Cadets then set out to discover the island's diverse wildlife, observing native species and appreciating the unique ecosystem that thrives there.

In addition to learning and exploring, the group rolled their sleeves up hands-on conservation the work, caring for

whenua (land) and contributing to the ongoing efforts to preserve this special place. Tasks included clearing invasive plants and supporting the health of native flora, reinforcing the importance of protecting natural environments.

The purpose of the trip was to build on what cadets have been learning during their divisional lessons by encouraging them to take an active interest in the world around them Through enjoying and caring for the natural world, and developing awareness of community resources, the experience aimed to foster a sense of responsibility and connection to both nature and community.

The St John Youth Programme is not just about learning first aid and lifesaving skills; it's about building confidence, leadership, and resilience in our youth.





INCREASED SEA LION ACTIVITY IN BRIGHTON & OCEAN VIEW

Local Brighton resident and science communicator Claudia Babirat recently captured a special visitor on camera- a New Zealand sea lion resting on a neighbour's property, where her family shears their sheep. It's the first one to visit the area, and neighbours Mark and Adele called Claudia for help due to her background with DOC and wildlife guide on the Otago Peninsula. Claudia alerted the community by sharing the photo on the Brighton/Ocean View Community Facebook page.

Many locals don't realise how rare these animals are. New Zealand sea lions disappeared from mainland breeding sites for nearly 100 years, and only in recent decades have females begun returning to Otago and As their population grows, Brighton and Ocean View are Southland. seeing more of them- sometimes in unexpected places.

Sea lions are a special part of our coastal community. With care and respect, we can safely share our beaches and backyards with these rare and protected visitors.

Recent Local Sightings Include:

- Big Stone Road has requent Sea Lion visits often seen sleeping on or very close to the track, sometimes completely out of sight.
- Sea lions crossing roads and causing temporary closures
- Pregnant females resting or nesting in backyards
- Sea lions spooking horses, wandering into events, or relaxing on lawns

How to Stay Safe Around Sea Lions

- Keep your distance: Stay 20m metres away if possible.
- Don't approach: Let them rest or move at their own pace.
- Leash your dog: Dogs can disturb or injure sea lions, especially pups.
- Drive carefully: Sea lions, including small pups, often cross coastal roads.
- Give them space: Don't try to move or herd them.
- Report serious injuries: Call 0800 DOC HOT

"We're really pleased that the people who have moved in will be able to celebrate their first Christmas here and can also enjoy the lovely outdoor space over the warmer summer months," says Kerrie Young, Regional Director for Otago, Southland and South Canterbury.

Kerrie Young says the community will play a big part in helping people settle into these new homes. Therefore, Kāinga Ora organised an open home event for Morris Street where the local community, including neighbours



and stakeholders, came together to connect.

Neighbours praised the quality of the homes, the natural light, and the spacious feel created by high ceilings and large windows. Many remarked that the new homes were a significant improvement from the two older homes previously on the site.

"We live locally, and it has been incredible to see these houses being built, knowing the opportunity they will provide for people to make positive changes in their lives," says Holly, who is one of the neighbours.





built, it has now been lovingly upcycled, repainted, and given a new life thanks to the efforts of Guardians Rata and Annalise.


The pair enlisted local artist Sig Peters, of The Pink Galah, whose stunning artwork has transformed the library into a true neighbourhood treasure.

Community Wins Worth Celebrating



Our Community Garden took home a Keep Dunedin Beautiful Award, a well-deserved acknowledgement of the years of hard mahi poured in by volunteers and everyone who quietly keeps the garden humming. Marion and Joe have been incredible, guiding a team of dedicated volunteers who give the garden its heart.

Advocacy & Listening to the Community

We've continued to advocate strongly for local issues with Council and partner agencies, and a big part of that is hearing from you. Our Community Survey has been a major focus this year. The feedback has been thoughtful, honest, and incredibly useful. We'll share the full results early next year, and they will directly shape what we do next.

We remain persistent in advocacy for installing a public toilet in the Memorial Gardens and continue to petition to see improvements to the Burnside underpass.

It will also be essential to have a strong local voice in the development of the new bike trail through Abbotsford, ensuring there are meaningful benefits for Green Island, Concord, and our local business community.

Seeing this track eventually link all the way out to Brighton and our coastal communities would be a dream for many in our area.

Big Changes on Our Patch

We're now engaging with more than 200 young people each week, which still blows our minds a little!
