Vote Gail Oats for Mayor

This is an advertisement made in support of my campaign to be elected as Mayor of the Clutha District and for the ward of Kaitangata.

In my campaign I am standing against Three Waters and in support of democracy. I am the only Mayoral candidate opposing Three Waters. I think it is interesting to note that our democratic rights cover all aspects of our lives.

For instance, within the Clutha District, the Genesis is one of the publications that I choose to support - this is democracy at work. Democracy means having freedom of choice and freedom of speech. Without democracy there are no alternatives and no choices. Therefore the Genesis is a credit to the schools, groups and clubs who contribute to their local community newsletter.

We are in serious danger of losing our democratic system. Three Waters is a direct attack on our democratic rights -

Were the rate payers consulted or even fully informed regarding Three Waters meetings at the CDC? *No.* Why not? *Because Three Waters is not a democratic process, it does not give the ratepayers' a choice.* I also note at this point that the Ombudsman's office has the CDC listed for investigation into its practices.

It's time to grab back democracy while we still can. First, we cut the Three Waters connection formed through the CDC membership of Local government NZ. We move to Local Government for Democracy with 31 other councils and reinstate the democratic process by consulting with ratepayers in order to find a better way.

And that goes for everything council does. It is the only way this district, or any district may move forward. Council and ratepayers together.

There are of course other problems in our district that require attention. Budget blowouts are virtually being ignored. It is good to see the Owaka community pool open again for this season, but I have to ask how control of community pools will be achieved under Three Waters? The Milton community pool, already hampered by budget blow outs, will also be affected by the questions over Three Waters. We need to protect our assets from being taken over. We need to put the brakes on the civic centre building in Balclutha and have an in-depth look at why the costs are spiralling out of control.

We also need to utilise that building. I am not in agreement with council being in competition with private enterprise, therefore I would not be in favour of putting shops and cafes in a council building, we already have those businesses in our main streets. Relocating the museum in that building is one idea I have.

Our economy is not being handled well by the government. We need to protect our district from the ensuing fallout of that economic mismanagement. Our district is resource rich and our people are our most important resource. With our natural resources and the hard work, experience and ingenuity of our communities we can build our wealth and keep that wealth here. Council will contribute and support. Council contracts stay within the Clutha District. By cutting through red tape, using local knowledge instead of "consultants" we generate more business and save in costs. Then we pass these savings on through rates relief where most needed. We must support our farmers and all other sources of productive industry as these are the fundamentals of our rural economy.

Since nominating I have spoken to every available business proprietor and their employees in every town and settlement in the Clutha District. Our local businesses are of a very high standard and have earned council support. I include the Milton markets in this.

One way council may support local business is by adding extra dimensions to what we have to offer in the Clutha District. We are under-rated as a tourism destination. We have scenic beauty, the best coastline in the country, good farms and dark skies all near established towns that will support visitors. I have a long time interest in astrology, astronomy, astrophysics and astrophotography and am keen to establish

dark skies tourism here. We may branch out in many directions from there.

I have spoken with some local business people who held a Matariki market last year. Council would support that initiative and encourage further development. We already have a long weekend to assist in that venture.

Once the wealth is generated through council working with the people of our District, everybody benefits, and from that, social services improve. Funding becomes

available to assist people in their everyday lives. It's called prosperity and we should be aiming for it.

I ask for your vote and I also ask for everybody to vote. We need to show government that we wish to retain our local council.

Tauranga has lost their council, yet again they will not get to participate in an election despite the ratepayers demands to government which have been ignored. Do not let this happen here. May God Bless Us All. Yours sincerely Gail Oats.
