EXCITING NEW BUS ROUTE THROUGH SOUTH DUNEDIN



From 30 June 2025, Orbus will be providing better connections for passengers from southeastern areas of the city into the South Dunedin main shopping area, changing timetables on many routes to improve reliability, and starting a new Mosgiel "On Demand" service. The Mosgiel Route 77 will now take a loop through South Dunedin via Princes Street. This is a fantastic addition to the route and will benefit many users!

The updated routes into South Dunedin will mean services that currently travel along the full length of Andersons Bay Road into the city, via the Oval or the one-way system, will instead travel on Macandrew Road via King Edward and Princes Streets. This will tie in with existing and future improvements Dunedin City Council is making on Princes Street, which aim to improve road safety, including at intersections, while improving bus reliability and efficiency.

This is a long awaited and much anticipated change for the Green Island community. The Greater Green Island Community Network has been advocating for this change over the last few years, in response to community survey feedback.

After meeting with Hiliako, the boys researched guitar stands and visited music stores for inspiration. Once they had some ideas, they visited a local

builder, **Taylor** Caldwell & Highsted, who helped

create a design. With a plan sorted, they went to Bunnings Warehouse to buy the materials.

Over the next few weeks, the boys built the stand at Caldwell & Highsted's workshop. First, they cut the wood to size, then sanded it, and screwed the pieces together into a frame. After that, they stained the wood with oil and attached the wheels. In their final week, they added finishing touches, like gluing on the rubber.

A huge thank you must go to Taylor at Caldwell & Highsted- without him, this guitar stand wouldn't have been possible. Taylor said the boys brought lots of energy and excitement to his day.

The group learnt a lot during the project- from design and painting to drilling, screwing, using a laser cutter, and more. Eli said, "There was a Noah, Eli, Epa, Taylor, Arjan, and Ollie at Caldwell & Highsted's lot to it. We had to be very specific and careful."
