descendent of seven generations reaching back to the Northern Cemetery, I have an avid interest in local history, genealogy and conservation.

My ancestors arrived in the 1860s at Port Chalmers, as did many others. Mr John Kyle Murray, who stands proudly draped in tartan in the Smith Gallery at the Toitū Otago Settlers Museum, my great-great-great grandmothers' brother, arrived first (that I know of) and other family followed suit. He had varying occupations, including one at the George Hotel in Port Chalmers in the 1940s, which is now demolished.

Another family link is the Stokes of Leith St who had a dairy factory on the corner of Grange and Albany Streets. Both their residence and business buildings have gone with time and development. The milk was delivered on horsedrawn carriages.

Our family has photos of these, snapshots of a time out of living memory, but within living family lore.

By sharing stories of different cultures, backgrounds and times, we can collate a collective understanding of this unique community.

This is an opportunity to share stories and photos, both your own and those of others. Each has its own meaning, significance and connection to this place.
