Principal's Comment



Kia ora koutou

We sent you a Google Form two weeks ago asking for your feedback about academics at KVC. This form is a part of a larger work that the Board is undertaking to inform the strategic direction for the school over the next three years. We will ask for feedback on five key areas: Academics, giving effect to the Treaty of Waitangi/Te Tiriti o Waitangi, inclusivity, preparation for life beyond school, well-being, and belonging. We will seek feedback from staff, students, and the wider school community. Thank you to all those who completed the form on Academics at KVC. All responses will be considered when we draft our 2026-2028 Strategic Plan. Your responses on academics at KVC were insightful and offered positive feedback. Below is a summary of the feedback provided by you:

What does KVC currently do well in terms of academic education?

High-Quality, Differentiated Instruction: The school provides challenging academic content that pushes students to reach their potential without overwhelming them. It also caters to different learning styles and offers extension opportunities.

Strong Core Subject Foundations: English, mathematics, and sciences are particularly well-structured, providing students with a solid academic base.

Supportive and Encouraging Environment: Teachers are dedicated, approachable, and go the extra mile to help students succeed, fostering confidence and a love of learning.

Holistic Student Development: The school considers students as whole individuals, encouraging their interests, supporting their future plans, and caring for the specific needs of children with special needs.

Celebration of Success and Personal Excellence: The school effectively celebrates student achievements and promotes personal excellence, recognising diverse strengths and fostering a positive attitude towards learning.

What could the school do differently to enhance your child's academic education?

Improve Teacher Differentiated Instruction: Provide challenging work for high-achieving students, and offer one-on-one support for struggling students.

Enhance Teacher Feedback: Implement more rigorous and high-quality student feedback mechanisms across the school to ensure consistent teaching. Additionally, improve the provision of specific and constructive feedback on student assessments and provide more meaningful and detailed progress reports.

Increase Learning Support and Resources: Provide smaller class sizes, more teacher aides, and readily available support for subjects where students need help, especially those who benefit from one-on-one assistance.

Cultivate a Culture of Academic Excellence: Raise academic expectations across the school, foster a stronger homework culture, and provide better support for parents in understanding and tracking NCEA progress and goal setting.

Offer Tailored and Relevant Learning Opportunities: Consider introducing subjects that provide pathways to the workplace or teach life skills, and ensure that all learning, whether screen-based or traditional, is engaging, interesting, and relevant to individual student needs and interests.


MESSAGE FROM THE BOARD PRESIDING MEMBER – MARK ROGERS

Interpreting Statistical Graphs

Obvious Observations: Describe what you see


- e.g. The shortest bar stands out.
- or The two biggest sections are about the same size

Specify: Say what that represents

- e.g. This shows that "submarine" is not a popular way for whales to get to work.
- or This indicates "TELEGO" & "YOGAPHONE" each have a large share of the cell phone market.

Evidence: Give actual figures to show how long, how wide, how tall, how many etc.

- e.g. In fact, only one of the twenty whales interviewed used a submarine.
- or TELEGO was the largest company, with 272 of the 700 customers surveyed, and YOGAPHONE was close behind with 267 customers.




Explain the meaning behind what you see. Analyse what your observations show – answer the question "so what?"


Is it only relevant for this data, or does it suggest something about a wider situation?

What / who / where / when else should be similar? How / why might some other groups / places / times be different? What else would be useful or interesting to find out about this situation?

e.g. This means that the planned "carpark" should have only a few spaces for submarines and won't need to spend a lot on special fittings for these vehicles to dock. However, since this survey was only done on the 20 orca whales who all work at SeaFord Holdings' Dunedin office, it might not be valid elsewhere. For instance, carparks planned for Invercargill, or Paris, or those used by sharks instead of whales might have different needs.





Our holiday programmes are well attended so that numbers may be capped, and registrations will be closed early if maximum capacity numbers are reached.


July Holiday Programme






