"It has been, and continues to be a busy time of writing funding applications for a project that has been a long time in the planning. To gain such a positive response early on is so encouraging. I think it's also reflective of the interest for

GARDEN GOSSIP

With the warmer temperatures over summer and, let's face it, a few wet days thrown in, weeds can go crazy in their plug for our attention.

Mulching has so many advantages in the garden, especially over the warmer months, as it slows weed growth and retains soil moisture. It also feeds our soils living microorganisms with nutrients. The waste from these tiny microbes also creates nutrients for the soil. Types of mulch include: woodchips, pea straw, leaves and grass clippings.

However, it's important to be mindful of the quantity of mulch distributed. Too much mulch (a layer of three inches or more) can bury and suffocate plants, and water and oxygen cannot reach the roots.

Mulching near plant stems also attracts pests such as slugs, snails and tunnelling rodents as the mulch creates the perfect home for them. Try sprinkling wood ashes around the base of precious plants to keep the slugs and snails away.

ARE YOU PREPARED?

Continuing with this series of being prepared for unexpected events that can throw us into a state of emergency, let us look at things we can do to help us being prepared. We need to work on the assumption that the emergency services may not be able to come to our aid for at least three days, should assistance be delayed. In such cases you may be without power, water and the ability to acquire supplies. Also phone and internet communications may be down. While this sounds extreme, and generally unlikely, using the good old scout motto "Be Prepared" is important.

In this issue we look at the make up of emergency First Aid Kit, and what's necessary to survive for several days on your own. It's important to have first aid dressings for some major injuries in case you are not receiving emergency help quickly.

The following is a guide of what should be included in an emergency first aid Kit:

Safety Pins: Accident Blanket: Eye pads: Specimen Bag: Non Adherent dressings assorted: Saline Solution: Island Dressings assorted: Wound Dressing # 14: Conforming Bandages assorted: First Aid Hints Book: Gloves: Crepe Bandages assorted: Tape: CPR Face Shield: Notebook & Pencil: Triangular Bandage: Plasters: Combine Dressings: Tweezers: Antiseptic Cream: Wound Cleansing Wipes.
