THE HEALTH minister and the Dunedin's mayor will be addressing landlords, property managers and rental tenants at this year's Valley Project Healthy Winter Rental Homes seminar.

Valley Project community coordinator Charlotte Wilson says that the project runs workshops and talks every year to help valley residents find useful information and resources to increase warmth in their homes.

"Many renters, however, have reported that little can change without their land-lords being onboard."

Government legislation requiring all rental properties to have ceiling and under-floor insulation by 2019 will soon come into force.

Therefore this year the project is providing information, incentives and resources for landlords, property managers and tenants to help make rental properties warm and dry for winter, Charlotte says.

The event, at Diesel's Bar and Bistro on North Road, will start with about half an hour of speakers, including Minister of Health David Clark, Dunedin mayor Dave Cull, and Dunedin City Council Cosy Homes Trust project manager Jordana Whyte.

Other guests will include representatives from Techno Bond, Smart Energy Solutions and the Dunedin Curtain Bank.

Afterwards there will be an opportunity to mingle and ask questions with the speakers and guests present.

Nibbles will be provided and drinks may be purchased at the bar. Diesel's will be putting on a special menu for the evening with a main course and either a drink or dessert for only \$15, or \$20 for a main course, dessert and a drink.

There will also be a raffle with winterrelated prizes on offer. The seminar is from 7–8pm on Friday 11 May.

Tackling energy poverty with LEDs

THE VALLEY Project has 300 energy-saving LED

bulbs to give away to valley residents who struggle to pay their electricity bills.

Energy-efficient lightbulbs are a fast, easy, no-sacrifice way to bring down electricity use in homes, but they are often considered too expensive to install.

The bulbs were donated by Flick Electricy Co., a small Wellington-based tech start-up that describes itself as New Zealand's fastest growing electricity retailer.

Flick Electricity Co. community and campaign manager Sam Young says thousands of New Zealanders still have to choose between feeding their kids and heating their homes. "This is unacceptable. It's not the sort of New Zealand we want to live in and we reckon that every one of us has an opportunity to change this."

Replacing standard bulbs with LEDs will

slash 80% of household lighting costs, which for an average home can amount to over \$300 of savings every year, Sam says.

Valley Project community coordinator Charlotte Wilson says the bulbs will be given out on a first-come, first-served basis to those who meet the criteria. People need to live in the valley area, including North East Valley, Opoho and Pine Hill, to apply.

Each household would be given sufficient bulbs for every light socket in their home to make a meaningful impact.

If your household struggles with electricity bills you can apply by filling out the form at bit.ly/valleyLEDs, or come in to the Valley Project office to fill out a form.

This is a great initiative and we appreciate the opportunity to be a part of helping families and people living in the valley, says Charlotte.

Hit the nail on the head this Mother's Day

CAN YOU hit a nail two times out of three?

If the answer is yes, you can come and build a rat and mice trapbox for Mother's Day! (And you'll be helping out the birds and insects in the valley, too!)

The Open Valley Urban Ecosanctuary Group, Open VUE, is running two workshops for assembling outdoor trapboxes that are safe to use in your backyard.

These boxes have a small entry at one end that allows mice and rats to access the basic spring-wire snap trap. Trapboxes are design to be placed in your yard where rats and mice feed, near compost areas or fruit trees, and facilitate their termination in the enclosed trap.

They ensure a quicker death then poison, and dead rats and mice do not end up getting smelly behind the fridge or in the wall. You will, however, have to dispose of the dead rodents.

It's been a great summer for swimming at the beach, but also for the growth of rat and mouse populations. So to help the skinks, wetas, insects, plants and the birds' eggs and chicks next spring, let's reduce the rat and mouse population now. It may also stop them moving into your house (no guarantees).

The timber and mesh is cut to size, nail holes are pre-drilled and nails are supplied. If you can bring a hammer that would be great, but we will have some spare. We will probably even have pre-built trapboxes available.

A trapbox kitset with one rat trap and one mouse trap costs \$10.

The cost is \$8 if you have a Valley Card, a community services card, or want to build three or more trapboxes yourself.

Join us on Saturday 12 May or Sunday 27 May from 2–4pm at the Valley Project community rooms next to North East Valley Nomal School, 262 North Road.

Bird feeders, pest chew cards, tracking tunnels, trapping information and friendly advice will also be on offer.

For Carla Sanders, spending time in her Pine Hill garden with her "fluffy-butt" heritage chickens is a great way to get some fresh air, sunshine, exercise and reflective and meditative time. It was a hobby that began after a chance visit to a bird show three years ago . . .

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Sounds Nor'Easterly feature in doco

A FEATURE film that includes a concert performance by the North East Valley choir, Sounds Nor'Easterly, has been selected for the Doc Edge International Documentary Film Festival and will premier in Wellington and Auckland during May.

What is so impressive is that the film has been selected from over 900 entries.

