Spirit of Adventure

From the 16th to the 26th of March I got the amazing opportunity to take part in the Spirit of Adventure in Auckland. This was a 10-day leadership course that tested our ability to lead and participate within a team. Activities were all about

working as a team in rafting, climbing and the biggest thing controlling a whole sailing ship. Each day a different watch group controlled a different mast, there were three masts, foredeck (front end), main (middle) and the mizzen (back end). We were told that eventually, we would control the ship as a group. We all thought that's not possible but after 6-7 days it was definitely possible! The first 3 days they fired information into our brains as if we were experienced sailors, all the different ropes and what role they have, all the

different knots, ways to roll it up and different callouts and if you got lucky you even got to captain the ship!!

Each mast had a different role; the foredeck controlled what we call the square sails. There were four layers. The top was called the Royale which from what we got told was about 40 metres up. Next was the topsail followed by the tegallan and finally the course. For all of these, you could attach yourself to a rope and climb up the riggings to reach the top where the views were amazing. Next mast was the main. Its job was to control the ship and gained the most speed so it was important to get it up. Finally the mizzen which was the easiest to put up but hardest to strike (put down).

Unfortunately on Day 7, the spirit had to go back early

because of the Covid-19 outbreak and the whole of New Zealand going into lockdown. Since some of us were flying we needed to rebook flights back home. At the time this was gutting; my heart sank right down, but after a week of the Covid-19 outbreak, I reckon it was a good call.

After the experience, I can say I've learned so much about sailing. But sailing was half of the course. The whole experience of being isolated out at sea with 30 people who came from all parts of New Zealand, allowed me to meet and make some amazing friends who I will never forget. I would like to thank everyone that helped me get to the Spirit. It was an experience I will never forget; it helped me become a more confident leader and person as a whole.

We had been spending a couple of hours a week studying for regional finals and we were disappointed that it was changed from a practical fun day to an online quiz because of the lockdown.

The Regional Finals started with a quiz. There were 27 questions on various different things, mainly Agriculture or General Knowledge. We had 15 minutes to complete the quiz or we lost points. Since we were in lockdown and we couldn't meet in person, we had to Facetime our other team member as we are in teams of two. We had a week to complete the first quiz and after that we found out who was going through to the Face Off. The teams who got the 2 highest scores on the quiz automatically went through to the Face Off and the top team from each school was picked as well.



In the Face Off we joined a zoom call along with the 9 other teams. We completed the quiz during the call so the officials could tell we weren't getting help. In the Face Off we had ten seconds to answer each question in Rounds 1 and 2 (each round consisted of 10-15 questions) and then in Round 3 we had eight seconds and the questions were worth double points. We did this quiz individually.

We both did well in the Face Off, placed third and Ryan fourth with one point between us. They had live results from the Face Off so we could see our results but still had to wait for the overall winners to be announced.

We were hopeful as we thought we had done well but still very nervous. The results were announced on Sunday night and we found out we had placed second and were going to compete in the Grand Final later on this year. We were stoked to get through!
