YOUR MONTHLY **Harcourts**MARKET REVIEW

March has been an active month, with many homes selling or going under contract with multiple parties interested. While the number of properties on the market in Dunedin remained at an extremely high level, those who were savvy enough to make the commitment were able to secure great homes.

Dunedin's cooler months through Autumn and Winter usually start showing a slow down in the property market, however this has not been the case so far.

Our local property market was positive throughout March with the median property price in Dunedin steady at \$600,000 with the median days on market sitting at 39.

Residential sales reflected renewed buyer confidence, particularly among first-home buyers and investors.

We know the biggest bracket for property searches is in the \$500,000 - \$600,000 range also shown in the majority of sales being between \$400,000 to \$700,000 range. In the higher priced properties there were 18 sales over \$1 million, indicating sustained activity.

While we know buyers have a lot of choice across the number of properties available, we still consider it to be a balanced market. The combination of stable prices and heightened buyer interest suggests we will see a positive Winter in the sales arena, making this a great time to make your real estate move – whether you are selling or buying do get in touch.

Hi, this is Toby and Nina from Fairfield School, and a couple of weeks ago we went to go and interview the owners of the Dunedin Futsal Academy at the Sunnyvale Sports Centre. Michaela and Maxi, the owners, provided us with lots of information on how they run the academy and what they do there. We both learnt that they started in 2020 and in their first term Covid hit. They started the Dunedin Futsal Academy because there was no place for there daughter to learn some futsal skills.

In South America they learn futsal at a young age to prepare for football.

We found out that there wasn't a women's futsal

league in Dunedin, I (Nina) enjoyed learning about the women's classes. The women's classes started around the middle of 2024 for women aged 14 and up. They started this because they wanted the women to have a chance to up their skills in futsal because they can't really do that in mixed futsal. The mixed sessions are for kids aged from 5-12. I (Toby) found it interesting that they only started doing futsal on Fridays. But then once they had more people, they started to expand and added Monday classes. We really enjoyed learning about the Dunedin Futsal Academy, and we also had a little kick around of the ball with Maxi, Michaela, and their son, River.

GET YOUR BEE CARD READY AND BUS TO SCHOOL



School is well underway for the year, but it's never too late to start using the bus to get around. Taking the bus is an easy, affordable option to get kids to where they need to go. It's also a great way for kids to learn independence and responsibility.

How much will it cost for my child to travel on a bus? Bus

fares are free for children aged 5-12 with a registered Bee Card, and only \$1.20 for people aged 13-18 for a single trip in Dunedin. You can only use a Bee Card or cash to pay for your bus fare onboard (drivers cannot take fare payment with bank or credit cards).

Where do I get a Bee card? Bee cards are easy to purchase from www.beecard.co.nz , or at an ORC customer centre on Level 2 of Philip Laing House on Rattray Street, DCC customer service centres or libraries, or the University Bookshop. Bee Cards can be purchased for \$5 with a minimum \$5 top up. You can also call 0800 ORBUSDN (0800 672 8736) for help or send them a message on their Facebook page. For more information about planning their journey, buying a Bee card, or any other questions you might have, go to www.orc.govt.nz/orbusdn.

AUTUMN GARDENING TIPS

As Autumn creeps in, it's the perfect time to think about caring for your lawn, or even sowing a new lawn. Just because it's colder doesn't mean your garden has to be out of action, May is still a good time to plant out your garden with brussel sprouts, cabbage, onions,



spinach, silverbeet, or even blueberries and blackberries!

Caring for your vegetable garden throughout the cooler months is important to ensure your garden is ready for planting in the spring (and for Autumn/Winter crops). A good way to do this is to add extra nutrients into your garden, using blood and bone or compost. You can start your own compost bin, using the food-scraps from your kitchen, and the green waste from your garden. Make sure you protect your growing seedlings from slugs and snails, so make sure you keep on top of these critters by using a snail and slug control.

As the frosts can be quite intense in Dunedin, you might want to look at investing in some frost cloth, or a growing tunnel for seedlings. If you haven't thought about having a garden, or don't know where to start: my advice is to start small, plant one or two vegetables, seek help from experienced neighbours, or a gardening store – they're always willing to share advice and the all-important how-to of gardening. Gardening doesn't have to be complicated, or scary, just make a start and you'll see results in no time. 5

GGICN UPDATE - SURVEY, YOUTH, AND RETIREES

It's been a busy start to the year at GGICN, with plenty happening across our community and youth spaces.

Talk Café: We want to hear from those heading into retirement or already retired. Tell us what's working in the community, what's not, and what could improve life for you or your neighbours. We have some Talk Cafés coming soon alongside Age Concern to provide a space to connect.

Community Survey: We're launching a community survey soon to gather your thoughts. This is the third survey following ones in 2016 and 2020. These help identify what's great about our community and where GGICN should focus its efforts. Based on the last survey, we've made a submission to the DCC's nine-year plan, based directly on feedback from past consultations. These were: Making the Burnside underpass safer; Installing a public toilet at the Memorial Gardens; Ensuring the proposed bike trail through Abbotsford properly connects to Concord, Green Island, and Brighton.

Brighton Pump Track Gaining Momentum: The Brighton Pump Track project is progressing. Community consultation is underway for funding, and the local team, led by Shane Turner, is focused on breaking ground before the end of the year. This grassroots effort is one we're proud to support.

Youth Work: Our Youth Work Team is active across four schools—Concord.

Green Island, Abbotsford, and new this year, Fairfield. We're walking alongside young people who struggle to engage in traditional





classrooms, and we're already seeing massive shifts in leadership, confidence and engagement. A standout moment was when a student visited the Brighton Volunteer Fire Service. Normally reserved, they came alive, asked insightful questions, and found something to connect with.

Youth Action Group Launching: We're launching a Youth Action Group—a team of local taiohi who will design and deliver two community events this year. They'll grow in leadership, generosity, and purpose, while doing something meaningful for the place they call home. We'd love them to do this alongside adults in a collaborative way.

At GGICN, we're here to support local ideas, lift up young people, and build a stronger, more connected community. If you've got thoughts, ideas, or want to get involved—now's the time to reach out.
