

CONCORD SCHOOL PRINCIPAL BIDS FAREWELL

It was with indrawn breath and gasps that staff, students, and the school community received the news that Steve Turnbull, the much-loved principal of Concord School, is resigning. The reaction reflected how integral Steve has been to the fabric of the school. Questions from the students, such as "Can he be principal of his new school and stay at Concord?" or "Will the new principal be mean?" highlighted the deep connection and affection the students have for him.

For the past 12 years, Steve has served as the teaching principal of Concord School, a role that allowed him to split his time between teaching and leading the school. Before stepping into this role, he was the deputy principal for three years, coming from teaching at Clutha Valley. Steve is now set to take on a full-time principal position at Brockville School in time for the start of term 4 2024, forward to embracing new challenges a larger full primary school will bring and being part of another community-centred school, much like Concord.

Reflecting on his time at Concord, Steve shared that the real highlights have been "working with the students, the day-to-day conversations, and their energy and enthusiasm when talking about what they are learning or what they

have been up to." His leadership has seen the completion of a \$1.3 million classroom development project, which included a commercial kitchen for teaching practical skills to the students and for community use, a new bike track, and an improved top court. The community is making use of these resources and valuing it as things like vandalism has really dropped off. Under his guidance, the school has also achieved significant improvements in literacy skills across all age groups.

Despite his professional commitments, Steve has always made time for his own family, coaching his sons Ben (19) and Ollie's (17) sports teams, and spending quality time with his wife, Rachel. Steve is Proud of the school camps, productions, and the annual Polyfest, Steve emphasised that these events embody "the community coming together to support each other and the children."

Steve leaves Concord School with fond memories and a deep sense of pride in the school's achievements, grateful for the support of the Board of Trustees, the staff, and the parents who have stood by the school through all its endeavours. The challenges of balancing teaching with being a principal, and supporting teachers in a constantly evolving educational landscape, have only strengthened his resolve to continue making a positive impact in his next role.

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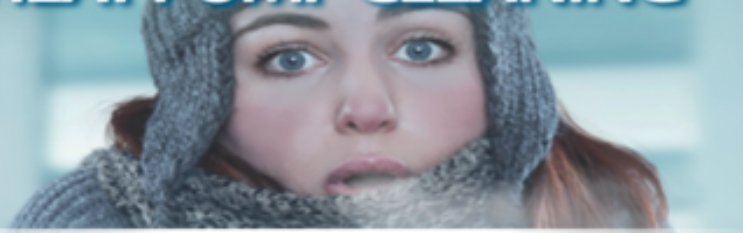
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GREEN ISLAND ART GROUP

FAIRFIELD TAMARIKI HELP KEEP DUNEDIN BEAUTIFUL

Fairfield School have been recognized for their efforts to beautify their community at the 2024 Keep Dunedin Beautiful Awards. With more than 62 schools represented at the ceremony, the school scooped the Dunedin Amenities Society Best School Award, for planting and maintaining the recently constructed Cockburn Street walking track and putting in place a specialized 'Predator Patrol Squad' to keep the track free of pests.

Year 7 pupil Alex Matheson was also recognized alongside his father, receiving the runners-up prize in the Jan Tucker Award for pest trapping.

Fulton Hogan - who developed the 1km path along their property boundary, creating a safe route for tamariki to walk to school - were also acknowledged for their "exceptional collaboration" with Fairfield School, winning the Spiral Consultancy Sustainable Business Award. What a fantastic effort from these community stalwarts, helping to instil a sense of respect and care for the environment in the next generation.

YOUR MONTHLY **Harcourts** MARKET REVIEW

In July, the Dunedin property market showcased its resilience and continued appeal, with the median house price holding steady at \$575,000, with very little difference from the month before. The median number of days to sell also remains consistent at 48. These figures underscore Dunedin's status as a highly desirable location, offering a unique blend of affordability and lifestyle benefits that attract a diverse range of buyers. This is consistent with the number of out-of-town enquiries we regularly receive on many of our listings. The stability in pricing is a positive indicator, reflecting a well-balanced market where demand remains strong despite broader economic challenges. Moreover, the steady median price is a sign of confidence in the local market, suggesting that both buyers and sellers are finding value at current levels. This stability is likely to encourage continued interest and activity, with the potential for gradual price growth as economic conditions improve."

From Ken at the Mortgage Express Finance Desk:
Earlier this year the Reserve Bank stated that the Official Cash Rate (OCR) was likely to remain unchanged until August 2025 but in a complete change of direction we have finally received the good news we've all been waiting for. The Reserve Bank has lowered the official cash rate by 0.25% from 5.5% to 5.25%. But wait there's more. The Reserve Bank Governor has suggested that we may even see two more OCR drops by the end of this year. Fingers crossed this now means that borrowers should start to see a corresponding drop in their interest rates. And in fact immediately following the news, ASB and ANZ announced they will be dropping their fixed and floating rates from next week and don't be too surprised to see others follow suit. So, now that rates are falling what does this mean for New Zealand borrowers, and the Real Estate market? Well overall this is very positive news for the property sector because as we all know lower interest rates generally leads to more lending demand. And although we may not see an immediate impact any reduction in residential mortgage rates potentially marks a turning point in the current property cycle.

The community garden is a resourceful place where anyone can learn the basics of gardening. Whether it's seed sowing days, hands-on planting, or composting lessons, the garden provides everything you need to get started.

Marion encourages people to come together, whether by helping in the garden or contributing in other ways, like sharing baking. advocates for a return to the practices of earlier generations, where growing and preserving your own food was a way of life.

For those new to gardening, Marion suggests starting in spring, the ideal time to get involved. Early planting of silverbeet, spinach, and brassicas

helps avoid pests, and the appearance of weeds is a good sign that the soil is ready. She also offers a handy tip: use the top of a 2L juice bottle as a mini greenhouse to protect young seedlings from harsh weather and pests.

Ultimately, the Green Island Community Garden is about more than just growing food—it's about fostering a sense of community and encouraging everyone to dig in and get involved.
