Letter To The Editor

Taylor Park Reserve – Do the Milton Community and Rate Payers Have a Say? Some time ago we had an offering from the Clutha District Council to view the cabins they were installing without public consultation on the playing fields at Taylor Park Reserve. We have had the opportunity to respond by submission. While I received a read receipt which stated that submissions are being reviewed, I have received no further information with regard to the Council's intent and work has re-started apace.

From the start this has been a poor showing on the part of the Council. Valid questions from the community have been met with a reactionary "we don't have to consult" response. On receiving that public response via submission we are now being ignored.

The Clutha District Council is in the midst of creating a new camping ground, they have no previous plan lodged per the Camping Ground Act, nothing was lodged through the Ministry or Regional Council. The Council still has to go through the right processes to create a camp ground and variously retrospectively updating plans, putting them on their website.

Almost all of the community that attended the viewing agreed in principal that a camping ground was a good idea in theory. Generally people were opposed to the installation of the cabins on the playing fields (the current site).

The Council has not provided us with any sound reasoning or supporting evidence behind their decision to pursue this project - there appears to be no foundational market research report or business plan. Will these tiny cabins be suitable as long stays to cover a housing shortage? Or will droves will appear wanting overnight stays every night of the week as they ride the cycle track making leasing a campground a viable proposition for the expense to the township?

During discussion at the public showing the Mayor was at great pains to make it clear that the cabins can be moved without difficulty or much cost. Are any of us really happy with having no say in losing our public recreational amenities to private business when there are sites that would better suit its needs?

As the work continues it appears that we do not have a say in how the Council uses our resources because they are quite happy to send out a brief missive saying they're looking at our submission, but carrying on as if there never was such a response. Clearly moving the cabins and re-siting them off the main botanical park is preferred by Rate Payers but construction is moving forward.

The Council's own website shows nearly all submissions oppose the current site. We have unresponsive and absent Councilors representing our town – only one elected Milton Ward Councilor bothered to show. Surely we deserve better from our representatives and our Council? Surely we should not be losing our public accessible amenities. Taylor Park Reserve greenspace retention is vital for a growing community.

Prizegiving Speech -Ailsa Cain

Who am I? My name is Ailsa Cain I carry the names of my mother's homeland and was raised in my father's. I'm a Virgo. I'm older than you, maybe the age of your parents? I am the oldest sibling. Mrs Cain is my Mum. I had a cat called Topsy that I made my family feed

I went to school at Milton Primary and then Tokomairiro.

I pushed through my schooling, sometimes it was easy, mostly it was hard. I did bad in tests. I really liked the speech competition and school camps.

I was Malcom House Captain and Head Girl.

In my last year, I received the school motto award -Disciplina, Moderatio, Comitas. I was stoked.

I went to Uni in Dunedin because I was an average shedhand allergic to wool and a very bad speller so couldn't be a secretary at Calder Stewart. What other options did I have?

And that was the end of my time living in Milton. It should have also been the end of my Milton story but, in fact, my Milton story hadn't yet begun.

My three years at university were confused. Like most kids who grow up in rural areas, I was intimidated by the city kids, especially those from private schools who seemed to have everything figured out. At times I struggled to find my place, wavering between wanting attention and invisibility. I got a Bachelor of Arts in History and Politics; just.

Then I went to Wellington and applied for coveted a new graduate role at the Ministry for Culture and Heritage. And this is where Milton becomes pivotal to my story.

Over 100 applicants and I got the job. Why? Great question. Degree – yeah but everyone else had that. What made me stand out? Well, I had the experience and soft skills that you subconsciously develop in a town like Milton.

I had worked in the shearing sheds throughout high school and uni – my employer saw that as an advantage because I knew how to be part of a team. I understood hard work and I



knew hierarchy. I grew up in a close-knit community - my employer saw that as evidence that I could talk to all different types of people and

generations. I was not easily offended nor quick to gossip. It was at this point that started to dawn on me that what I had observed and learnt growing up in Milton gave me an edge. Now I had confidence in the skills I brought to the table, confidence to take on new challenges because I knew the value of perseverance and being underrated.

And as I have moved through my career, nothing has undermined this point. Time and time again, being from Milton is my strength and secret weapon; my competitive advantage and what gives me confidence to be at the table or do the work

Fast forward, and I'm now running my own policy and re-search company founded on my ethics and interests. I've grown a business in an emerging sector, pushed for our work to be acknowledged and valued, and even received the Te Waipounamu Māori Businesswoman Award this year. I can argue with someone and continue to work with them. I can be in uncomfortable situations and keep ongoing. I can make something amazing from the most frugal of starts. Like many other people in this room have done.

So, my point for you students, is don't underestimate what this town provides. Have confidence to do what you want to do next. Stay grounded in the foundations set here. Kei ou ringaringa te ao - the world is yours. My journey is ongoing, but the most formative chapters started right where you sit now.

I implore and wish for you to have the confidence I didn't necessarily have. Have courage; don't let your memes stay dreams! Your backgrounds matter. Your skills matter. You matter. The world awaits all the good you will achieve. And no doubt that when you do, there will be someone else there from Milton too. Mauri ora

New Defibrillators for Milton

Building on the success of Hato Hone St John's Shocktober, the Hato Hone St John Area Committee in Milton has installed two automated external defibrillators (AEDs) in the community to help build resilience.

The month-long Shocktober campaign during October saw more than 13,000 people participate in the *3 Steps for Life* programme across Aotearoa, New Zealand to learn what to do when someone goes into cardiac arrest (including calling 111 for an ambulance, starting CPR immediately, and applying a defibrillator),

The new AEDs are located at **Night'n'Day Milton**, 24 Union Street in a secure lock box requiring 111 to be called for the code to access the unit, and at Chrystalls Beach at **239 Chrystalls Beach Road**.

Cardiac arrest remains one of the leading causes of death in Aotearoa New Zealand with more than 2,000 people suffering a cardiac arrest in the community each year. Of those, only one in 10 patients survive through to discharge from hospital. These new community AEDs will help save lives and are two of 14 located in the local community.


