I was approached by a couple of Green Islanders on different occasions, with the same question.

When do you indicate at a roundabout?

Basically, you only indicate before you enter the roundabout if you are turning either left or right. If you are travelling straight through, don't indicate left until you have passed the first junction. Simple, isn't it?

There is however an issue with the roundabout on the north side of Green Island. If you are coming from Dunedin into Green Island and you want to turn left onto Shand Street, you'll indicate before you get on the roundabout, but because there is a junction at Shand and Church Street as soon as you leave the roundabout, anyone coming down Church Street will not know if you are turning left onto Church or straight on to Shand .

My advice would be, if you're coming down Church Street and someone is coming off the roundabout; just let them pass (whether they are turning left or straight on). If you're going straight on to Shand Street, turn off your indicator as soon as you leave the roundabout and take it slowly.

I know this may sound convoluted, but I just want you people to be safe out there.

INGRID'S UPDATE

The new Dunedin hospital was by far and away the most discussed issue at the Labour stall at the recent Brighton fair. It attracted so many pages of red stickers that we nearly ran out of paper.

At previous public events the cost-of- living and the new hospital have both been top of mind however this time the anxiety, frustration and uncertainty regarding the inpatient building have clearly intensified over the summer break.

No doubt the haemorrhaging of \$110,000 taxpayer money per day of delay has contributed to this.

In some rather poetic timing on the same day as the fair, the PM's Cabinet reshuffle revealed that Simeon Brown was to take over the Health portfolio from demoted minister Shane Reti.

The ministerial switch actually makes for an ideal opportunity for the National government to do the right thing and reverse its shortsighted and chaotic decisions regarding the inpatient building with the least amount of political fallout.

The fact that there is now a new Minister for the South Island also indicates that perhaps — just perhaps — the National Government might be starting to glean how important the promised new hospital is for the whole of the southern region.

So while a part of me remains pessimistic mainly due to

Minister Brown's track record of general disregard for people and social services, I am ever so slightly hopeful that the right decisions can be made within the small window of opportunity that reshuffles throw up.

Certainly local Labour MPs will be straight in the ear of both Ministers Brown and Meager so that there is neither confusion nor excuse over what Southern communities are demanding from them when it comes to the new hospital and access to healthcare. The coming weeks will determine whether that optimism is misplaced.

GGICN WHEAKO YOUTH PROJECT UPDATE

COMMUNITY KÖRERO - JOHN MOYLE

John Moyle, co-owner of Moyle's Fresh Choice, is a proud Green Island local, deeply rooted in the community's history and culture. Born and bred in the area, John grew up involved in local clubs and surrounded by a thriving community. His journey reflects both the evolution of Green Island and the resilience of a family dedicated to serving its people.

The Moyle family has a long-standing legacy in Green Island's business landscape. Their first store, established in 1956, was located where the original Night & Day now stands. The second store opened in 1977 in what is now Flex Fitness. In December 2015, John and his wife, Julie, took a bold leap by opening the current Moyle's Fresh Choice store, despite studies suggesting it wouldn't succeed. Their gamble paid off, and the supermarket has since become a cornerstone of the community.

John's deep connection to Green Island goes beyond business. He grew up witnessing the area transform from an industry-based hub to a more residential community, particularly following the motorway's opening in 1972. Significant events, such as the closing of the freezing works and the Abbotsford slip, left lasting impacts on the region. The slip was especially personal for John, as his grandparents and uncle lost their homes during the disaster, along with many of his school friends. He recalls Civil Defence operating out of the Civic Hall on Howden Street during the crisis.

Through it all, Green Island has retained its strong sense of community—a quality John cherishes. "Customers aren't just customers; they're friends and associates," he shares. Longtime residents often approach him to reminisce about

his grandfather's store near the railway bridge in Abbotsford or to share memories of his family.

For John, some of his fondest memories include the milestones of the Green Island Cricket Club, where he serves as president and is a lifelong member. He recalls the excitement of the club winning the national title and the Green Island Rugby Club's triumphant 21-15 victory at Forsyth Barr Stadium, ending a 46-year title drought.

Despite stepping away from playing cricket for 17 years, John recently returned to the pitch, rediscovering his love for the game. "It reminded me how much I've missed it," he says. Cricket remains his favorite way to enjoy the summer.

Looking back on his journey, John values the unique community spirit of Green Island. He takes pride in knowing that, through the ups and downs, the area has retained its warmth and connection—a feeling he hopes will continue for generations to come.

IF IN DOUBT, DON'T GO OUT

HELP PREVENT THE SPREAD OF FRESHWATER PESTS

Lagarosiphon, didymo and lake snow are the three major freshwater pests present in Otago, and they can spread from a single drop of water or plant fragment. When you're out on the water this summer — boating, paddle boarding, kayaking, or swimming — make sure before you move between waterways, you

> always Check, Clean and Dry any clothing and equipment to prevent freshwater pests hitchhiking from one waterway to another.

> > When you leave a waterway, check there's no plant material attached to your boat, trailer, clothes or footwear.

Let's all do our bit to protect Otago's waterways.

CAN I SWIM HERE?

Every summer ORC's environmental monitoring team checks 36 popular swimming spots around Otago for bacteria and/or algae to see if they're safe to swim in.

SWIM SMART CHECKLIST:

- Avoid swimming for 48 hours after heavy rain, as runoff can be washed into waterways.
- · Follow any warning signs.
- Check the water is clean and clear.
- Stay away from any pipes, culverts, and flocks of birds.
- Check for hazards.
- · Learn how to spot toxic algae and know the hotspots for blooms in Otago.
