COME MEET ŌTEPOTI HOUSE PLANTS & BONSAI WITH US

Two students from Concord School, Emily and Nono, went to interview Nick at Ōtepoti houseplants and bonsai. They interviewed Nick about all his plants. He has about 3,000 plants indoors and about 12,000 outdoors. Nick started horticulture about 30 years ago. He started his Ōtepoti houseplants and bonsai during lockdown. Nick says it doesn't cost money to get a seed and put it in the ground and let it grow, so a business of plants isn't very hard to start up.

Emily's favourite part was photographing the venus fly traps. Emily liked learning about how the venus flytraps work - they have little hairs in their mouths, when a fly lands on it it closes and stays closed for about three to four weeks! Nono's favourite part was photographing Nicks biggest plant which is the Monstera Thai Constellation and seeing the FLUFFY cactus. Nick also has a cute little dog named Fizzy – she was very cute.

He has also started an annual spring plant fair on his property, there were 15 different

vendors and about 600 people through that day. At the fair he has trainer bonsais for people to Venus flytrap plants buy and learn about bonsai trees. His oldest

bonsai tree is 30 years old! Going forward he is going to do the fair at Concord School. Nick and his son built a waterfall from scratch which looked very nice. Nono and Emily enjoyed interviewing Nick and liked seeing his little doggy Fizzy and all of his plants. We recommend others to go to see him as well.

WILD DUNEDIN 2025: EXPLORE NATURE'S WONDERS

The Wild Dunedin Festival 2025, running from April 10 to

22, offers a variety of events celebrating our region's natural beauty.

On Saturday, April 12, join the Otago Tramping and Mountaineering Club for a guided walk to Sutton Salt Lake, New Zealand's only inland salt lake. This 3.5 km loop track showcases unique landscapes with schist tors and tussock grasslands. Emeritus Professor Alison Cree will provide insights into the area's significance for native lizards. The walk is easy, taking about 45 minutes to an hour. Meet at 9am at the Sunnyvale Sports Centre, to carpool (\$20 contribution) or drive directly to Kidds Road. The event is limited to 40 people; early booking is essential.

On Sunday, April 13, from 10-1pm, the Green Island Community Garden invites visitors to its Open Day. Tour the

community vegetable garden and orchard, engage in rock painting for vegetable markers, and connect with fellow gardening enthusiasts. This free event is open to all.

From April 10 - 21, Orokonui Ecosanctuary offers free entry for under-18s. Open daily from 9.30-4.30pm visitors can

observe native birds like tūī, korimako, and kākā at feeding

stations, with takahē feedings at 11am. Reptile enclosures housing Otago skinks, jewelled geckos, and tuatara are also accessible. An autumn scavenger hunt adds extra adventure for families. Adult entry is \$22; no booking required.

On Sunday, April 13, from 10-4pm, the Nature Dome at Forsyth Barr Stadium offers a fun-filled day for the whole family. Enjoy an artisan market, live music, and hands-on nature activities. Performances by Suzy Cato and Anika Moa, along with a screening of the movie "Moana," ensure there's something for everyone.
