## **GARDEN GOSSIP**

February is one of the hottest months of the year – although every Dunedin resident knows that forecasts can offer up some of the most unpredictable weather patterns be it summer or winter. Given that it's one of the more anticipated drier months, it's important to keep plants well-watered. When plants get water-stressed, they become susceptible to pests and diseases which can be quick to move in.

While February is all about reaping what you have sown, it's also time to plant beetroot, broccoli, carrot, cabbage, cauliflower, leek, lettuce, mesclun, onion, parsley, radish, rocket and silverbeet.

If you've enjoyed a summer of home-grown strawberries, February is a good month for propagating new plants. Strawberry plants will be sending off runners now. Choose the first new plant on each runner and discard of the rest. Placing compost around the new runners will help assist the root development, enabling these new plants to be ready for transplanting in about three weeks. It's best to dig out and dispose of strawberry plants of two or more years in age as they carry disease.

For those starting out in gardening, don't be put off by thinking you need a big, bare patch of land. Pots or even old tyres make for perfect planting areas for those dipping their green thumbs into this hobby/lifestyle.

And remember, if you are keen to join people interested in gardening and develop your knowledge further, reach out to the Green Island Community Garden group. ### **ARE YOU PREPARED?**

Continuing with this series of being prepared in the face of an unexpected event that can upset our normal routine of life, let us look at things we can do to help us to be prepared.

Last issue we looked at having an adequate first aid Kit to deal with minor injuries

Because most emergency events occur unexpectedly, we can be totally unprepared and sometimes even panic not knowing what to do. To alleviate some of not knowing what to do, It is a good idea to make up a simple basic emergency plan. One that everyone in your household will know and have access to. In the making up of such a plan, it is better if it is done as family. It is easier to remember the plan if everyone has been involved in the development of the plan.

So what sort of things need to be in your emergency plan :-

- **1.** Family / friend contact phone numbers, emails and/or social media contacts, Emergency phone numbers including doctors, Pharmacies, neighbor's phone numbers.
- **2.** A list of emergency supplies sufficient for at least 3 or more days, including water, nonperishable food, etc including a note where they are stored.
- **3.** Note where items such as a torch, transistor radio, first aid kit, cellphone chargers, carry bag, etc are stored.
- **4.** Where clothing, blankets etc are kept.
- **5.** Have a means of cooking if power is cut off.
- **6.** Agree on an assembly point, especially in case of fire or flood.
- 7. Who will collect children if at school.
- **8.** Make a to do list of who will deal with the various tasks of the things written above.
- **9.** Place the above plan clearly written in an easily accessible place for all.


