#### SCIENCE SUPERSTARS SAIL THE HARBOUR!



Our brightest Year 10 scientists traded their uniforms for life jackets this week as they took part in an exclusive two-day Marine Science Extension Programme at the New Zealand Marine Studies Centre (NZMSC) in Portobello!

This wasn't your typical field trip—our students worked as genuine research scientists, helping the local council investigate the impact of human activity on the Otago Harbour habitats.

### Onboard the Polaris II

Day one was spent entirely on





the water aboard the research vessel, the *Polaris II*! Our students handled professional scientific gear, deploying baited underwater video cameras to see what creatures lurked below, and conducting plankton tows to sample the ocean's invisible building blocks. They were up close with real-time data collection, putting complex science skills into direct practice.

#### Lab Detectives


On day two, the mission shifted from the sea to the lab. Students worked collaboratively in teams, meticulously **analysing the mountains of data** they had collected. They processed samples, interpreted environmental readings,

and then compiled their findings into a detailed **summary report**, demonstrating their analytical prowess and ability to communicate complex science.

It was an intense but hugely rewarding experience that extended their learning far beyond the classroom. The students were fantastic ambassadors for KVC and gained invaluable insight into careers in marine biology and

#### **SPORTS NEWS**


Term 4 sport is well underway with Minivolley, Volleyball, Senior Futsal and Year 7 and 8 Touch having all started this week.

#### University of Otago Locals Presentation



#### MEASLES CASES IN AOTEAROA

Recent measles cases linked to overseas travel have been reported in Te Tai Tokerau and Queenstown.

Cases were active in the community while infectious, and there is a risk of measles circulating there, as well as more widely in Aotearoa.

Measles is highly contagious and can cause severe illness in people of any age.

• Watch for measles symptoms – fever, cough, runny nose, sore eyes, and a blotchy rash.

#### Measles: Locations of interest in Aotearoa New Zealand – Health New Zealand

- If anyone in your whānau has measles symptoms, keep them home and contact a doctor or Healthline urgently on 0800 611 116.
- Vaccination is the best protection from measles. Check that all whānau are immunised.

#### Measles, mumps, and rubella (MMR) vaccine – Health New Zealand

Anyone who has been closely exposed to measles and has not received two MMR vaccinations cannot attend their school | kura for at least eight days



- \* A female gladiator was called a gladiatrix, two or more gladiatrices. They were extremely rare but did exist until being officially banned from 200CE onwards.
- \* Psithurism the sound of wind in trees