Dealin' with the Devil is a film produced, directed and edited by a Dunedin film partnership, North East Valley's Sue Marshall and Phil Davison.

Sue was instantly attracted to the project by the obvious passion that Phil and many others had for ensuring that the life and music of Kiwi blues musician, Ralph Bennett-Eades, took a permanent place in New Zealand's music folklore.

Ralph regularly played in Dunedin, and Phil is a well-known musical identity in the valley.

"I think the film succeeds because it's a very personal statement: it's a very heart-felt film, and, just like life, it's both funny and tragic," says Phil.

Sue says the choir performed perfectly. "Asking the choir to contribute their time for rehearsing and performing in front of cameras was a gamble but everyone was keen. Clare Adams, the choir master, spent many hours ensuring the sometimes difficult music score was performed perfectly."

Dunedin audiences should be able to View on Demand during the festival via the website and, fingers crossed; it will be screened in Dunedin later in the year.

SEWING IS being used as a tool to help bring community together 'one stitch at a time' to make a bag library of quality, reusable shopping bags and to help people upcycle their garments into favourite pieces.

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STEEP combines tea, coffee and location

IT MIGHT have new owners and a new name but the café inside the old post office building on North Rd is still serving the same great GRID coffee.

The new name, STEEP Café, is simple pun that incorporates the words coffee, tea and the café's location close to the steepest street in the world, Baldwin St.

Co-owner Martin Haanen says he has a passion for supporting local business. While their coffee beans are imported, the coffee is freshly roasted by the GRID in Dunedin.

The café owners are currently looking for community feedback on their new logo designs with an opportunity to win a newly-designed Baldwin St t-shirt. They are also doing some redevelopment inside the café to help with extending their food menu and expanding their range of merchandise for tourists visiting Baldwin St,.

STEEP Café sells both GRID blended coffee and their own Royal Thai Coffee. The Royal Thai coffee is roasted from single source AA graded Arabica organic coffee beans, which are hand picked to avoid waste and harvested from family farms in the mountains of northern Thailand.

"People say Fairtrade, but our Royal Thai Coffee is better. What is special is we know the farmers personally." The coffee also has a strong connection to the King of Thailand who helps farmers in the area grow non-opium crops to promote family welfare and only al-

lows each family business to hold single small blocks of land so they cannot be bought up by large corporations.

Martin's business partners Donald and Suzanne Lewis have their own charitable trust operating in Chiang Mai in northern Thailand which is how the coffee connection came about.

"There is a lot more story to tell inside STEEP Café," says Martin. "Come on in and watch the story unfold."

Former GRID owners Nicky van der Jagt and Gavin Mockford moved the GRID Coffee Roastery to a new premises in Eglinton Rd to enable them to concentrate more on coffee roasting rather than the café side of the business.

Atmospheric escalators in the valley

ON WARM summer evenings when we eat in our sunroom, Mr Jack, who is far more observant than me, will often say, "Hey, look at those birds up there, catching a lift!" – and I'll

look up to see birds spiralling above the valley.

It's hard to see what sort of birds they are as they are so high up, but any bird twitcher will tell you they are soaring birds – karoro (black-backed gulls), tarāpunga (red-billed gulls), and kāhu (native harrier hawks).

But what sort of atmospheric escalator are they catching a lift on? Birds will often make the most of ridge-lift – riding on air that is being blown up over a hill, and there are plenty of those around here.

But these birds are circling around the middle of the valley, which makes me think they are catching a thermal. Not the kind that you recently had to fish out of the cupboard for the first time since September, but the meteorological kind.

Thermals are rising air currents created when the ground is warmed by the sun. The warm ground heats the air directly above it, and because the warm air is lighter than the cooler air around it, it rises up as an invis-

Calm weather in the summer is the ideal time for thermals to form over dark surfaces like open areas of asphalt or newly ploughed fields. There aren't many large areas like this in the valley, but perhaps the small quadrangles of asphalt at North East Valley Normal School or the dark bitu-

men strips of North Road and the roads around Selwyn Street create enough heat to form small thermals.

The other thing I wanted to know was: where are these birds coming from and where are they going to? Like humans, the gulls often come into town for dinner, and will use a thermal to catch a free ride back up and over the hills to their nests along the coast.

The harriers, on the other hand, are likely to be opportunists passing through town looking for tucker, on a beat that can stretch for hundreds of kilometres. Individual harriers have been tracked travelling the length of New Zealand.

Harriers are relatively recent New Zealand colonists, arriving here from Australia after human settlement, and they are one of only a handful of native bird species thriving today.

Harriers are designed for using thermals and hunting from above, and we provide them with lots of dead stuff to eat, like road kill and unfortunate farm animals.

Winter and duck-shooting season arrive hand-in-hand; there will be few or no thermals to catch, but I'm sure the harriers will be using what ridgelift they can to catch a ride inland to clean up the shooters' leftovers.— North East Valley scientist Helen Jack

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
