The median value in Dunedin has remained consistent at \$570,000 for the third consecutive month. Increased buyer activity has been matched by increased choice, however listing volumes are starting to decline due to Winter.

There was a total of 127 sales in April compared with 125 the year previous. Median days on the market was 44, similar to March and considerable shorter than February which was 62 days. This points to renewed confidence in the Dunedin market, and a belief that we may have seen the worst of the financial cycle and mortgage rate rises. Recent news such as lower long-term mortgage rates, an easing in the LVR (lending to value ratio), and adjusted rules around assessing a borrower's expenditure have helped bolster activity.

However, property still remains very price sensitive, and presentation matched with the right selling strategy, or correct list price is key to getting sold. There is increased pressure on rental property supply and rents are rising as a result. Investors are starting to take interest again, so right now there is a window of opportunity for first home buyers to act with less competition. For anyone looking to sell and upgrade the relative price difference is likely the lowest it will be, so we urge you to act now.

Homes that present well in the Winter months with good sunshine hours will attract interest, and sellers will be faced with less competition from other listings.

COMMUNITY KORERO: GRIZZLIES KITCHEN

Welcome to Community Korero, a column where The Informer chats with a local identity. In the hot seat this week is executive chef and owner-operator of Grizzlies Kitchen, Paul McArthur.



Paul McArthur cuts an imposing

figure around his stomping ground of Green Island, but that really has nothing on the size of his ambition. The local lad – educated at St. Peter Chanel School, and now owner-operator of Grizzlies Kitchen – has been involved in the culinary arts from a young age, since his first paid job (aged 13) as a kitchen hand at the institution that was Alice's Takeaways. Cutting his teeth in such a fast-paced environment, Paul turned professional at 17 after graduating from Otago Polyechnic's culinary school, where he soon landed a job as a head chef in Aotearoa's tourist mecca, Queenstown, catering to the oh-so-fabulous at Milbrook Resort.Fast forward to 2023, and Paul has accrued nearly three decades of executive chef experience in hotels around the motu, before striking out on his own in the world of catering late year.

When Covid crippled the hospitality industry, Paul thought outside the square, and contrived to make his social media presence count. With work drying up, he launched #paulsplates, where he would document his kitchen creations for his Facebook followers. The impact was almost instantaneous, as friends and fans alike not only smashed those react buttons, but also reached out for recipes: "(Paul's Plates) made me connect with people I'd not seen for decades, literally in some cases." #paulsplates was an unmitigated success, allowing its creator to showcase his skills ("18 months of not repeating the same recipe") while also encouraging followers to "put a restaurant spin on easily accessible supermarket

ingredients."

Such social media shenanigans provided the impetus for Paul to launch Grizzlies Kitchen in August of 2022, based in the titular team's home clubrooms at Miller Park. Spearheaded by Paul - and ably assisted by a coterie of local volunteers - the focus is firmly on "home-cooked meals, but at an elevated level," catering to everything from corporate morning teas, weddings, bereavements and even in-house personal chef services.

In spite of Queenstown's blinding lights and his heady social media success, Paul remains a Grizzly at heart, who sees Green Island as "home...an easy going place with an inviting, supportive community." His ethos is simple: "if you look after the community, they'll look after you." Food for thought, indeed.

ARE YOU PREPARED?

THIS ISSUE - EARTHQUAKE AND TSUNAMI

One of the most unnerving experiences that we can have is that of an earthquake. New Zealand is one of the countries that is on what they call the Pacific Ring of Fire – that is, we are at the edge of the tectonic Pacific Plates which are constantly on the move. As such, New Zealand experiences between 14-15,000 earthquakes each year, of which only about 150 or so are large enough to be felt. But we do on occasions experience large earthquakes, which cause damage, and even alter the topography of the ground, as with Christchurch and Kaikoura, which caused major changes and damage.


So what do we do? If inside, drop cover and hold – do not run outside or you may risk getting hit by falling masonry and glass (especially if you are in a brick or masonry home or building). If outside, move away from buildings and powerlines, and then drop, cover and hold. Stay put until the shaking stops. Be aware of aftershocks. If the earthquake is very strong and/or long and you are near the coast or even a large body of water, move quickly to higher ground in case of a tsunami – do not wait for official warnings. Listen for radio or cellphone messages. Depending on the earthquake's location, Tsunamis may take some time to arrive; don't be lulled into a false sense of security. Wait for the all-clear to be given.

It's been a busy old time since I first appeared in this publication.

A steady stream of people have popped into the station - some with queries, some wanting advice, and some to just say hello.



It's all been very pleasant.

I was accosted at the station by a lovely lady from the Green Island Women's Club, who asked me, at very short notice, if I could give a speech to the members. Obviously I agreed, as it was a great way to meet the community and find out what concerns they had.

After a quick introduction and a cup of tea, I gave them a quick update on who I was and then decided to turn it into a question-and-answer session.

Apart from the lovely lady who asked if she could shoot a burglar, if he was in her house (No!! Definitely not! "Ring 111," I was quick to reiterate), the main topic of concern was email scams/unwanted callers and how to deal with them.

I explained to the club that there are people out there who want access to your money, and the only way they can get to it is with their assistance.

If you receive any unwanted phone calls from unsolicited callers, hang up. If they persist in calling you, take the phone off the hook - they will get the message. Never give out your private details (passwords, date of birth, date of birth, bank details and so on). Your bank/IRD/MSD will not contact you to get these details; they have them already. So, if you do get any calls or emails from people pretending to be these companies, ring the actual companies and ask if they have been trying to contact you; if not, it's a scam.

There seemed to be a great reticence from the ladies to "not wanting to seem rude" to these callers. My advice is to be rude; they are only after your hard-earned money.
