For as long as the power lasted, the inflatable games area was also a popular spot.

The Fire Service offered home visits and smoke alarm checks, and there was even a chance to try on a firefighter's kit. The Men's Shed donated a beautifully crafted wooden wheelbarrow as a prize, Riselaw Road Playcentre showcased the fun they offer local tamariki. Our Howden Street office co-tenants VOYCE Whakarongo Mai shared their important kaupapa supporting care experienced young people. The Green Island Bowling Club encouraged people to join their upcoming "Have a Go" day, while Tūhura Otago Museum wowed families with science demonstrations, microscopes, and a thermal camera. Pipes and Drums of Dunedin marched onto the stage with their classic band tunes.

Despite the challenges, the Get Together was buzzing with people. Local MP Ingrid Leary stopped by to chat, current Mayor Jules Radich connected with Greater Green Island Community Network's Ben McKenzie, and other council candidates and political party representatives mingled with residents. Local Community Constable Toots was there chatting with the community in his trademark approachable style. Greater Green Island Community Liaison Lee-Anne Michelle has received lots of positive feedback since the event, with locals praising the variety of activities and the warm, welcoming atmosphere.

### **OTOKIA CREEK AND MARSH HABITAT TRUST RESTORING OUR NATIVE TAONGA**

The Otokia Creek and Marsh Habitat Trust is an eco restoration project focused on re-establishing native vegetation along the Otokia Creek in Brighton. The vision is to reforest the creek catchment from the source to the ocean, to further beautify the idyllic seaside suburb of Brighton.

Started by a group of locals in 2020, the Trust has planted 20,000 trees so far! They host regular community tree-planting days and workshops with local school children, businesses and community groups, and always welcome more helping hands.

restore a healthy habitat for native birds and insects. mitigate the effects of farming runoff on water quality and provide vegetation cover to cool the water of the creek in a time of climate change. Focus on maintaining the trees through clearing grass and gorse means the project has a high growth rate and speed. Some of the trees are already over head height and in a few years we will begin to see a true forest.

Bird and insect populations are already increasing, including the recent arrival of a breeding

pair of kaka, and the exciting discovery in the wetlands of a rare native spider endemic to New Zealand. The Trust regularly monitors water quality and are pleased to see that quality is improving.

The project has several funders, including Lotto and the Otago Regional Council's EcoFund, and is supported by the landowners along the creek edge. The success of the project lies in the hands of the volunteers who plant and maintain the trees. The ecological effects of the



mahi are already evident and the Trust is proud that from a small group they have expanded into a reforestation project that brings the community together.

## **TUNNEL BEACH TRACK TO REOPEN FOR SUMMER!**

Good news for walkers and nature lovers! The spectacular walk down to Tunnel Beach in Dunedin is planned to reopen in time for the

warmer months.

The walkway has been closed since last October, when a torrential downpour caused widespread flooding, slips, surface damage and fallen trees across Otago Tunnel Beach was tracks. hit hardest, with at least 10 major slips – some sliding all the way from the track down to the ocean.

Operations Manager Gabe Davies said the closure was a real blow, especially as the track had only just been realigned before the storm hit. With more than 150,000 visitors a year, restoring access to this iconic spot became a top priority.

Repairs are now underway. The first phase involves clearing slips, restoring the track surface, reopening drainage, and beginning native planting to stabilise the area. This work is expected to be finished by November 2025, allowing the track to welcome visitors again over the holiday period. A second stage of improvements will follow later, adding new seating and future-proofing measures.

temporary Some closures may be needed during that work, but this first phase will mean safe access is restored for the busiest time of year.



### **NEW WALDRONVILLE COMMUNITY SEED LIBRARY**




Check out the new Community Seed Library, located within the Community Food Stall on Viscount Road, Waldronville.




