#### PRINCIPAL'S COMMENT

This week was Senior Assessment Week, during which senior students completed practice exams or assessments for each of their subjects. The results from these assessments will provide a good gauge of their current standing in each subject and identify areas where they need to focus their efforts for the end-of-year exams, which begin in early November. I encourage all students taking external examinations to start their preparations by creating a study timetable and adhering to it. Their teachers are here to provide support with any help, extra work, or tutorials.

Students in Year 8 and below will likely be sitting the proposed NZ Certificate in Education from 2028 onwards. Although it is just a proposal at the moment, there

is a high likelihood that students who go through the new system will be taking far more high-stakes examinations. We are exploring ways to prepare our current Year 7 and 8 students for this possible eventuality, and we will keep you posted once we have more clarity from the Ministry of Education regarding the new qualifications.

There have been numerous comments and opinions expressed throughout the country about the proposed changes, which is to be expected for something that affects the education of our young people. Regardless of one's feelings about the proposed changes, it is evident that schools will need to make significant adjustments to their teaching and learning programmes and begin preparing students soon. At Kaikorai Valley College, we are currently discussing the necessary changes to ensure our students are well-prepared for whatever the new qualifications require of them. You can rest assured that we will approach any change with enthusiasm and view it as an opportunity to improve the outcomes for our students.

As we enter the last week of Term 3, it is great to see students making use of the improving weather and spending their breaktimes participating in various sports and games. Next Wednesday evening is our Sports and Cultural Prize-Giving, and I invite you to attend this celebration of student achievement. I wish all of our students and their whānau a pleasant holiday.




#### YEAR 9 HEART SURGEONS!!




Our Year 9 Science students recently had an exciting experience as they acted as surgeons for a day, getting hands-on with real sheep



#### New Bee Card Fare from 29 September

The free fare for children aged 5-12 years will end from 29 September, and they will now pay \$1.50. The fare for youth aged 13-18 years in Dunedin will increase from \$1.20 to \$1.50, and the adult fare will increase from \$2 to \$2.50.

All these fares need a **registered Bee Card** to take advantage of discounts.

Cash fares remain unchanged at \$3.

#### 5-12 years

- Free fare for children aged 5–12 will end
- New fare with a Bee Card will be \$1.50
- New cash fare will be \$3.

#### 13-18 years

- New fare with a Bee Card will be \$1.50
- Cash fare will remain \$3

#### Adults (19+)

- New fare will be \$2.50 with a Bee Card
- Cash fare will remain \$3.


