

Interpreting Statistical Graphs

Obvious Observations: Describe what you see

- e.g. The shortest bar stands out.
- or The two biggest sections are about the same size

Specify: Say what that represents

- e.g. This shows that "submarine" is not a popular way for whales to get to work.
- or This indicates "TELEGO" & "YOGAPHONE" each have a large share of the cell phone market.

Evidence: Give actual figures to show how long, how wide, how tall, how many etc.

- e.g. In fact, only one of the twenty whales interviewed used a submarine.
- or TELEGO was the largest company, with 272 of the 700 customers surveyed, and YOGAPHONE was close behind, with 267 customers.

Meaning and Musing:

Explain the meaning behind what you see. Analyse what your observations show – answer the question "so what?"


Is it only relevant for this data, or does it suggest something about a wider situation?

What / who / where / when else should be similar?


How / why might some other groups / places / times be different?

What else would be useful or interesting to find out about this situation?

e.g. This means that the planned "car park" should have only a few spaces for submarines and won't need to spend a lot on special fittings for these vehicles to dock. However, since this survey was only done on the 20 orca whales who all work at SeaFord Holdings' Dunedin office, it might not be valid elsewhere. For instance, car parks planned for Invercargill, or Paris, or those used by sharks instead of whales might have different needs.

Congratulations to the Winners of the Annual Dunedin Secondary Schools' History Quiz

Massive congratulations to Eden Bell Nash (Year 11) and Niachelle Steenekamp (Year 12), who recently came away winners in the Annual Dunedin Secondary Schools History Quiz!

The Dunedin Secondary Schools' History Quiz is an annual competition contested by schools in the Dunedin area. Eight teams compete in the Senior Quiz: Year 12 and 13 combined, and six teams in the Year 11 Quiz.

The quiz typically includes rounds on international and New Zealand current events, history, famous people, and general knowledge.

KVC led the Year 11 Quiz from the first round and held a onepoint lead going into the last round. Ultimately, they won by three points over Logan Park and Trinity Catholic College. This annual contest is hotly contested among Dunedin schools, and we are so proud that these two KVC role models

and leaders took the title for the Year 11 History Dunedin Secondary Schools' History Quiz.



Ngā Manu Kōrero Competition – Congratulations Wairangi Tunoho!

On Wednesday, 28 and Thursday, 29 May, a small group of senior te reo Māori students went down to the Dunedin Town Hall to support Wairangi Tunoho, a Year 12 student, as he stood at the Ngā Manu Kōrero competition this year. Wairangi was the third speaker, and around 400 people in the audience were listening to him! We were all impressed with his kōrero and very proud of him.

The competition is a chance for students who whakapapa as Māori to speak on issues relating to rangatahi Māori. The competition has English and Māori sections split into Junior and Senior divisions. Our cohort of rangatahi who went along found the whole event very educational and a great experience. Well done, Wairangi!

NZ Association of Japanese Language Teachers) Annual Trivia Night

Last Friday night, Ms Lydiate attended the NZAJLT (NZ Association of Japanese Language Teachers) Annual Trivia Night for junior students studying Japanese with three Year 8 and two Year 10 students. Congratulations to Mackenzie Dinnissen on her IRB Driver's Award



Mackenzie achieved her IRB (Inflatable Rescue Boat) driver's award over the weekend. This means she is able and qualified to operate rescue boats in any surf conditions. IRBs are normally used in the surf line and are fairly tricky to operate. If safe, Mackenzie will be called upon to drive in conditions up to a couple of metres or more.

IRBs are made of rubber and consist of four inflatable tubes - two side tubes, a bow

tube, and a keelson tube. This specific feature, coupled with the obvious fact that they are used in the water, has coined the term "rubber duck" or simply "duck" to describe an IRB. Typically, the rubber is coloured a shade of red termed 'Rescue Red'



We are looking forward to the Co-Ed Tournament to be held next Thursday, 26 June. All of the co-ed schools in Dunedin get together and play a variety of sports for the day. Over 60 students will be involved from KVC.

Table Tennis NZ asked its member associations to nominate volunteers who make a real difference in their


region. In Otago, TTNZ is proud to spotlight an outstanding individual giving back to the sport in unique and meaningful ways.


