### PRINCIPAL'S COMMENT

I would like to extend a very warm welcome to all of our new students and their whānau to Kaikorai Valley College, as well as to our returning students. You may have heard about a nationwide push to improve students' attendance rates. To achieve this, there is now a process that all schools must follow. A major component of this attendance process is to organise a meeting/phone call with families and students to improve attendance if students have more than five days off in any given term. Attending school every day is vital; every unnecessary absence creates gaps in learning that require additional work and effort to overcome. ## Individual Student Attendance activities

Individualised student responses to absence thresholds

### Less than 5 days absence in a school term

#### Parents/Guardians

Ensure student attends every day they are able  
Reinforce good attendance habits  
Open communication with the school  
Follow school attendance management plan and processes

#### School

Communicate with parents about every absence  
Provide students with regular updates on their attendance  
If student has 3 consecutive days of unexplained absences whānau teacher to contact home  
Report regularly to parents on attendance  
Support student to:  
attend school  
continue learning if unable to attend school every day, including Ministry approved well-being or transitional plans, or health school where appropriate

### Up to 10 days absence in a school term

#### Parents/Guardians

Return student to regular attendance  
Contact school to discuss reasons for absence and impact on learning  
Support student to catch up on missed learning  
Engage in supports offered

#### School

After 5 days absence, a letter will be sent home informing parents of absences and impact on learning  
Deans will phone home to discuss reasons for absence and any supports required  
Use in school resources/strategies to remove any potential barriers for attendance

### Up to 15 days absence in a school term

#### Parents/Guardians

Return student to regular attendance  
Participate in meeting with the school to analyse reasons for absence and to collaborate on a support plan  
Implement strategies at home

#### School

After 10 days absence contact parents to escalate concerns via letter  
A Senior Leader will organise a face-to-face meeting with parents/whānau to analyse reasons for absence and to collaborate on a support plan  
Use in school resources to remove barriers and request support from Attendance Services

### 15 days or more of absence in a school term

#### Parents/Guardians

Return student to regular attendance  
Engage in support plan  
Participate in regular meetings

#### School

After 15 days of absence contact parents to inform of escalated response  
Request support from Attendance Services or other agencies  
Participate in multi-agency response  
Maintain implementation and monitoring of support plan  
Undertake school-led prosecution or request Ministry-led prosecution, when considered appropriate if supports are offered and not taken up

### Ministry of Education

#### Attendance Service

- Work with chronically absent and non-enrolled students and their families to identify and address barriers to attendance. This includes:
  - agreeing changes to be made,
  - addressing some unmet basic needs impacting on attendance, and
  - referring students to other services as necessary
- Collaborate with schools so that
  - they remain engaged as plans are developed and implemented, and
  - they can continue to provide support as the student increases their attendance at school, and the additional Attendance Service support is withdrawn

#### Regional and National teams

- Facilitate involvement of other agencies
- Support schools to access other education pathways for a student where appropriate
- Consider system-wide initiatives for high-risk attendance
- Reprioritise regional support resources to where most needed/effective
- Undertake Ministry-led prosecution when considered appropriate if supports are offered and not taken up, when requested by schools

## CAREER MOVES

### Hands-on at the University of Otago

For a week in January, I attended the Hands-On at Otago programme at the University of Otago after applying with encouragement from Mrs Beagley. It is a highly competitive programme, and I was grateful to be selected. I saw it as a great opportunity to experience university life and explore possible career pathways.

Although my first choice, Health Sciences First Year, was full, I was placed in Microbiology and Immunology. At first, I wasn't sure what to expect, but I quickly found it really interesting. We used professional microscopes and learned about high-level biosafety laboratories that work with pathogens such as tuberculosis and COVID-19. I also had the chance to try Genetics, where we solved a mock murder using DNA testing and presented our findings in a creative way.

I was the only student from Kaikorai Valley College, which pushed me to meet new people and make new friends. The week also included activities like a floor-group dance at the Big Night and a final presentation reflecting on our experience.



Overall, Hands - On at Otago was a valuable experience that gave me a better understanding of university study and future career options. I'm grateful for the opportunity and would encourage other students to apply.


