SCHOOL MISSION: Inspiring Excellence in Education, in Character and in Life.

Tena koutou katoa,

Greetings to you all in week two of the term break – I hope all the students and staff are making the most of this down time. I have had the privilege of being on sabbatical for all of term two and am now ready to return to school. I would especially like to thank Vicki Wish for taking the helm in my absence.

During my time away, I had the wonderful opportunity to spend time with my grandchildren in Brisbane, share the journey of the growth of the youngest one from 5 weeks old through to 14 weeks old, and also share the second birthday of the older one.

I also had the opportunity to do a lot of reading and thinking and, having visited a number of schools in Auckland in term one and a school similar to ours (although much bigger) late June, reflect on how well we are providing for the tamariki of our community. Are we preparing our students for a world of the future or are we still clinging onto the world as it is, or was? We need to make sure we are focusing on the skills that will make people successful for life.

Whanau / Student Feedback

In April, a whanau survey was sent to all parents asking them to identify what they believed were the top five capabilities for young people to develop over their time at Tokomairiro High school - taken from a list of twelve capabilities listed in the school strategic plan. A student survey was also sent to all students in the school.

Capability	% Support
Have developed their self control	77% whanau, 65% students
Respect others and their beliefs	66% whanau, 70% students
Have Empathy for Others	69% whanau, 58% students
Have developed their sense of Identity and Self-belief	63% whanau, 43% students
Can work Collaboratively	31% whanau, 52% students
Are resilient	54% whanau, 34% students
Have a sense of purpose	46% whanau, 43% students

35 parents responded to the whanau survey, 80 students responded to the student survey.

Our teaching staff also discussed this and listed the following as their top choices:

Sense of Identity / Self Belief, Resilience, Self Control / Self Management, Empathy for others, and Respect for Others and their Beliefs. As you can see, there were very similar responses from all three groups.

Our challenge now is to make sure we are providing opportunities for our young people to develop these skills - both at school, at home and in the wider community.

What is Restorative Practice?

Restorative practice has been a characteristic of our school system for many years. Here is an overview of the system.

Restorative Practice is widely accepted in New Zealand schools and a growing number of schools worldwide as a more effective alternative to traditional punitive behaviour management systems. The premise of Restorative Practice is a relational approach to school life grounded in beliefs about equality, dignity, mana and the potential of all people.

The system is designed to help students to build empathy and understand what harm has happened and then try to put right that harm. In contrast, with traditional punitive systems students receive an often pre-determined consequence for an incident. Once this consequence is completed the student is inserted back into the flow of school without learning how their actions have affected others or without learning any skills to try and stop repeating the same behaviours.

Restorative Practice works by understanding the story behind the story. This is done by listening to all of the people involved or close to an incident, this can be students, teachers and whanau. The stories are used to:

- explore what has happened and who has been affected
- hold those who have caused harm accountable for their actions
- provide support to those who have been harmed, and others involved.

Resolving incidents using Restorative Practice can vary in formality and number of participants depending on the incident. However, a Mini Conference, Classroom Conference or Formal Restorative Conference all require commitment from all the participants and preparation to be successful.

Tokomairiro High Schol Diploma

The Tokomairiro Diploma is a system we use to monitor your child's progress over the year. It's primary focus is about learning, making sure that students are aiming for and working towards their best. Students earn points towards their diploma each lesson. These are awarded for their effort in class. Each subject teacher awards points, from 1 to 4. Over the course of the year students gain an average for their different subjects. This average is made up of all their subjects and is out of 4. We combine this score with their attendance rates to determine at what level they graduate at. We give these out in the final assembly of the year. Students can gain a diploma at Achieved, Merit or Excellence level.

Below is an example of what we as teachers are looking for in terms of effort and demonstrating our school values in the classroom.

Mobility Access Improvements

Work has begun on a project to provide mobility access to the school Whare. A ramp is being built to allow wheelchair access - this goes from the path around the back of the hall to the side door of the whare. The design provides some lovely garden areas for plantings of native bushes and flaxes.



The contractors are also replacing concrete around each end of C Block, to provide a much safer area, especially for those who are challenged by rough ground.



The work will take a few weeks to complete and will result in an improvement to the quality of our grounds.
