PRINCIPAL'S COMMENT

Kia ora koutou

The Ministry of Education is proposing significant changes to the National Certificate of Educational Achievement (NCEA). Below, I have summarised the rationale for the various changes and what is being proposed to replace the current system.

Why is NCEA Changing

Inconsistency and Credibility Issues: NCEA's current flexibility can lead to students gaining qualifications without mastering essential skills, and there is significant variability in how subjects are taught from school to school. This makes it difficult for employers and tertiary educators to understand what an NCEA qualification truly represents and, more importantly, how much learning a student is exposed to in each subject varies from school to school.

"Credit Counting": Some students disengage once they have accumulated enough credits, and there are no clear guidelines on which standards must be met for a subject or qualification. This means many students opt out of end-of-year examinations.

Curriculum Alignment: The current system often sees NCEA standards driving teaching rather than being driven by a strong national curriculum.

Key Proposed Changes:

Working with Industry on Vocational Education and Training (VET) Subjects:

- Change: Integrate clear, consistent VET subjects into senior secondary qualifications, developed in partnership with industry experts (e.g., Industry Skills Boards). These subjects will consist of coherent sets of skill standards.
- Reason: To strengthen the value and credibility of vocational learning, providing clearer pathways for students into industry qualifications or employment. This aims to ensure VET learning is relevant to real post-school opportunities.

Introducing a New Foundational Award and National Senior Secondary Qualifications:

- Change: A new Foundational Award for literacy and numeracy (or te reo matatini and pāngarau) will be introduced in Year 11 (replacing the current co-requisite from 2028). NCEA Level 1 will be removed after 2027. New qualifications, the New Zealand Certificate of Education (for Year 12, effective from 2029) and the New Zealand Advanced Certificate of Education (for Year 13, effective from 2030), will be introduced.
- Reason: To allow Year 11 students to focus on foundational skills before high-stakes assessments in Years 12 and 13. The Foundational Award will provide employers with a clear understanding of a school-leaver's fundamental skills. This also aligns with international practices.


Shifting to a Structured and Subject-Based Approach with Required Subjects:

- Change: Achievement will focus on mastery across whole subjects, with external and internal assessments aggregated to an overall grade (e.g., scored out of 100). Year 11, 12 and 13 students will generally be required to take five subjects.
- Reason: To ensure coherent and consistent learning programmes, making it easier for employers and tertiary
 providers to understand students' knowledge and skills. This also aims to prevent students from unintentionally
 limiting their post-school options too early as well as ensuring each student across the country gets the same
 learning programme.

Strengthening Achievement Requirements:

- Change: To achieve the new qualifications, students must earn a passing grade in at least four subjects. Terms like 'Excellence' and 'Achieved' will be replaced with more detailed subject marking. High-achieving students can still receive an overall qualification endorsement (e.g. 'with distinction').
- Reason: To increase consistency in assessment, incentivise students to study throughout the year, and provide a clearer understanding of students' skills and knowledge for educators and employers.

Below is an example of what a student's Record of Achievement may look like:



Timeline for Implementation (Subject to Cabinet Agreement):

- 2028: NCEA Level 1 removed; Foundational Award introduced.
- 2029: New Zealand Certificate of Education (Year 12) introduced, replacing NCEA Level 2.
- 2030: New Zealand Advanced Certificate of Education (Year 13) introduced, replacing NCEA Level 3.
- Students who are currently in Year 9 (in 2025) will continue under the existing NCEA system.
- Students who are currently in Year 8 (in 2025) will begin learning under the new curriculum from 2026 and will be assessed under the new award and qualifications starting in 2028





New Bee Card Fare from 29 September




