Copson's roots are in the heart of the region, growing up on Owen Street and recalling a star turn in a Santa parade, where she rode an elephant right behind the man in red along the main road. Such fond memories of the Greater Green Island area lead Copson to the conclusion that Harcourts has an integral part to play in the community, and one not limited to this dedicated space. Certainly, with involvement in a number of Greater Green Island Community Christmas Markets (including a repeat running of the high-intensity but ever-so-fun children's area slated for the 2024 edition), as well as key donations to the recently unveiled BBQ and Stage project in the Memorial Gardens and a number of foundation grants for various

activities in and around the area, it is only natural that such a space will "meet the parameters for enriching the local community."

Health and cost-of-living were the two biggest concerns for residents of Green Island and Abbotsford when I was out surveying constituents with my MP Door-Knock Survey recently. I am making my way around what is a very diverse electorate, getting a feel for which issues are universal, and which have particular local resonance.

For example, many Green Island business owners say they're still recovering after months of traffic disruptions due to road works in the main street; other residents are worried the Government's planned changes to speed zones around schools will result in increased injuries to young people, with no evidence of any public benefit by increasing speeds.

Thanks to everyone who took the time for a quick chat about NZ's direction of travel, their concerns for the local community and for wider NZ, and which issues they think will dominate over the decade. These conversations enable me to focus on what matters most to people when I am in Wellington, and inform which public meetings I will hold locally to help feed into Labour policy.

Special thanks to those who kindly invited us in out of the cold for warm cuppas. Your generosity meant we found the energy to keep going a few extra hours despite temperatures not far above zero. Door-knocking continues

Health was another big topic for Labour Leader Chris Hipkins when he visited Dunedin recently -- twice in a week. We packed in a public meeting, café visits, conversations with market stall holders and two rugby games: one involving the All Blacks and the other touted as the Ranfurly Shield of school rugby with Southland Boys hanging on to their national ranking in a nail-biting clash against King's High.

Letters and emails to me continue to highlight alarm at the Government's Muldoonist fast-track consenting laws, youth bootcamps and the war in Gaza.

YOUR MONTHLY **Harcourts**MARKET REVIEW

The June statistics threw up another consistent month in line with the 12 months previous. The median value was \$579,000, and if you averaged the median values over the last 12 months it is \$584,000. So fair to say nothing much has changed which is unsurprising given interest rates also haven't changed.

The median days to sell did improve from 45 days in May to 36 days in April and we think there are several reasons for this. Firstly buyers who have had their finance pre-approved for some time are acting, and the conditional days on market is less due to a shorter time frame on securing finance. Also, we have seen a lift in Auction activity with a number of sales being made under the hammer on Auction day. Our team have sold 2 under the hammer this month already, with 13 more auctions coming up on 31st July.

There were 129 sales in total for the month. Just 9 of those sales over \$1M, with the bulk of activity being in the \$400,000—\$800,000 range with a total of 118 sales. Total number of listings on the market at the time of writing this report are 702, so it would seem there is still a wide choice of properties for sale. However depending on a buyers' budget there may not be quite as big a choice as it first appears. There are 61 properties for sale under \$400,000, 203 between \$400,000—\$600,000, 159 between \$600,000—\$800,000, and 193 above that range.

At long last there appears to be the start of some positive news in the media, reporting that inflation may be down a bit more than expected, and a possible reduction in interest rates from the Reserve Bank this side of Christmas. Already we have seen major banks offer a small reduction in their 2–3 year fixed term rates. While this all helps to generate a little more positivity, it will be some time before interest rates return to a low enough level to put significant pressure on house prices. Agents are reporting steady numbers at open homes and we have not seen the traditional major drop in activity through the colder Winter month. So overall the market remains one of stability and a fair and balanced opportunity for both sellers and buyers. It's a good time to make real estate decisions.



COMMUNITY KORERO - LACHIE "LJ" MCLELLAN

Welcome to Community Korero, a column where The Informer chats with a local identity. In the hot seat this week is educator and Green Island rugby club strength and conditioning coach, Lachie 'LJ' McLellan.

Lachie (LJ) McLellan loves being home. The dedicated teacher and sports coach has returned to the region after 12 years living and teaching abroad, finding himself right in the thick of the Green Island Rugby Club's stellar success this season. As the Grizzlies' strength and conditioning coach, McLellan is quick to quick to point out that their success thus far is built on "a bloody neat group of players who are backed by coaches and management who have full belief in each and every player's ability."

Spending the last 12 years teaching Physical Education internationally in Abu Dhabi and Singapore certainly stood McLellan in good stead for his current role, as has his vast and successful athletics background. "I spent a large part of

my 20s working and competing in athletics at national and international level – nowadays, I'm a teacher during the day, and then I use my love of coaching to train up-and-coming Otago sprinters during the summer months." But it was always part of his plan to return home with his wife and two children: "Dunedin was always the end goal after our travels so we could give our children the opportunity to grow up with some of the experiences we had."

As if he wasn't busy enough, McLellan teaches Integrated Studies, mathematics and physical education at John McGlashan College; nevertheless, this is all a part of what drives him. "I love working with all people young and old and in different contexts. From inside the classroom educating children, to on the sports field where I can watch athletes develop and compete to the best of their abilities."

A quote which he tends to use a lot in his day-to-day experiences as it connects to his philosophy is from American long distance runner Steve Prefontaine, who said "to give anything less than your best, is to sacrifice the gift" – such insight is to be expected from McLellan, who is clearly relishing being back in our fair region, and is keen to keep contributing both on and off the grass. He remains similarly

circumspect hen asked about the Grizzlies' chances of winning their first title since 1978: there's still a long way to go, and we're taking each game as they come – it's all part of the process."
