Warmer homes for free



Free ceiling and underfloor insulation is now available to home owner-occupiers who live in designated 'warm-up zones' indicated in the three darker shades of orange on the map above. To find out more come and see Charlotte Wilson at a drop-in clinic on Tuesdays, 10am–noon.

HUNDREDS MORE homes in North East Valley have become eligible for installation of free ceiling and underfloor insulation and a vapour barrier as the government extends the 'warm-up zones' to include more areas.

Valley

The Warmer Kiwi Homes insulation subsidies are available to home owner-occupiers who live in a designated warm-up zone.

Home owner-occupiers who have a community services card or a Gold Card with community services card endorsements are eligible regardless of where they live.

Previously parts of Liberton, Pine Hill and North East Valley were included, but the warm-up zones have now been extended to include most of the north side of North Rd.

Warmer Kiwi Homes is a government programme which covers two-thirds of the cost of insulation and a vapour membrane. In Otago local funders pick up the rest of the cost to make the programme entirely free for those who qualify. Cosy Homes project manager Jordana Whyte is excited about the expansion of the programme. "We estimate an additional 1200 homes across Dunedin are now eligible."

In un-insulated homes an "enormous" 30-35% of heat is lost through the roof and 12-15% through the floor.

"Most people will notice a difference straight away when insulation is installed," says Jordana.

The Warmer Kiwi Homes programme will also soon be extended to include heating appliance subsidies as well, in which two-thirds of the cost of installing a wood burner, pellet fire or heatpump will be subsidised up to a limit of \$2,500 + GST.

Exact details of the heating subsidies are not yet available, but the government has signalled the start date will be in July.

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THE VALLEY Project's Kai Share food box

programme now has a dedicated space for storing food, thanks to a new shed donated by Bunnings and installed by members of the North Dunedin Shed.

Kai Share volunteer coordinator Keri Eastwood says the new shed will increase the capacity for storing food and improve the way it is stored, as well as enabling the team to cater for seasonal fluctuations.

It will also make accessing and loading/unloading food easier for the Kai Share team.

A big shout out to Bunnings who donated the shed and wood for the base and shelving inside, as well as the North Dunedin Shed whose members put together and installed the building.

The Kai Share programme has the capacity to provide up to 25 boxes of food each week for emergency help. It is only available for residents who live in the valley area (North East Valley, Pine Hill, Liberton, Dalmore and Opoho).

Insulation in rentals

THIS MONTH WE TAKE A CLOSER LOOK AT THE NEW INSULATION REGULATIONS FOR RENTAL HOMES

NEW RENTAL regulations are coming in July. If you are a renter or landlord it is a good idea to check if your house is up to standard. From 1 July this year ceiling and underfloor insulation in rental properties is required where reasonably possible. Exceptions may include where there is not enough space under the floor or in the ceiling. It is the landlord's responsibility to meet the regulations.

If the ceiling insulation was installed before July 2016 then it should be at least 70mm thick. If the insulation is still to be installed, or was installed after July 2016, it needs to be at least 120mm thick. It must be in good condition and without gaps.

For the underfloor, most insulation products except foil will meet the requirements. If the

house does have foil this will have to be removed and replaced with underfloor insulation. It is illegal to repair or replace foil yourself due to the risk of electrocution.

All tenancy agreements since 2016 should include an insulation statement. If this does not show the required insulation, or you are concerned the insulation doesn't meet the requirements, try to have a look if possible. If there is an issue, let Tenancy Services know and they will investigate. Landlords can be fined up to \$4000 and the money is usually paid to the tenants.

In the next couple of years further regulations are being introduced, such as requirements to have bathroom extractor fans and a kitchen rangehood, sorting drainage issues, reducing draughts, and having a heater in the lounge suitable for heating the space to 18°C.

THE PROGRAMME does not include rental homes, but new regulations come into effect on 1 July in which rental homes must have ceiling and underfloor insulation, and new regulations around sufficient heating appliances are on their way. Turn to page 6 to find out more.

If you don't have access to the internet or you are unsure, call in to the Valley Project's Heat Seekers: Healthy Homes in the Valley drop-in clinics at the community rooms on Tuesdays from 10am-noon.

Jordana recommends people apply for the subsidy as soon as possible as there are only two approved installers in Dunedin and they are already busy with insulating rental properties before the new rental regulations come into force.—Edith Leigh

The past year

It was an exciting day for Open VUE (Open Valley Urban Ecosanctuary), about this time last year, when we found out we had received a second year of Curious Minds PSP (Participatory Science Platform) funding.

This funding meant we were able to continue with our scientifically driven backyard biodiversity programme and include more schools and extra elements.

We had already learnt a little about the birds and mammalian predators of the Lindsay Creek catchment, and we were now excited to learn more about the lizard and soil invertebrate* life.

The plan and a party invite

This is the first stage of our plan, projected to 2025, which involves working with school children to survey and learn about the different species that already inhabit North East Valley. If you are keen to find out more about the insects, bugs, or lizards living here, come along to our Open VUE Party. It's on Sunday 26 of May at 2pm in the North East Valley Normal School hall.

Our young scientists are excited to share their findings with you.

We can use this knowledge to inspire children and the community to learn more about the natural world outside their doorstep as well as discover any actions we may need to proceed with in order to enhance the habitat corridor linking Orokonui Ecosanctuary with wider Dunedin.

Ecosanctuary overspill

Some species in Orokonui Ecosanctuary (namely birds) are doing so well, their populations are spilling out over the fence and dispersing to the wider area.

We hope that at least some of these individuals will make their way across the landscape through the Lindsay Creek habitat

We have heard anecdotal accounts of kākā from Orokonui visiting kākā at Dunedin Botanic Gardens.

One day, hopefully, we can see these and other birdlife living in our own backyards, here, in the Lindsay Creek catchment area.

What we've done

We are beginning to make our way towards this goal - through education as well as some actions.

Throughout 2018 we received further funding grants from the Speights Freshwater fund, Te Ao Tūroa: Dunedin's environment strategy, and the Lotteries Environment, which have allowed us to further develop our education programme and community development.

These grants have enabled us to run a whole series of workshops and events. Our workshops have included:

- TRAPBOX making
- bug bungalows
- cat collars
- predator detection
- bird feeders
- seed balls
- lizard lounges

Events have included:

- local Spring Clean with weeding and rubbish disposal
- Lindsay Creek clean-ups
- eco-crafting
- Lindsay Creek planting

Our collaborators

While this funding has really helped to propel us towards our goals, we would not be as far along as we are without our amazing community support and our strong collaborative partnerships. Collaborations are such an important aspect to the success of community conservation projects such as this.

We collaborate with the local community, the Valley Project, Orokonui Ecosanctuary, the University of Otago, Love the Lindsay, and have received sponsorship from Mitre 10. We have also received donations from Studio Tula and Conservation Volunteers Coastal Otago.

*Invertebrates are generally small animals that don't have an internal skeleton (unlike humans). Some invertebrates have a hard outer shell (called an exoskeleton) like insects, spiders, beetles andcrabs, and some have soft bodies, like worms, slugs and octopuses.
