Greater Green Island has had its first Guinea Pig Mega Pet Show, on Sunday the 26th of May, 10AM-2PM in the Green Island Civic Hall. The show was hosted by the Otago Cavy Club. Otago Cavy Club hold regular guinea pig shows in Dunedin and other parts of Otago and as far as South Canterbury.

The shows are always fun and focused on learning about guinea pigs and guinea pig health. There are heaps of prizes for owners and their guinea pigs. The pet show is spilt into member and novice pet shows; there is also a purebred show. Club members have usually shown for some time and the criteria is around a set standard for each breed. If you are interested in showing pure breeds the club can support you to get started.

Most owners new to guinea pig shows and first timers (novices) show in the pet section. The pet section is judged around care and health of the guinea pig grouped into long haired, rough coat, and smooth coat classes.

All shows usually have three novelty classes but this was a

'Mega' pet show so we had extra novelty classes - ten in total, such as: 'Cutest Face', 'Biggest Butt', 'Best Couple', 'Most Mischievous'.' This all meant ten times the fun!

As winter settles in and we start to look towards spring, we have a quick update on a number of projects the community have been working on over the winter period.

Youth Initiative:

We have been coordinating the Wheako youth initiative, and we are actively engaged in Green Island, Concord, and Abbotsford. Concord has made significant strides with their school garden, preparing for the harvest of their overwinter crops. This initiative is teaching students valuable skills in gardening and teamwork. Green Island School is working on transforming Wheako HQ on Howden Street into a welcoming space for youth, while Abbotsford School focuses on skill development, empowering talented Year 7 students to mentor younger peers. We also look after a trap line to help out the Brighton Trapping Project, where we have removed a few mice and, to the horror and delight of our youth, a couple of big rats!

We have been supporting the Green Island Business Association, particularly with street beautification and the ongoing development of the Shand Street car park. Additionally, we're keen to hear community feedback on the new McDonald's development, especially regarding maintaining the improved traffic flow.

Community Garden and The Shed:

The community gardens remain vibrant, with activities continuing through winter. Marion and her team provide a warm, supportive environment despite the cold weather.



The shed is currently seeking new members, particularly those with skills in carpentry, accounting, or promotion.

YOUR MONTHLY Harcourts MARKET REVIEW

If you've been reading our reports in the past you will have seen our predictions that the Dunedin market had moved into a long term period of price stability. In April the median sale price rose sharply to \$620,000, but we felt this may have been due to a good portion of sales being above \$1M for that month, rather than the start of any upwards trend. The results for May would tend to support this, as the median has dropped back to \$570,000. This is exactly the same level as 12 months ago, so it is fair to say that as long as interest rates remain at their current level, we are unlikely to see any change for some time. In fact if you look back at Dunedin stats over the last 30 years, median sale price remains consistent for around 4-5 years following a downwards correction. The Dunedin market peaked in February 2022 with a median sale price of \$685,000, and since then it has been a slow decline down to an average around \$575,000, a 15% drop from the peak of the market. The good news is one of stability. It should actually bring confidence that we have a balanced real estate market, where buyers recognise the market has bottomed and they have the luxury of choice, and sellers can make decisions knowing they have time on their side. It is more common now to see offers on property from buyers subject to the sale of their current home. Upgrading has never been easier, both in terms of the relative price difference and the time frame to make the deal work. The longer timeframe on some transactions, and longer than usual period for the banks to approve finance have combined to see median days to sell stretch out from 34 days in April, to 44 days in May. There were a healthy number of sales with 166, but only 3 section sales reflecting existing stock offers better value than buying a section and building.

There are varying predictions on when we may see some easing in interest rates with the Reserve Bank saying August 2025, and the ANZ Chief Economist predicting beginning of next year. Either way, we recommend to first home buyers to look for their first home now. They have a good range of homes to choose from, they're not competing with large numbers of investment buyers, and if they can afford the repayments now it will only get easier to service debt in the coming years.

BRIGHTON TRAPPING PROJECT CELEBRATES SUCCESS

Soon there will be less introduced possums threatening our regenerating bush around Brighton and Ocean View. Thanks to a Biodiversity Fund from the Dunedin City Council, the Brighton Trapping Project recently purchased 80 traps for 13 lifestyle block owners who had registered their interest with us last year. Many of the landowners have not trapped much (or at all!) before, so we held a training session in May and have since set up traplines on most of the properties. The traps are on long-term loan, checked at least once a week by the landowner, and catches logged on the TrapNZ app. In less than 2 months our keen new trappers have caught 70 possums! We're also slowly extending our trap network on DCC reserves. Volunteers currently check four traplines located at Meremere Reserve, along Ōtokia Creek near the community nursery, and in the dunes. They've caught 63 rats, mice and possums this year so far. We're currently looking for another enthusiastic volunteer coordinator to join our small team. If you like working with people, care about our wildlife and have some spare time, please get in touch (trapping experience isn't absolutely necessary - we can teach you this). 
Often we are asked to ask local residents to please SLOW DOWN, we submit to the speed reviews, we ask the police to have an increased presence which we do.

KERBSIDE RECYCLING UPDATE

It's on – our new kerbside recycling and rubbish collection service is underway.

Let's all ace it and reduce the amount of waste to landfill by heaps. How? By only putting the correct items in each recycling bin.

Check the guide delivered with your new bins, or the new, free DCC Kerbside Collection app (found on Google Play or the App Store), or www.dunedin.govt.nz/recycle for all the information you need.

Remember, the contents of the new green-lidded food scraps and garden waste bins is composted and used by growers to put back into the earth to help plants grow – so it's super important to have zero contamination. Only put in food scraps, meat, bones, and seafood, garden waste, hair and animal fur. Never put any plastics, metals, or paper in your green-lidded bin or other household items.

Our friendly bin inspectors will be checking the green-lidded bin and the yellow-lidded mixed recycling bins and giving feedback to help us all get our kerbside recycling right. If you get a red-tag on your green-lidded bin and it's not emptied, it means there were too many

contaminating items inside. Just take in your bin, remove the incorrect items mentioned on the tag and put the bin out for collection the following week.

NEW BUILDING AT GREEN ISLAND LANDFILL

To support the new kerbside collection service, a new Organics Receivals Building (ORB) is being built at Green Island Landfill. It's where the green-lidded bin contents from kerbside collection will be shredded. At first the shredded material will go to a commercial composting facility at Timaru, but we plan to build our own at Green Island Landfill soon.
